observational	Relying on observation or experiment <i>The design of an experiment or observational study often influences the power.</i>
observing	Quick to notice; showing quick and keen perception <i>The family raised the children observing jewish holidays.</i>
obsessional	Characterized by or constituting an obsession <i>Your interest in this man appears to be verging on obsessional.</i>
