<b>ictal</b>	Of or relating to a seizure or convulsion <i>Most patients are in a post ictal state following a seizure.</i>
<b>icteric</b>	Affected by jaundice which causes yellowing of skin etc
<b>icterogenic</b>	Producing jaundice
<b>ictic</b>	Of or relating to a seizure or convulsion

<b>illicit</b>	Contrary to or forbidden by law <i>Dealing and use of illicit drugs occurs on the streets.</i>
<b>illimitable</b>	Without limits in extent or size or quantity <i>This field of studies is illimitable.</i>
<b>illiterate</b>	Not able to read or write <i>In 1925, the population was largely illiterate and disparate.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking in correct logical relation <i>The opening paragraph is confusing and illogical.</i>
<b>illusional</b>	Marked by or producing illusion
<b>illusionary</b>	Marked by or producing illusion <i>The illusionary ruins at the depths of the earth.</i>

<b>immature</b>	Not yet having developed feathers <i>The content of this article is immature and irrelevant.</i>
<b>immeasurable</b>	Impossible to measure <i>The prosperity generated is immeasurable.</i>
<b>immediate</b>	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect <i>The immediate decompression causes the shellfish to open.</i>
<b>immemorial</b>	Long past; beyond the limits of memory or tradition or recorded history <i>His mother lived there since times immemorial.</i>
<b>immense</b>	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope <i>The response of the nation was immense.</i>
<b>immensurable</b>	Impossible to measure
<b>imminent</b>	Close in time; about to occur <i>There is no imminent danger of the list overwhelming the article.</i>
<b>immiscible</b>	Incapable of mixing <i>Oil and water are immiscible.</i>
<b>immobile</b>	Not capable of movement or of being moved <i>It could be formed by immobile troops and troops on the march.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Beyond reasonable limits <i>You accuse me of being immoderate</i>

<b>immodest</b>	Having or showing an exaggerated opinion of your importance, ability, etc <i>At the risk of being immodest, i would like to nominate myself for adminship.</i>
<b>immoral</b>	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong <i>The word immoral is an opinionated.</i>
<b>immortal</b>	Not subject to death <i>The tree healed but the hunters became immortal.</i>
<b>immotile</b>	Not capable of movement
<b>immovable</b>	Not able or intended to be moved <i>The machine is an immovable object.</i>
<b>immoveable</b>	Not able or intended to be moved <i>Canonically, the distinction is between moveable and immoveable.</i>
<b>immune</b>	Secure against <i>Beaded lizards are immune to the effects of their own venom.</i>
<b>immunised</b>	Having been rendered unsusceptible to a disease <i>Each pig must be immunised twice to successfully control boar taint.</i>
<b>immunochemical</b>	Of or relating to immunochemistry <i>Immunochemical signal detection.</i>
<b>immunocompetent</b>	Capable of developing an immune response following exposure to an antigen <i>In the immunocompetent group no deaths occurred at either dose of mcmv.</i>
<b>immunocompromised</b>	Unable to develop a normal immune response usually because of malnutrition or immunodeficiency or immunosuppressive therapy <i>It can be used in some immunocompromised patients.</i>
<b>immunodeficient</b>	Incapable of developing an immune response following exposure to an antigen <i>A humouse is an immunodeficient mouse reconstituted with a human immune system.</i>
<b>immunogenic</b>	Possessing the ability to elicit an immune response <i>Existing medical superglues are highly immunogenic.</i>
<b>immunologic</b>	Of or relating to immunology <i>En is an immunologic response to a variety of different causes.</i>
<b>immunological</b>	Of or relating to immunology <i>Immunological functions of the human prepuce.</i>
<b>immunosuppressed</b>	Of persons whose immune response is inadequate <i>Infection is of particular concern to the immunosuppressed.</i>

<b>immutable</b>	Not subject or susceptible to change or variation in form or quality or nature <i>In battle, the word of the leader is immutable law.</i>
<b>impaired</b>	Diminished in strength, quality, or utility <i>His left arm was impaired for the rest of the match.</i>
<b>impalpable</b>	Incapable of being perceived by the senses especially the sense of touch- james jeans <i>The light, impalpable tones of lost youth can be found in the proposals.</i>
<b>imparipinnate</b>	Pinnate with a single leaflet at the apex <i>The leaves are imparipinnate and opposite.</i>
<b>impartial</b>	Showing lack of favoritism <i>I try to be fair and impartial and speak the truth.</i>
<b>impassable</b>	Incapable of being passed <i>For normal cars the track is impassable.</i>
<b>impassioned</b>	Characterized by intense emotion <i>The singer is impassioned about composing a song.</i>
<b>impassive</b>	Having or revealing little emotion or sensibility; not easily aroused or excited- nordhoff & hall <i>Jeremy remains impassive, teaching fencing as usual.</i>
<b>impatient</b>	Restless or short-tempered under delay or opposition <i>The laity was more impatient with the process of reform.</i>
<b>impeccable</b>	Without fault or error <i>The statements in the factbox in particular need to be impeccable.</i>
<b>impeccant</b>	Free from sin
<b>impecunious</b>	Not having enough money to pay for necessities <i>The poor man's succession for many rias is to sell shares over an extended period of time to the bunch of young, impecunious turks.</i>
<b>impellent</b>	Forcing forward or onward; impelling <i>He managed to restore impellent activity and speech after all three strokes.</i>
<b>impendent</b>	Close in time; about to occur
<b>impending</b>	Close in time; about to occur <i>Today, we live in absolute suspicion and constant presentiment of an impending disaster.</i>
<b>impenetrable</b>	Permitting little if any light to pass through because of denseness of matter <i>The article is completely impenetrable to laypersons.</i>



<b>impenitent</b>	Impervious to moral persuasion <i>Japan will only feel worse if it remains impenitent and continues like this.</i>
<b>imperative</b>	Relating to verbs in the imperative mood <i>Cleanliness of the insulation remains imperative.</i>
<b>imperceptible</b>	Impossible or difficult to perceive by the mind or senses <i>So no, imperceptible may still be correct.</i>
<b>imperfect</b>	Wanting in moral strength, courage, or will; having the attributes of man as opposed to e.g. divine beings <i>In the imperfect they use the endings of the weak verbs.</i>
<b>imperfectible</b>	Capable of being made imperfect
<b>imperforate</b>	Not perforated; having no opening <i>It was an imperforate sheet valued at 70p.</i>
<b>imperial</b>	Belonging to or befitting a supreme ruler <i>Christianity became the greatest beneficiary of imperial largesse.</i>
<b>imperialist</b>	Of or relating to imperialism <i>I'm not being a cultural imperialist.</i>
<b>imperialistic</b>	Of or relating to imperialism <i>Let's not be culturally imperialistic.</i>
<b>imperious</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy <i>His imperious disposition, rendered him quite unpopular among the colonists.</i>
<b>imperishable</b>	Not perishable <i>A large surplus of this imperishable fence material is the rule.</i>
<b>impermanent</b>	Not permanent; not lasting- james thurber <i>These are impermanent, and thus ultimately unreal.</i>
<b>impermeable</b>	Preventing especially liquids to pass or diffuse through <i>The inner wall member comprises an impermeable barrier layer.</i>
<b>impermissible</b>	Not permitted <i>Either way, the refactoring you did there was impermissible.</i>
<b>impersonal</b>	Having no personal preference <i>Maybe the difference has to do with the impersonal nature of weather.</i>
<b>impertinent</b>	Improperly forward or bold <i>It's all too tenuous, speculative, and impertinent.</i>
<b>imperturbable</b>	Not easily perturbed or excited or upset; marked by extreme calm and composure <i>Maria and lucas take refuge in a tree with an imperturbable little boy.</i>
<b>imperviable</b>	Not admitting of passage or capable of being affected

<b>impervious</b>	Not admitting of passage or capable of being affected <i>Preferably, the footwear is comprised of a moisture and air impervious material.</i>
<b>impetiginous</b>	Of or relating to or having impetigo
<b>impetuous</b>	Marked by violent force <i>He is a young warrior and very impetuous.</i>
<b>impious</b>	Lacking piety or reverence for a god <i>They denounced both his method and its results as absurd and impious.</i>
<b>impish</b>	Naughtily or annoyingly playful <i>Plus, it gives duvall a splendid platform for impish understatement.</i>
<b>implacable</b>	Incapable of being placated <i>He was also an implacable foe of the rulers.</i>
<b>implanted</b>	Deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held <i>The enlarged hollow member is implanted under the skin.</i>
<b>implausible</b>	Having a quality that provokes disbelief <i>Note the term implausible as opposed to impossible.</i>
<b>implemental</b>	Serving or acting as a means or aid
<b>implicated</b>	Culpably involved <i>The gene is implicated in the regulation of brain cortical patterning.</i>
<b>implicational</b>	Relating to or concerned with logical implication <i>Implicational hierarchies also play a role in syntactic phenomena.</i>
<b>implicative</b>	Tending to suggest or imply <i>Hence we have the term implicative and nonimplicative.</i>
<b>implicit</b>	Being without doubt or reserve <i>Consistency is implicit in the concept of policies in the first place.</i>
<b>implike</b>	Naughtily or annoyingly playful
<b>impolite</b>	Not polite <i>The above comments are clearly insulting and impolite.</i>
<b>impolitic</b>	Not politic <i>To me more impolitic, i would advise you to go block yourself, as well.</i>
<b>imponderable</b>	Difficult or impossible to evaluate with precision <i>The word imponderable is used to describe such mysteries of everyday life.</i>
<b>important</b>	Having or suggesting a consciousness of high position <i>Perhaps the most important, and the key, to the series was the narration.</i>
<b>importunate</b>	Expressing earnest entreaty <i>She is even more importunate than her boss.</i>
<b>imposing</b>	Used of a person's appearance or behavior; befitting an eminent person <i>Dunne is bombastic and imposing.</i>

<b>impossible</b>	Used of persons or their behavior <i>They had accomplished the impossible.</i>
<b>impotent</b>	Unable to copulate <i>The absence of the united states rendered the summit partially impotent.</i>
<b>impracticable</b>	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice <i>They struggled from one end to the other, but this soon became impracticable.</i>
<b>impractical</b>	Not practical or realizable; speculative <i>Huggins believed the policy was unpopular and impractical.</i>
<b>imprecise</b>	Not precise <i>The first quotation is imprecise.</i>
<b>impregnable</b>	Incapable of being overcome, challenged or refuted <i>The fort here is most impregnable.</i>
<b>impressed</b>	Deeply or markedly affected or influenced <i>I'm terribly impressed by your considerateness.</i>
<b>impressible</b>	Easily impressed or influenced <i>His researches have an impressible imprint of enlightening peep into the past.</i>
<b>impressionable</b>	Easily impressed or influenced <i>For an impressionable boy, their inspiration was incalculable.</i>
<b>impressionist</b>	Relating to or characteristic of impressionism <i>Jackson painted in an impressionist style.</i>
<b>impressionistic</b>	Relating to or characteristic of impressionism <i>His music is often described as impressionistic.</i>
<b>impressive</b>	Producing a strong effect <i>Gives an impressive of effusive melancholy.</i>
<b>improbable</b>	Not likely to be true or to occur or to have occurred <i>The content of this section seems improbable.</i>
<b>impromptu</b>	With little or no preparation or forethought <i>The rendition was completely impromptu according to him.</i>

<b>improvised</b>	Done or made using whatever is available <i>Much of the action was improvised.</i>
<b>imprudent</b>	Lacking wise self-restraint <i>You are the one who continued to insist that she is not imprudent.</i>
<b>impudent</b>	Marked by casual disrespect <i>But calling this genocide is just impudent.</i>
<b>impugnable</b>	Subject to being discredited
<b>impuissant</b>	Lacking physical strength or vigor
<b>impulsive</b>	Characterized by undue haste and lack of thought or deliberation; ('brainish' is archaic) <i>Maia is the brave, smart and often impulsive heroine.</i>

<b>inane</b>	Devoid of intelligence <i>Inane cheerleading in the sports section continued all day long.</i>
<b>inanimate</b>	Appearing dead; not breathing or having no perceptible pulse <i>The phenomenon of talking to inanimate objects is surprisingly common.</i>
