Synonyms of "Abhorrent" as an adjective (27 Words)

abominable	Unequivocally detestable. Abominable treatment of prisoners.
awful	Inspiring awe or admiration or wonder. An awful voice.
contemptible	Deserving contempt; despicable. A display of contemptible cowardice.
despicable	Morally reprehensible. A despicable crime.
despised	Treated with dislike or contempt.

detestable	Unequivocally detestable. Detestable vices.
detested	Treated with dislike or contempt.
disgusting	Arousing revulsion or strong indignation. <i>He had the most disgusting rotten teeth.</i>
distasteful	Causing dislike or aversion; disagreeable or unpleasant. <i>He found such cynicism distasteful.</i>
execrable	Unequivocally detestable. Execrable crimes.
hated	Treated with dislike or contempt.
hateful	Characterized by malice. <i>A hateful dress.</i>
heinous	(of a person or wrongful act, especially a crime) utterly odious or wicked. Heinous accusations.
horrible	Causing or likely to cause horror; shocking. <i>The tea tasted horrible.</i>
horrid	Rough; bristling. <i>A horrid beard.</i>
horrifying	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>A horrifying incident.</i>
loathsome	Causing hatred or disgust; repulsive. <i>This loathsome little swine.</i>
nauseating	Causing or liable to cause a feeling of nausea or disgust; disgusting. <i>A nauseating smell.</i>
obnoxious	Extremely unpleasant. Obnoxious odours.
obscene	Offending against moral principles; repugnant. Obscene jokes.
odious	Unequivocally detestable. Odious hypocrisy.
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>An offensive odour.</i>
repellent	Incapable of absorbing or mixing with. <i>Water repellent nylon.</i>
reprehensible	Deserving censure or condemnation. <i>His complacency and reprehensible laxity.</i>

repugnant	Extremely distasteful; unacceptable. <i>Morally repugnant customs.</i>
repulsive	Relating to repulsion between physical objects. <i>A repulsive mask.</i>
revolting	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>Revolting food.</i>

Usage Examples of "Abhorrent" as an adjective

- *Racism was abhorrent to us all.*

Associations of "Abhorrent" (30 Words)

abhor	Regard with disgust and hatred. <i>She abhors cats.</i>
abhorrence	A feeling of revulsion; disgusted loathing. <i>The thought of marrying him filled her with abhorrence.</i>
abominate	Find repugnant. <i>They abominated the very idea of monarchy.</i>
abomination	A feeling of hatred. <i>Concrete abominations masquerading as hotels.</i>
acrimony	A rough and bitter manner. <i>The AGM dissolved into acrimony.</i>
animosity	Strong hostility. <i>He no longer felt any animosity towards her.</i>
animus	(in Jungian psychology) the masculine part of a woman's personality. <i>The author s animus towards her.</i>
antipathy	A deep-seated feeling of aversion. <i>His fundamental antipathy to capitalism.</i>
aversion	A strong dislike or disinclination. <i>They made plain their aversion to the use of force.</i>
detest	Dislike intensely; feel antipathy or aversion towards. <i>She really did detest his mockery.</i>
detestation	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>He is the detestation of the neighbourhood.</i>
detested	Treated with dislike or contempt.

disgust	Fill with distaste. <i>The sight filled her with disgust.</i>
disgusting	Arousing revulsion or strong indignation. <i>He had the most disgusting rotten teeth.</i>
dislike	Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>She disliked any kind of unnecessary rudeness.</i>
displease	Make (someone) feel annoyed or dissatisfied. <i>The tone of the letter displeased him.</i>
execrate	Feel or express great loathing for. <i>They were execrated as dangerous and corrupt.</i>
execration	The object of cursing or detestation; that which is execrated.
hate	Used politely to express one's regret or embarrassment at doing something. <i>I hate Mexican food.</i>
hatred	The emotion of intense dislike; a feeling of dislike so strong that it demands action. <i>His murderous hatred of his brother.</i>
loathe	Find repugnant. <i>She loathed him on sight.</i>
loathing	A feeling of intense dislike or disgust; hatred. <i>The thought filled him with loathing.</i>
odious	Extremely unpleasant; repulsive. <i>Odious hypocrisy.</i>
odium	General or widespread hatred or disgust incurred by someone as a result of their actions. <i>He incurred widespread odium for military failures and government corruption.</i>
repellent	A chemical substance that repels animals. <i>A flea repellent.</i>
repugnant	Extremely distasteful; unacceptable. <i>A by law must not be repugnant to the general law of the country.</i>
repulsive	So extremely ugly as to be terrifying. <i>A repulsive mask.</i>
revulsion	A sense of disgust and loathing. <i>News of the attack will be met with sorrow and revulsion.</i>
scared	Fearful; frightened. <i>I m scared stiff of flying.</i>
