<b>fawning</b>	Displaying exaggerated flattery or affection; obsequious. <i><b>Fawning</b> adoration.</i>
<b>forlorn</b>	Marked by or showing hopelessness. <i>A <b>forlorn</b> attempt to escape.</i>
<b>grovelling</b>	Totally submissive. <i>His <b>grovelling</b> references to great historians.</i>
<b>hopeless</b>	Feeling or causing despair. <i>With a <b>hopeless</b> sigh he sat down.</i>
<b>humiliating</b>	Making someone feel ashamed and foolish by injuring their dignity and pride. <i>A <b>humiliating</b> defeat.</i>
<b>ingratiating</b>	Capable of winning favor. <i>An <b>ingratiating</b> manner.</i>
<b>lamentable</b>	Full of or expressing sorrow or grief. <i>A <b>lamentable</b> decision.</i>
<b>low</b>	Ranking below other people or things in importance or class. <i>The reservoir is <b>low</b>.</i>
<b>low-down</b>	Of the most contemptible kind.
<b>miserable</b>	Causing unhappiness or discomfort. <i>Their happiness made Anne feel even more <b>miserable</b>.</i>
<b>obsequious</b>	Obedient or attentive to an excessive or servile degree. <i><b>Obsequious</b> shop assistants.</i>
<b>pathetic</b>	Inspiring scornful pity- Dashiell Hammett. <i>The shabby room struck her as extraordinarily <b>pathetic</b>.</i>

<b>piteous</b>	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. A <b>piteous</b> cry.
<b>pitiable</b>	Deserving or inciting pity. <b>Pitiable</b> homeless children.
<b>pitiful</b>	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. A <b>pitiful</b> attempt to impress her.
<b>scummy</b>	Covered with scum. A <b>scummy</b> rabble.
<b>scurvy</b>	Worthless or contemptible. A <b>scurvy</b> trick.
<b>servile</b>	Submissive or fawning in attitude or behavior. The <b>servile</b> wars of Sicily.
<b>snivelling</b>	Crying and sniffing in a feeble or fretful way. Families with <b>snivelling</b> children.
<b>sorry</b>	Feeling or expressing regret or sorrow or a sense of loss over something done or undone. A <b>sorry</b> state of affairs.
<b>stark</b>	Physically strong or powerful. A <b>stark</b> landscape.
<b>submissive</b>	Abjectly submissive characteristic of a slave or servant S H Adams. A <b>submissive</b> almost sheeplike people.
<b>sycophantic</b>	Attempting to win favor from influential people by flattery. A <b>sycophantic</b> interview.

<b>contemptible</b>	Deserving of contempt or scorn. <i>A display of <b>contemptible</b> cowardice.</i>
<b><u>degraded</u></b>	Treated or regarded with contempt or disrespect. <i>She had felt cheap and <b>degraded</b>.</i>
<b>deplorable</b>	Of very poor quality or condition. <i>My finances were in a <b>deplorable</b> state.</i>
<b><u>deprived</u></b>	Suffering a severe and damaging lack of basic material and cultural benefits. <i>I was so sleep <b>deprived</b> I was bumping into walls.</i>
<b>despicable</b>	Morally reprehensible. <i>Would do something as <b>despicable</b> as murder.</i>
<b><u>disadvantaged</u></b>	(of a person or area) in unfavourable circumstances, especially with regard to financial or social opportunities. <i><b>Disadvantaged</b> groups such as the unemployed.</i>
<b><u>disgraceful</u></b>	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation- Thackeray. <i>It is <b>disgraceful</b> that they should be denied unemployment benefits.</i>
<b>dishonorable</b>	Deceptive or fraudulent; disposed to cheat or defraud or deceive. <i><b>Dishonorable</b> in thought and deed.</i>
<b>hapless</b>	(especially of a person) unfortunate. <i>The <b>hapless</b> victims of the disaster.</i>
<b><u>humiliating</u></b>	Causing awareness of your shortcomings. <i>A <b>humiliating</b> defeat.</i>
<b>ignoble</b>	Not of the nobility. <i>Of <b>ignoble</b> or ungentle birth.</i>
<b>ignominious</b>	Deserving or causing public disgrace or shame. <i>An <b>ignominious</b> retreat.</i>
<b>indigence</b>	A state of extreme poverty or destitution. <i>He did valuable work towards the relief of <b>indigence</b>.</i>
<b><u>indigent</u></b>	Poor enough to need help from others. <i>A charity for the relief of <b>indigent</b> artists.</i>

<b><u>miserable</u></b>	Causing unhappiness or discomfort. <i>He felt depressed and <b>miserable</b>.</i>
<b>neediness</b>	A state of extreme poverty. <i>He recognized her <b>neediness</b> but had no time to respond to it.</i>
<b><u>needy</u></b>	Needy people collectively. <i><b>Needy</b> and elderly people.</i>
<b>pauper</b>	A person who is very poor. <i>He died a <b>pauper</b>.</i>
<b>penury</b>	A state of extreme poverty or destitution. <i>He couldn't face another year of <b>penury</b>.</i>
<b>piteous</b>	Deserving or arousing pity. <i><b>Piteous</b> appeals for help.</i>
<b><u>pitiful</u></b>	Deserving or arousing pity. <i>A <b>pitiful</b> attempt to impress her.</i>
<b>poor</b>	People without possessions or wealth (considered as a group). <i>The jejune diets of the very <b>poor</b>.</i>
<b>privation</b>	A state in which food and other essentials for well-being are lacking. <i>Cold is the <b>privation</b> of heat.</i>
<b><u>reprehensible</u></b>	Deserving censure or condemnation. <i>His complacency and <b>reprehensible</b> laxity.</i>
<b><u>squalor</u></b>	The state of being extremely dirty and unpleasant, especially as a result of poverty or neglect. <i>They lived in <b>squalor</b> and disease.</i>
<b><u>underprivileged</u></b>	(of a person) not enjoying the same standard of living or rights as the majority of people in a society. <i>The plight of the <b>underprivileged</b>.</i>
<b><u>unfortunate</u></b>	A person who is considered immoral or lacking in religious faith or instruction, especially a prostitute. <i>Those <b>unfortunates</b> whose lives are marred by poverty.</i>
<b>unhappy</b>	Marked by or producing unhappiness. <i>The <b>unhappy</b> truth.</i>
<b>unlucky</b>	Having or bringing misfortune. <i>The visitors were <b>unlucky</b> to have a goal disallowed.</i>
<b>wretched</b>	Used to express anger or annoyance. <i>She disliked the <b>wretched</b> man intensely.</i>
