eager	(of a person's expression or tone of voice) keenly expectant or interested. <i>Eager for success.</i>
excited	Excessively affected by emotion. <i>They were excited about the prospect.</i>
<u>fervent</u>	(archaic) extremely hot, burning, or glowing. <i>A fervent admirer.</i>
<u>feverish</u>	Having or showing the symptoms of a fever. <i>A feverish cold.</i>

fiery	Very intense. <i>The sun was a fiery ball low on the hills.</i>
flaming	Passionate or violent. <i>They dragged her away from the flaming car.</i>
flashing	Shining in a bright but brief, sudden, or intermittent way. <i>A police car with a flashing light.</i>
frenzied	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i>A frenzied look in his eye.</i>
gleaming	Bright with a steady but subdued shining. <i>Gleaming black limousines.</i>
glowing	Highly enthusiastic. <i>Glowing praise.</i>
heated	Made warm or hot <i>het</i> is a dialectal variant of heated. <i>A heated argument.</i>
ignited	Set afire. <i>The ignited paper.</i>
illuminated	(of a manuscript) having pages or letters decorated by hand with gold, silver, or coloured designs. <i>A large illuminated sign.</i>
impassioned	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>An impassioned appeal.</i>
in flames	Currently fashionable.
incandescent	Extremely angry. <i>Plumes of incandescent liquid rock.</i>
incensed	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>Leonora glared back at him incensed.</i>
inflamed	(of a part of the body) red or swollen as a result of inflammation. <i>The inflamed clouds at sunset.</i>
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>The job demands intense concentration.</i>
lighted	Designed for ease of movement or to carry little weight. <i>Lighted tennis courts.</i>
lit	Very good, impressive, or exciting. <i>A lit cigarette.</i>
lit up	In readiness.
luminous	Giving off light; bright or shining. <i>Luminous intensity.</i>

lustrous	Made smooth and bright by or as if by rubbing; reflecting a sheen or glow. <i>She brushed her hair until it fell in lustrous auburn waves.</i>
passionate	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. <i>He s passionate about football.</i>
radiant	Of an appliance designed to emit radiant energy especially for cooking or heating. <i>A radiant heater.</i>
raging	Tremendous. <i>The stream could become a raging torrent in wet weather.</i>
reddened	Reddened or suffused with or as if with blood from emotion or exertion. <i>With puffy reddened eyes.</i>
shimmering	Shining with a soft, slightly wavering light. <i>The shimmering waters of Lake Como.</i>
shining	Reflecting light. <i>Shining white enamel.</i>
sparkling	Lively and witty. <i>Sparkling wine.</i>
stimulated	Emotionally aroused.

alight	Come down. <i>Visitors should alight at the Fort Road stop.</i>
blaze	Indicate by marking trees with blazes. <i>The gardens in summer are a blaze of colour.</i>
burn	An area of land cleared by burning vegetation. <i>Mark burns him by saying he hasn't even heard of the guy's agency.</i>

burning	The act of burning something. <i>The burning question of independence.</i>
choleric	(in medieval medicine) having cholera as the predominant bodily humour. <i>A choleric disposition.</i>
combustion	The process of burning something. <i>The combustion of fossil fuels.</i>

extinguish	Extinguish by crushing. <i>A look which would have extinguished any man.</i>
fervent	(archaic) extremely hot, burning, or glowing. <i>A fervent admirer.</i>
fiery	Having a passionate and quick-tempered nature. <i>A fiery desert wind.</i>
fire	Start or maintain a fire in. <i>The fire of their religious conviction.</i>
firefighter	A member of a fire department who tries to extinguish fires.
fireman	Play in which children pretend to put out a fire.
flame	Be in flames or aflame. <i>Send out an unsolicited email and you could possibly receive thousands of flames.</i>
flaming	Informal intensifiers. <i>They dragged her away from the flaming car.</i>
flare	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>Tempers flared at the meeting.</i>
glow	An alert and refreshed state. <i>The setting sun cast a deep red glow over the city.</i>
igneous	Of fire; fiery. <i>Rocks formed by igneous agents.</i>
impassioned	Filled with or showing great emotion. <i>An impassioned appeal.</i>

irascible	Having or showing a tendency to be easily angered. <i>An irascible and difficult man.</i>
macerate	Cause to waste away by fasting. <i>The fruit was allowed to macerate before fermentation.</i>
scorch	A plant disease that produces a browning or scorched appearance of plant tissues. <i>The invaders scorched the land.</i>
smoulder	Smoke coming from a smouldering fire. <i>The bonfire still smouldered the smoke drifting over the paddock.</i>
sop	Dip into liquid. <i>My agent telephones as a sop but never finds me work.</i>
stoke	Encourage or incite (a strong emotion or tendency). <i>He stoked up the barbecue.</i>
torrid	Extremely hot and dry. <i>The torrid heat of the noonday sun.</i>
