- *Filled with anger or another strong emotion.*
- *Very brightly coloured or lighted.*
- *Keenly excited (especially sexually) or indicating excitement- Bram Stoker.*

<b><u>blazing</u></b>	Shining intensely. <i>She had a <b>blazing</b> row with Eddie and stormed out.</i>
<b><u>bright</u></b>	Made smooth and bright by or as if by rubbing reflecting a sheen or glow. <i>A <b>bright</b> idea.</i>
<b>brilliant</b>	Having striking color. <i>The <b>brilliant</b> sound of the trumpets.</i>
<b><u>burning</u></b>	Very keenly or deeply felt; intense. <i>The <b>burning</b> midday sun.</i>
<b><u>dazzling</u></b>	Amazingly impressive; suggestive of the flashing of lightning. <i>A <b>dazzling</b> smile.</i>
<b>eager</b>	(of a person's expression or tone of voice) keenly expectant or interested. <i><b>Eager</b> for success.</i>
<b>excited</b>	Excessively affected by emotion. <i>They were <b>excited</b> about the prospect.</i>
<b><u>fervent</u></b>	(archaic) extremely hot, burning, or glowing. <i>A <b>fervent</b> admirer.</i>
<b><u>feverish</u></b>	Having or showing the symptoms of a fever. <i>A <b>feverish</b> cold.</i>

<b>fiery</b>	Very intense. <i>The sun was a <b>fiery</b> ball low on the hills.</i>
<b>flaming</b>	Passionate or violent. <i>They dragged her away from the <b>flaming</b> car.</i>
<b>flashing</b>	Shining in a bright but brief, sudden, or intermittent way. <i>A police car with a <b>flashing</b> light.</i>
<b>frenzied</b>	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i>A <b>frenzied</b> look in his eye.</i>
<b>gleaming</b>	Bright with a steady but subdued shining. <i><b>Gleaming</b> black limousines.</i>
<b>glowing</b>	Highly enthusiastic. <i><b>Glowing</b> praise.</i>
<b>heated</b>	Made warm or hot <i>het</i> is a dialectal variant of heated. <i>A <b>heated</b> argument.</i>
<b>ignited</b>	Set afire. <i>The <b>ignited</b> paper.</i>
<b>illuminated</b>	(of a manuscript) having pages or letters decorated by hand with gold, silver, or coloured designs. <i>A large <b>illuminated</b> sign.</i>
<b>impassioned</b>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>An <b>impassioned</b> appeal.</i>
<b>in flames</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>incandescent</b>	Extremely angry. <i>Plumes of <b>incandescent</b> liquid rock.</i>
<b>incensed</b>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>Leonora glared back at him <b>incensed</b>.</i>
<b>inflamed</b>	(of a part of the body) red or swollen as a result of inflammation. <i>The <b>inflamed</b> clouds at sunset.</i>
<b>intense</b>	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>The job demands <b>intense</b> concentration.</i>
<b>lighted</b>	Designed for ease of movement or to carry little weight. <i><b>Lighted</b> tennis courts.</i>
<b>lit</b>	Very good, impressive, or exciting. <i>A <b>lit</b> cigarette.</i>
<b>lit up</b>	In readiness.
<b>luminous</b>	Giving off light; bright or shining. <i><b>Luminous</b> intensity.</i>

<b>lustrous</b>	Made smooth and bright by or as if by rubbing; reflecting a sheen or glow. <i>She brushed her hair until it fell in <b>lustrous</b> auburn waves.</i>
<b>passionate</b>	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. <i>He s <b>passionate</b> about football.</i>
<b>radiant</b>	Of an appliance designed to emit radiant energy especially for cooking or heating. <i>A <b>radiant</b> heater.</i>
<b>raging</b>	Tremendous. <i>The stream could become a <b>raging</b> torrent in wet weather.</i>
<b>reddened</b>	Reddened or suffused with or as if with blood from emotion or exertion. <i>With puffy <b>reddened</b> eyes.</i>
<b>shimmering</b>	Shining with a soft, slightly wavering light. <i>The <b>shimmering</b> waters of Lake Como.</i>
<b>shining</b>	Reflecting light. <i><b>Shining</b> white enamel.</i>
<b>sparkling</b>	Lively and witty. <i><b>Sparkling</b> wine.</i>
<b>stimulated</b>	Emotionally aroused.

<b>alight</b>	Come down. <i>Visitors should <b>alight</b> at the Fort Road stop.</i>
<b>blaze</b>	Indicate by marking trees with blazes. <i>The gardens in summer are a <b>blaze</b> of colour.</i>
<b>burn</b>	An area of land cleared by burning vegetation. <i>Mark <b>burns</b> him by saying he hasn't even heard of the guy's agency.</i>

<b>burning</b>	The act of burning something. <i>The <b>burning</b> question of independence.</i>
<b>choleric</b>	(in medieval medicine) having cholera as the predominant bodily humour. <i>A <b>choleric</b> disposition.</i>
<b>combustion</b>	The process of burning something. <i>The <b>combustion</b> of fossil fuels.</i>
<b>conflagration</b>	A very intense and uncontrolled fire. <i>Tinder dry conditions sparked fears of a <b>conflagration</b> in many drought devastated communities.</i>
<b>douse</b>	Put out, as of a candle or a light. <i>Stewards appeared and the fire was <b>doused</b>.</i>
<b>drench</b>	Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. <i>A <b>drench</b> of sack.</i>
<b>extinguish</b>	Extinguish by crushing. <i>A look which would have <b>extinguished</b> any man.</i>
<b>fervent</b>	(archaic) extremely hot, burning, or glowing. <i>A <b>fervent</b> admirer.</i>
<b>fiery</b>	Having a passionate and quick-tempered nature. <i>A <b>fiery</b> desert wind.</i>
<b>fire</b>	Start or maintain a fire in. <i>The <b>fire</b> of their religious conviction.</i>
<b>firefighter</b>	A member of a fire department who tries to extinguish fires.
<b>fireman</b>	Play in which children pretend to put out a fire.
<b>flame</b>	Be in flames or aflame. <i>Send out an unsolicited email and you could possibly receive thousands of <b>flames</b>.</i>
<b>flaming</b>	Informal intensifiers. <i>They dragged her away from the <b>flaming</b> car.</i>
<b>flare</b>	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>Tempers <b>flared</b> at the meeting.</i>
<b>glow</b>	An alert and refreshed state. <i>The setting sun cast a deep red <b>glow</b> over the city.</i>
<b>igneous</b>	Of fire; fiery. <i>Rocks formed by <b>igneous</b> agents.</i>
<b>impassioned</b>	Filled with or showing great emotion. <i>An <b>impassioned</b> appeal.</i>



<b>irascible</b>	Having or showing a tendency to be easily angered. <i>An <b>irascible</b> and difficult man.</i>
<b>macerate</b>	Cause to waste away by fasting. <i>The fruit was allowed to <b>macerate</b> before fermentation.</i>
<b>scorch</b>	A plant disease that produces a browning or scorched appearance of plant tissues. <i>The invaders <b>scorched</b> the land.</i>
<b>smoulder</b>	Smoke coming from a smouldering fire. <i>The bonfire still <b>smouldered</b> the smoke drifting over the paddock.</i>
<b>sop</b>	Dip into liquid. <i>My agent telephones as a <b>sop</b> but never finds me work.</i>
<b>stoke</b>	Encourage or incite (a strong emotion or tendency). <i>He <b>stoked</b> up the barbecue.</i>
<b>torrid</b>	Extremely hot and dry. <i>The <b>torrid</b> heat of the noonday sun.</i>
