Synonyms of "Abominate" as a verb (21 Words)

abhor	Find repugnant. <i>He abhorred sexism in every form.</i>
be unable to abide	Happen, occur, take place.
be unable to bear	Have an existence, be extant.
despise	Feel contempt or a deep repugnance for. <i>He despises the people he has to work for.</i>
disdain	Look down on with disdain. <i>She remained standing pointedly disdaining his invitation to sit down.</i>
dislike	Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>She disliked any kind of unnecessary rudeness.</i>
execrate	Curse; swear. <i>They were execrated as dangerous and corrupt.</i>
feel animosity to	Undergo passive experience of.
feel aversion to	Undergo an emotional sensation or be in a particular state of mind.
feel disgust for	Perceive by a physical sensation, e.g., coming from the skin or muscles.
feel distaste for	Undergo passive experience of.
feel hostility to	Have a feeling or perception about oneself in reaction to someone's behavior or attitude.
feel repugnance towards	Examine by touch.
find intolerable	Make a discovery.
hate	Have a strong aversion to (something). <i>I hate Mexican food.</i>
have an aversion to	Organize or be responsible for.
loathe	Feel intense dislike or disgust for. <i>I loathe that man.</i>
recoil from	Spring back; spring away from an impact.
regard with disgust	Look at attentively.
shrink from	Reduce in size; reduce physically.
shudder at	Tremble convulsively, as from fear or excitement.

abhor	Find repugnant. <i>She abhors cats.</i>
<u>abhorrence</u>	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>The thought of marrying him filled her with abhorrence.</i>
<u>abhorrent</u>	Inspiring disgust and loathing; repugnant. <i>An abhorrent deed.</i>
abomination	A feeling of hatred. <i>A Calvinist abomination of indulgence.</i>
anathematize	Curse; condemn. <i>He anathematized them as bloody scroungers.</i>
<u>animus</u>	A feeling of ill will arousing active hostility. <i>The reformist animus came from within the Party.</i>
aversion	A feeling of intense dislike. <i>My dog s pet aversion is visitors particularly males.</i>
<u>despite</u>	Contemptuous disregard. <i>The despite in which outsiders were held is legendary.</i>
<u>detest</u>	Dislike intensely; feel antipathy or aversion towards. <i>She really did detest his mockery.</i>
detestation	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>He is the detestation of the neighbourhood.</i>
detested	Treated with contempt.
disfavor	An inclination to withhold approval from some person or group. <i>He is in disfavor with the king.</i>
dislike	Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>I know all his likes and dislikes.</i>
execrate	Curse; swear. <i>They were execrated as dangerous and corrupt.</i>
execration	Hate coupled with disgust.
halfhearted	Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm. <i>A halfhearted effort.</i>

hate	Used politely to express one's regret or embarrassment at doing something. <i>The boys hate each other.</i>
hateful	Very unpleasant. <i>A hateful thing to do.</i>
loathe	Find repugnant. <i>She loathed him on sight.</i>
loathing	A feeling of intense dislike or disgust; hatred. <i>The thought filled him with loathing.</i>
misanthrope	Someone who dislikes people in general. <i>Scrooge wasn't the mean spirited misanthrope most of us believe him to be.</i>
misanthropic	Hating mankind in general. <i>With his misanthropic outlook he was an ugly character.</i>
misanthropy	A dislike of humankind. <i>The streak of misanthropy in his nature.</i>
nauseating	Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>A nauseating smell.</i>
odious	Extremely unpleasant; repulsive. <i>Consequences odious to those you govern.</i>
odium	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>He incurred widespread odium for military failures and government corruption.</i>
reluctance	(physics) opposition to magnetic flux (analogous to electric resistance). <i>A reluctance to commit himself.</i>
reluctant	Unwillingness to do something contrary to your custom. <i>She seemed reluctant to answer.</i>
repulsive	So extremely ugly as to be terrifying. <i>The most repulsive character in recent novels.</i>
unwilling	Not ready, eager, or prepared to do something. <i>An unwilling smile.</i>
