## Synonyms of "Abominate" as a verb (21 Words)

<b>abhor</b>	Find repugnant. <i>He <b>abhorred</b> sexism in every form.</i>
<b>be unable to abide</b>	Happen, occur, take place.
<b>be unable to bear</b>	Have an existence, be extant.
<b>despise</b>	Feel contempt or a deep repugnance for. <i>He <b>despises</b> the people he has to work for.</i>
<b>disdain</b>	Look down on with disdain. <i>She remained standing pointedly <b>disdaining</b> his invitation to sit down.</i>
<b>dislike</b>	Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>She <b>disliked</b> any kind of unnecessary rudeness.</i>
<b>execrate</b>	Curse; swear. <i>They were <b>execrated</b> as dangerous and corrupt.</i>
<b>feel animosity to</b>	Undergo passive experience of.
<b>feel aversion to</b>	Undergo an emotional sensation or be in a particular state of mind.
<b>feel disgust for</b>	Perceive by a physical sensation, e.g., coming from the skin or muscles.
<b>feel distaste for</b>	Undergo passive experience of.
<b>feel hostility to</b>	Have a feeling or perception about oneself in reaction to someone's behavior or attitude.
<b>feel repugnance towards</b>	Examine by touch.
<b>find intolerable</b>	Make a discovery.
<b>hate</b>	Have a strong aversion to (something). <i>I <b>hate</b> Mexican food.</i>
<b>have an aversion to</b>	Organize or be responsible for.
<b>loathe</b>	Feel intense dislike or disgust for. <i>I <b>loathe</b> that man.</i>
<b>recoil from</b>	Spring back; spring away from an impact.
<b>regard with disgust</b>	Look at attentively.
<b>shrink from</b>	Reduce in size; reduce physically.
<b>shudder at</b>	Tremble convulsively, as from fear or excitement.

<b>abhor</b>	Find repugnant. <i>She <b>abhors</b> cats.</i>
<b><u>abhorrence</u></b>	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>The thought of marrying him filled her with <b>abhorrence</b>.</i>
<b><u>abhorrent</u></b>	Inspiring disgust and loathing; repugnant. <i>An <b>abhorrent</b> deed.</i>
<b>abomination</b>	A feeling of hatred. <i>A Calvinist <b>abomination</b> of indulgence.</i>
<b>anathematize</b>	Curse; condemn. <i>He <b>anathematized</b> them as bloody scroungers.</i>
<b><u>animus</u></b>	A feeling of ill will arousing active hostility. <i>The reformist <b>animus</b> came from within the Party.</i>
<b>aversion</b>	A feeling of intense dislike. <i>My dog s pet <b>aversion</b> is visitors particularly males.</i>
<b><u>despite</u></b>	Contemptuous disregard. <i>The <b>despite</b> in which outsiders were held is legendary.</i>
<b><u>detest</u></b>	Dislike intensely; feel antipathy or aversion towards. <i>She really did <b>detest</b> his mockery.</i>
<b>detestation</b>	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>He is the <b>detestation</b> of the neighbourhood.</i>
<b>detested</b>	Treated with contempt.
<b>disfavor</b>	An inclination to withhold approval from some person or group. <i>He is in <b>disfavor</b> with the king.</i>
<b>dislike</b>	Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>I know all his likes and <b>dislikes</b>.</i>
<b>execrate</b>	Curse; swear. <i>They were <b>execrated</b> as dangerous and corrupt.</i>
<b>execration</b>	Hate coupled with disgust.
<b>halfhearted</b>	Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm. <i>A <b>halfhearted</b> effort.</i>

<b>hate</b>	Used politely to express one's regret or embarrassment at doing something. <i>The boys <b>hate</b> each other.</i>
<b>hateful</b>	Very unpleasant. <i>A <b>hateful</b> thing to do.</i>
<b>loathe</b>	Find repugnant. <i>She <b>loathed</b> him on sight.</i>
<b>loathing</b>	A feeling of intense dislike or disgust; hatred. <i>The thought filled him with <b>loathing</b>.</i>
<b>misanthrope</b>	Someone who dislikes people in general. <i>Scrooge wasn't the mean spirited <b>misanthrope</b> most of us believe him to be.</i>
<b>misanthropic</b>	Hating mankind in general. <i>With his <b>misanthropic</b> outlook he was an ugly character.</i>
<b>misanthropy</b>	A dislike of humankind. <i>The streak of <b>misanthropy</b> in his nature.</i>
<b>nauseating</b>	Causing or able to cause nausea. <i>A <b>nauseating</b> smell.</i>
<b>odious</b>	Extremely unpleasant; repulsive. <i>Consequences <b>odious</b> to those you govern.</i>
<b>odium</b>	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>He incurred widespread <b>odium</b> for military failures and government corruption.</i>
<b>reluctance</b>	(physics) opposition to magnetic flux (analogous to electric resistance). <i>A <b>reluctance</b> to commit himself.</i>
<b>reluctant</b>	Unwillingness to do something contrary to your custom. <i>She seemed <b>reluctant</b> to answer.</i>
<b>repulsive</b>	So extremely ugly as to be terrifying. <i>The most <b>repulsive</b> character in recent novels.</i>
<b>unwilling</b>	Not ready, eager, or prepared to do something. <i>An <b>unwilling</b> smile.</i>
