Definitions of "Absolute" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “absolute” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not qualified or diminished in any way; total.*
- *(of powers or rights) not subject to any limitation; unconditional.*
- *Perfect or complete or pure.*
- *Expressing finality with no implication of possible change.*
- *Used for emphasis when expressing an opinion.*
- *(of a decree) final.*
- *(of a transitive verb) used without an expressed object (e.g. guns kill).*
- *Not limited by law.*
- *(of a construction) syntactically independent of the rest of the sentence, as in dinner*

- *Complete and without restriction or qualification; sometimes used informally as intensifiers.*
- *Not capable of being violated or infringed.*
- *(of an adjective) used without an expressed noun (e.g. the brave).*
- *(of a ruler) having unrestricted power.*

conclusive	(of a victory) achieved easily or by a large margin. <i>A conclusive 5 0 win.</i>
confirmed	(of a person) firmly established in a particular habit, belief, or way of life and unlikely to change their ways. <i>A confirmed Catholic.</i>
decided	(of a person) having clear opinions; resolute. <i>He quotes from decided cases.</i>
<u>decisive</u>	Characterized by decision and firmness. <i>He handled the situation in a calm decisive way.</i>
<u>definite</u>	Precise; explicit and clearly defined. <i>A definite statement of the terms of the will.</i>
despotic	Of or typical of a despot; tyrannical. <i>Moved from a feudal to a despotic order.</i>
dictatorial	Having or showing an autocratic manner. <i>A dictatorial rule that lasted for the duration of the war.</i>
domineering	Asserting one's will over another in an arrogant way. <i>How can I do my job with a domineering boss yelling in my ear.</i>

downright	Complete and without restriction or qualification; sometimes used informally as intensifiers. <i>A downright answer.</i>
draconian	(of laws or their application) excessively harsh and severe. <i>The Nazis destroyed the independence of the press by a series of draconian laws.</i>
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>An ideological system with which he is in entire agreement.</i>
fixed	Fixed and unmoving Connor Cruise O'Brien. <i>A fixed resistor.</i>
full	Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. <i>She could only nod for her mouth was full.</i>
high-handed	Given to haughty disregard of others.
imperious	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His imperious demands.</i>
independent	(of political bodies) not controlled by outside forces. <i>Independent television.</i>
infallible	Incapable of making mistakes or being wrong. <i>For an encyclical to be infallible the Pope must speak ex cathedra.</i>
<u>infinite</u>	(of verbs) not having tense, person, or number (as a participle or gerund or infinitive). <i>He bathed the wound with infinite care.</i>
infrangible	Not capable of being violated or infringed. <i>An infrangible series.</i>
inviolable	Must be kept sacred. <i>Fortifications that made the frontier inviolable.</i>
<u>manifest</u>	Clear or obvious to the eye or mind. <i>Manifest disapproval.</i>
omnipotent	(of a deity) having unlimited power. <i>An omnipotent sovereign.</i>
out-and-out	Out of power; especially having been unsuccessful in an election.
<u>outright</u>	Open and direct. <i>An outright refusal.</i>

perfect	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <i>With a little help you can create a room that is perfect for you.</i>
positive	Having a positive charge. Positive laws.
<u>pure</u>	Being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i>The jacket was pure wool.</i>
rank	Conspicuously and outrageously bad or reprehensible. Rank earth.
right-down	Complete and without restriction or qualification; sometimes used informally as intensifiers.
<u>sheer</u>	Nothing other than; unmitigated (used for emphasis). <i>It s been sheer hard work.</i>
<u>sovereign</u>	Possessing royal power and status. <i>Our most sovereign lord the King.</i>
supreme	Final or last in your life or progress. Supreme folly.
<u>total</u>	Constituting the full quantity or extent; complete. <i>A total cost of 4 000.</i>
<u>tyrannical</u>	Characteristic of an absolute ruler or absolute rule; having absolute sovereignty. <i>A tyrannical parent.</i>
tyrannous	(of a government or ruler) exercising power in a cruel or arbitrary way. <i>A tyrannous disregard for the welfare of the workers.</i>
ultimate	Basic or fundamental. <i>Man s ultimate destiny.</i>
unbound	Not bound or tied up. <i>Other copies were sold in the form of unbound printed sheets.</i>
<u>unbounded</u>	Seemingly boundless in amount, number, degree, or especially extent. <i>The possibilities are unbounded.</i>
<u>unconditional</u>	Not conditional. Unconditional surrender.
undoubted	Not questioned or doubted by anyone. <i>Her undoubted ability.</i>

Clearly defined or formulated.
An **unequivocal** or *univocal* statement.

universal

(of a tool or machine) adjustable to or appropriate for all requirements.
The incidents caused **universal** concern.

unlimited

Without reservation or exception.
Offshore reserves of gas and oil are not **unlimited**.

unquestionable

Not able to be disputed or doubted.
His musicianship is **unquestionable**.

unrestrained

Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion.
A display of **unrestrained** delight.

unrestricted

Not restricted or modified in meaning.
I had **unrestricted** access.

utter

Complete.
Charlotte stared at her in **utter** amazement.

infertile	Incapable of reproducing. <i>An infertile couple.</i>
knavery	Lack of honesty; acts of lying or cheating or stealing.
perfect	Make perfect or complete. <i>Life certainly isn't perfect at the moment.</i>
perfectly	In a perfect or faultless way. <i>You know perfectly well I can't stay.</i>

<u>sheer</u>	Cause to sheer. <i>The sheer ice walls.</i>
<u>staring</u>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>Stark staring mad.</i>
<u>stark</u>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>A stark interior.</i>
<u>sure</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>It s going to be a good day for sure.</i>
thoroughgoing	Performed comprehensively and completely; not superficial or partial. <i>Thoroughgoing research.</i>
<u>totally</u>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’). <i>They came from totally different backgrounds.</i>
<u>unadulterated</u>	Not mixed with impurities. <i>Pure unadulterated jealousy.</i>
<u>unconditional</u>	Not conditional. <i>Unconditional surrender.</i>
<u>unmitigated</u>	Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier. <i>The tour had been an unmitigated disaster.</i>
unmixed	Not mixed with extraneous elements. <i>Not an unmixed blessing.</i>
<u>utter</u>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>Utter seriousness.</i>
<u>verity</u>	An enduring or necessary ethical or religious or aesthetic truth. <i>Irrefutable objective verity.</i>
<u>vested</u>	Fixed and absolute and without contingency. <i>A vested right.</i>
