
### Absorbent as a Noun

- (of a material) able to soak up liquid easily.





## Synonyms of "Absorbent" as an adjective (9 Words)

absorptive	Having power or capacity or tendency to absorb or soak up something (liquids or energy etc. <i>Material having a high absorptive capacity.</i>
assimilative	Capable of taking (gas, light, or liquids) into a solution. Assimilative capacity of the human mind.
penetrable	Possible to understand; understandable. <i>The outer membrane is <b>penetrable</b></i> .
permeable	(of a material or membrane) allowing liquids or gases to pass through it. <i>A frog s skin is <b>permeable</b> to water.</i>
pervious	Admitting of passage or entrance. <i>Pervious</i> soil.
porous	Not retentive or secure. <i>He ran through a <b>porous</b> home defence to score easily.</i>




<u>receptive</u>	Willing to consider or accept new suggestions and ideas. <i>The institution was <b>receptive</b> to new ideas.</i>
soaking	Extremely wet; wet through. <i>His jacket was <b>soaking</b>.</i>
spongy	(chiefly of a motor vehicle's braking system) lacking firmness. <b>Spongy</b> platinum.

# Associations of "Absorbent" (30 Words)

A region with a particular climate. <i>He had grown up in a hot climate.</i>
Damp air or atmosphere. He <b>damp</b> ed down the fire for the night.
The state or condition of being slightly wet. <i>The dampness in the air.</i>
Unpleasantly cool and humid. <b>Dank</b> rain forests.
Drench or submerge or be drenched or submerged. The war <b>drench</b> ed the country in blood.
Abundantly covered or supplied with; often used in combination. <b>Drenched</b> in moonlight.
Full of or characterized by fog. My memories of the event are <b>foggy</b> .
Marked by a relatively high level of water vapour in the atmosphere. <i>Humid</i> air.
A quantity representing the amount of water vapour in the atmosphere or in a gas. The <b>humidity</b> should be supplied by regularly spraying the leaves.
An impenetrable equatorial forest. It s a <b>jungle</b> out there.
Draw blood. He s <b>leech</b> ing off the abilities of others.
Land consisting of marshes. Marshland landscapes.
Characteristic of or resembling a marsh; waterlogged. The <b>marshy</b> ground towards the sea.
Filled or abounding with fog or mist. The evening was cold and <b>misty</b> .
Marked by a fluid discharge. Her brother s eyes became <b>moist</b> .
Wetness caused by water. In freshly felled wood the <b>moisture</b> content varies.
Make (something, especially the skin) less dry. <i>Revitalize your face <b>moisturize</b> your skin.</i>



<u>quagmire</u>	A soft wet area of low-lying land that sinks underfoot. Torrential rain turned the building site into a <b>quagmire</b> .
rain	Of the sky the clouds etc send down rain. <i>He fell under the <b>rain</b> of blows.</i>
rainy	Wet by periods of rain. <b>Rainy</b> days.
<u>receptive</u>	Of a nerve fiber or impulse originating outside and passing toward the central nervous system. The institution was <b>receptive</b> to new ideas.
<u>saturated</u>	Denoting fats containing a high proportion of fatty acid molecules without double bonds considered to be less healthy in the diet than unsaturated fats. <i>Soybeans are low in <b>saturated</b> fats and sodium.</i>
soggy	Having the consistency of dough because of insufficient leavening or improper cooking. <i>We squelched through the <b>soggy</b> ground.</i>
sponge	Gather sponges in the ocean. The gateau is made with moist <b>sponge</b> .
<u>swamp</u>	An area of low-lying, uncultivated ground where water collects; a bog or marsh. <i>The country was <b>swamp</b>ed with goods from abroad</i> .
swampy	(of soil) soft and watery. A <b>swampy</b> area.
<u>thirsty</u>	Needing moisture. A huge <b>thirsty</b> 5 3 litre engine.
tropics	The part of the Earth's surface between the Tropic of Cancer and the Tropic of Capricorn; characterized by a hot climate.
vapor	The process of becoming a vapor.
<u>wet</u>	Cause to become wet. She said she d <b>wet</b> the tea immediately because they must be parched.
