## Academy as a Noun

### Definitions of "Academy" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “academy” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A place of study or training in a special field.*
- *The teaching school founded by Plato.*
- *A society or institution of distinguished scholars and artists or scientists that aims to promote and maintain standards in its particular field.*
- *A learned establishment for the advancement of knowledge.*
- *A school for special training.*
- *A secondary school, in the US typically a private one.*
- *A secondary school (usually private).*
- *A place of study.*
- *An institution for the advancement of art or science or literature.*
- *(in England) an inner-city school which is funded by the government and sometimes also by a private individual or organization but is not controlled by the local authority.*

<b>centre</b>	The object upon which interest and attention focuses. <i>A new <b>centre</b> party.</i>
<b>centre of learning</b>	The cognitive process of acquiring skill or knowledge.
<b>establishment</b>	A business organization, public institution, or household. <i>She became an <b>establishment</b> figure.</i>
<b>foundation</b>	The action of establishing an institution or organization. <i>Apply moisturizer a few minutes before using <b>foundation</b>.</i>
<b>institution</b>	An organization founded and united for a specific purpose. <i>The <b>institution</b> of marriage.</i>
<b>organization</b>	The act of forming or establishing something. <i>A research <b>organization</b>.</i>
<b>training establishment</b>	Activity leading to skilled behavior.

- *Mark left St Andrews Academy with five highers, and studied maths at Glasgow University.*



## Associations of "Academy" (30 Words)

<b><u>absenteeism</u></b>	Habitual absence from work. <i>High levels of <b>absenteeism</b> caused by low job motivation.</i>
<b>attendance</b>	The act of being present (at a meeting or event etc). <i>My <b>attendance</b> at church was very patchy.</i>
<b>bursar</b>	A student who holds a bursary.
<b><u>campus</u></b>	The grounds and buildings of a university or college. <i>For the first year I had a room on <b>campus</b>.</i>
<b>college</b>	The body of faculty and students of a college. <i><b>Colleges</b> of further education.</i>
<b>diploma</b>	A certificate awarded by an educational establishment to show that someone has successfully completed a course of study.
<b><u>dorm</u></b>	A dormitory.

<b>educate</b>	Create by training and teaching. <i>She was <b>educated</b> at a boarding school.</i>
<b>educator</b>	Someone who educates young people. <i>The perspective of a professional <b>educator</b>.</i>
<b>enrol</b>	Recruit (someone) to perform a service. <i>He <b>enrolled</b> in drama school.</i>
<b>enrollment</b>	The act of enrolling.
<b>grad</b>	One-hundredth of a right angle.
<b>graduation</b>	The act of arranging in grades. <i>The ruler had 16 <b>graduations</b> per inch.</i>
<b>headmaster</b>	Presiding officer of a school.
<b>homeroom</b>	A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes.
<b>matriculate</b>	A person who has matriculated. <i>The arms have been <b>matriculated</b> by the Lord Lyon King of Arms in Edinburgh.</i>
<b>pedagogics</b>	The principles and methods of instruction.
<b>pedagogy</b>	The method and practice of teaching, especially as an academic subject or theoretical concept. <i>The relationship between applied linguistics and language <b>pedagogy</b>.</i>
<b>polytechnic</b>	An institution of higher education offering courses at degree level or below, especially in vocational subjects.
<b>pupil</b>	A person who is taught by another, especially a schoolchild or student in relation to a teacher. <i>They are former <b>pupils</b> of the school.</i>
<b>schooling</b>	The process of being formally educated at a school. <i><b>Schooling</b> fences.</i>
<b>schoolmaster</b>	An experienced horse that is used to train or give confidence to inexperienced riders or horses.
<b>semester</b>	One of two divisions of an academic year. <i>The opening week of Harvard s autumn <b>semester</b>.</i>
<b>studying</b>	Reading carefully with intent to remember.
<b>teach</b>	Work as a teacher. <i>He came one day each week to <b>teach</b> painting.</i>
<b>teaching</b>	The profession of a teacher. <i>I went into <b>teaching</b> because I like working with children.</i>

**trainee** A person undergoing training for a particular job or profession.  
*Trainee solicitors.*

**undergraduate** Denoting or relating to an undergraduate.  
*A group of Oxford **undergraduates**.*

**university** The body of faculty and students at a university.  
*I went to **university** at the Sorbonne.*

**valedictorian** The student with the best grades who usually delivers the valedictory address at commencement.
