<b>agree to</b>	Consent or assent to a condition or agree to do something.
<b>allow</b>	Allow or plan for a certain possibility concede the truth or validity of something. <i>The evidence <b>allows</b> only one conclusion.</i>
<b>assent</b>	Express approval or agreement. <i>The Prime Minister <b>assented</b> to the change.</i>
<b>assent to</b>	To agree or express agreement.
<b><u>assume</u></b>	Occupy or take on. <i>He <b>assumed</b> full responsibility for all organizational work.</i>
<b><u>attain</u></b>	Reach a point in time, or a certain state or level. <i>Dolphins can <b>attain</b> speeds in water which man cannot yet emulate.</i>
<b>be elevated to</b>	Be identical or equivalent to.
<b>become a member of</b>	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
<b>become a party to</b>	Come into existence.
<b>become party to</b>	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
<b><u>bow</u></b>	Play on a stringed instrument with a bow. <i>She <b>bowed</b> her head in shame.</i>
<b>come into</b>	Add up in number or quantity.
<b>come to</b>	Come to pass arrive as in due course.
<b>comply with</b>	Act in accordance with someone's rules, commands, or wishes.
<b>concur with</b>	Happen simultaneously.
<b>consent to</b>	Give an affirmative reply to; respond favorably to.
<b>defer</b>	Postpone the conscription of (someone). <i>They <b>deferred</b> the decision until February.</i>
<b>defer to</b>	Hold back to a later time.
<b>endorse</b>	Guarantee as meeting a certain standard. <i>A further 500 000 had been <b>endorsed</b> out of urban areas under the pass laws.</i>
<b>enrol in</b>	Register formally as a participant or member.
<b>enter</b>	Set out on an enterprise or subject of study. <i>He <b>entered</b> the army as a cadet.</i>
<b>give in</b>	Manifest or show.

<b>give in to</b>	Give or supply.
<b>give way to</b>	Convey or communicate; of a smile, a look, a physical gesture.
<b>go along with</b>	Give support (to) or make a choice (of) one out of a group or number.
<b>grant</b>	Let have. <b>Grant</b> permission.
<b><u>inherit</u></b>	Obtain from someone after their death. <i>Master what must I do to <b>inherit</b> eternal life.</i>
<b>join</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>I <b>joined</b> the demonstration.</i>
<b>recognize</b>	Be fully aware or cognizant of. <i>Dr Friedman is programming his computer to <b>recognize</b> the shapes of strokes in the hands of various writers.</i>
<b>sign up to</b>	Engage by written agreement.
<b><u>submit</u></b>	Subject to a particular process, treatment, or condition. <i>The panel s report was <b>submitted</b> to a parliamentary committee.</i>
<b>succeed to</b>	Be the successor (of).
<b>surrender to</b>	Give up or agree to forgo to the power or possession of another.
<b>take over</b>	Develop a habit.
<b>yield to</b>	Give or supply.

## Usage Examples of "Accede" as a verb

- *Albania acceded to the IMF in 1990.*
- *He acceded to the post of director in September.*
- *The authorities did not accede to the strikers' demands.*
- *Elizabeth I acceded to the throne in 1558.*
- *By now John had died and Henry III had acceded.*
- *Accede to the throne.*
- *I found myself with little choice but to accede.*

## Associations of "Accede" (30 Words)

<b>accept</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>People did not <b>accept</b> atonal music at that time.</i>
<b>acceptance</b>	A draft or bill of exchange that is accepted by being signed. <i>He anticipated their <b>acceptance</b> of his offer.</i>

<b><u>accord</u></b>	An official agreement or treaty. <i>His views <b>accorded</b> well with those of Merivale.</i>
<b>acknowledge</b>	Express gratitude for or appreciation of. <i>The art world has begun to <b>acknowledge</b> his genius.</i>
<b>acquiesce</b>	Accept something reluctantly but without protest. <i>Sara <b>acquiesced</b> in his decision.</i>
<b>acquiescence</b>	The reluctant acceptance of something without protest. <i>In silent <b>acquiescence</b> she rose to her feet.</i>
<b>acquiescent</b>	Ready to accept something without protest, or to do what someone else wants. <i>Too <b>acquiescent</b> to challenge authority.</i>
<b>admittedly</b>	Used to express a concession or recognition that something is the case. <i><b>Admittedly</b> the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<b><u>affirmative</u></b>	Expressing or manifesting praise or approval. <i>Regulations under the Bill would be subject to the <b>affirmative</b> procedure.</i>
<b><u>agree</u></b>	Be in accord be in agreement. <i>We both <b>agreed</b> on issues such as tougher penalties for criminals.</i>
<b><u>agreed</u></b>	(of two or more parties) holding the same view or opinion on something. <i>We are <b>agreed</b> that what is needed is a catchy title.</i>
<b><u>approbation</u></b>	Official approval. <i>A term of <b>approbation</b>.</i>
<b>approval</b>	Acceptance as satisfactory. <i>They have delayed the launch to await project <b>approvals</b>.</i>
<b>approve</b>	Believe that someone or something is good or acceptable. <i>They would not <b>approve</b>.</i>
<b>approving</b>	The formal act of approving. <i>The wine drew <b>approving</b> comments from across the table.</i>
<b>assent</b>	Official agreement or sanction. <i>The Prime Minister <b>assented</b> to the change.</i>
<b><u>coincide</u></b>	Correspond in position; meet. <i>The two long distance walks briefly <b>coincide</b> here.</i>
<b>comply</b>	(of an article) meet specified standards. <i>All second hand furniture must <b>comply</b> with the new regulations.</i>
<b><u>concord</u></b>	Arrange the words of a text so as to create a concordance. <i>Their ideas <b>concorded</b>.</i>
<b>concur</b>	Agree with (a decision or opinion). <i>The authors <b>concurred</b> with the majority.</i>

<b><u>conform</u></b>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The kitchen does not <b>conform</b> to hygiene regulations.</i>
<b>conformance</b>	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i><b>Conformance</b> to international standards.</i>
<b>conforming</b>	Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion).
<b><u>consensus</u></b>	Agreement in the judgment or opinion reached by a group as a whole. <i>There is a growing <b>consensus</b> that the current regime has failed.</i>
<b><u>consent</u></b>	Permission to do something. <i>No change may be made without the <b>consent</b> of all the partners.</i>
<b><u>correspond</u></b>	Be analogous or equivalent in character, form, or function. <i>My Russian pen pal and I have been <b>corresponding</b> for several years.</i>
<b>ok</b>	An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence. <i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>
<b>permission</b>	The action of officially allowing someone to do a particular thing; consent or authorization. <i>He asked <b>permission</b> to leave.</i>
<b>unanimity</b>	Agreement by all people involved; consensus. <i>There is almost complete <b>unanimity</b> on this issue.</i>
<b><u>yes</u></b>	An affirmative. <i>I was hoping for a <b>yes</b>.</i>
