- *Increase in rate, amount, or extent.*

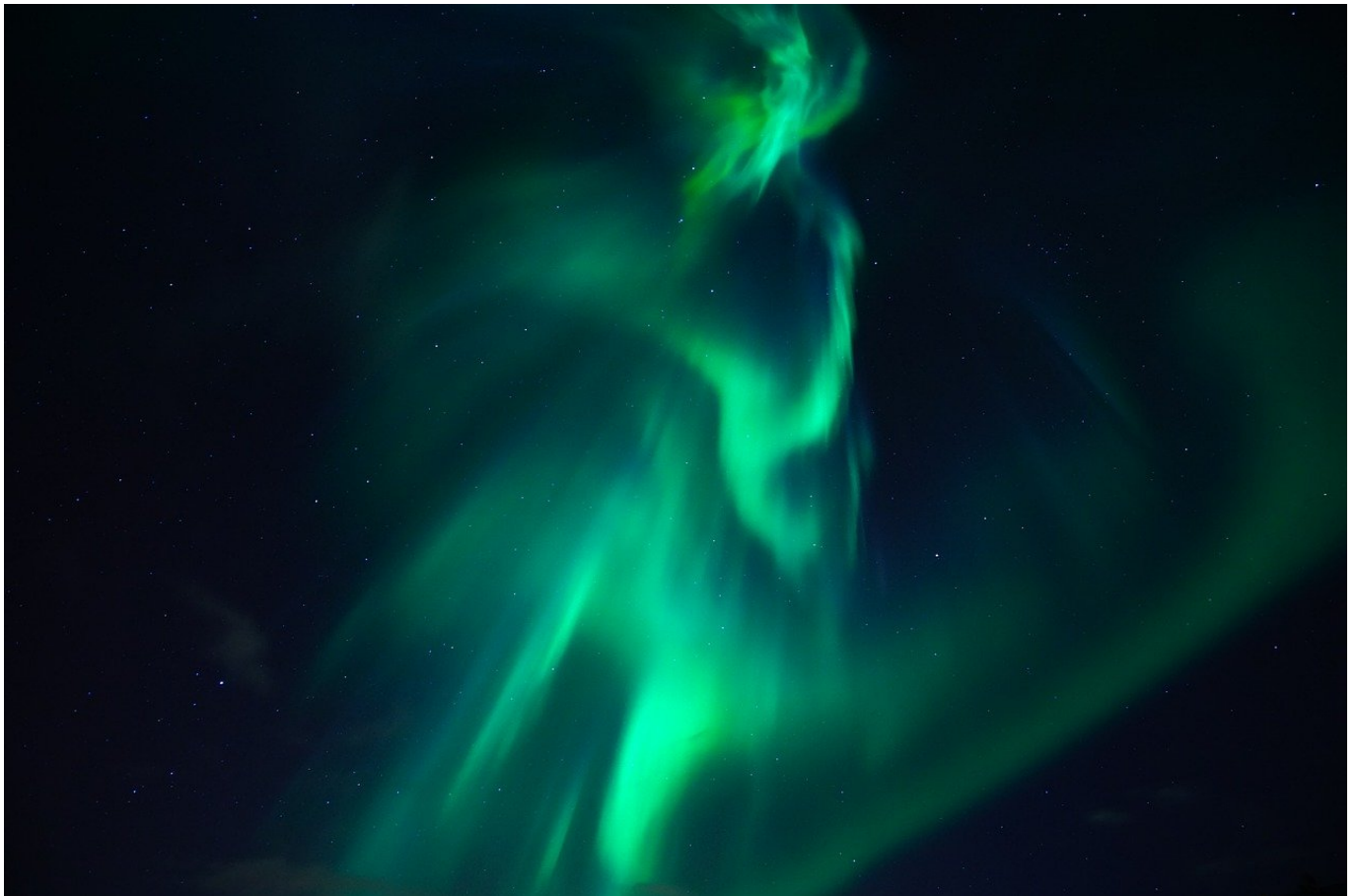


## Synonyms of "Accelerate" as a verb (36 Words)

<b>boost</b>	Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>A range of measures to <b>boost</b> tourism.</i>
<b>drive faster</b>	Move by being propelled by a force.
<b>escalate</b>	Increase in extent or intensity. <i>The disturbance <b>escalated</b> into a full scale riot.</i>
<b>expedite</b>	Process fast and efficiently. <i>He promised to <b>expedite</b> economic reforms.</i>
<b>forward</b>	Send (a letter or email) on to a further destination. <i>We will <b>forward</b> the parcels to you anywhere in the world.</i>
<b>further</b>	Contribute to the progress or growth of. <i>He had depended on using them to <b>further</b> his own career.</i>
<b>gain momentum</b>	Derive a benefit from.

<b>gather speed</b>	Assemble or get together.
<b>get a move on</b>	Make children.
<b>get faster</b>	Overcome or destroy.
<b>get worse</b>	Suffer from the receipt of.
<b>give a boost to</b>	Propose.
<b>go faster</b>	Change location; move, travel, or proceed, also metaphorically.
<b>go up</b>	Stretch out over a distance, space, time, or scope; run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point.
<b>hasten</b>	Cause to occur rapidly. <i>This tragedy probably <b>hastened</b> his own death from heart disease.</i>
<b>hurry up</b>	Move very fast.
<b>increase</b>	Make bigger or more. <i>The amount of work <b>increased</b>.</i>
<b>increase speed</b>	Make bigger or more.
<b>leap</b>	Move forward by leaps and bounds. <i>Everybody <b>leapt</b> into action.</i>
<b>make faster</b>	Prepare for eating by applying heat.
<b>move faster</b>	Change residence, affiliation, or place of employment.
<b>open it up</b>	Become open.
<b>pick up speed</b>	Provoke.
<b>precipitate</b>	Send someone or something suddenly into a particular state or condition. <i>Our economy <b>precipitated</b> into complete ruin.</i>
<b>promote</b>	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>They are using famous personalities to <b>promote</b> the library nationally.</i>
<b>put on a spurt</b>	Arrange thoughts, ideas, temporal events.
<b>quicken</b>	(of a fetus) begin to show signs of life. <i>The fetus <b>quicken</b>ed.</i>
<b>rise</b>	Rise to one s feet. <i>The dead are to <b>uprise</b>.</i>
<b>speed</b>	Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit. <i>More kids than ever are <b>speeding</b> tripping and getting stoned.</i>
<b>speed up</b>	Move very fast.
<b>spiral</b>	Form a spiral. <i><b>Spiral</b> the bandage round the limb.</i>

<b>spur on</b>	Incite or stimulate.
<b>step up</b>	Treat badly.
<b>stimulate</b>	Encourage development of or increased activity in (a state or process). <i>Coffee and tea <b>stimulate</b> me.</i>
<u><b>surge</b></u>	Rise and move, as in waves or billows. <i>The army <b>surged</b> forward.</i>

The act of implementing the control of equipment with advanced technology; usually involving electronic hardware.

*The **automation** of office tasks.*

### **civilization**

A society in an advanced state of social development (e.g., with complex legal and political and religious organizations).

*The great books of Western **civilization**.*

### **commercialization**

The process of managing or running something principally for financial gain.

*Both companies will retain control over the **commercialization** of their own products.*

### **decelerate**

Reduce the speed of.

*The car **decelerated**.*

<b>develop</b>	Cause to grow and differentiate in ways conforming to its natural development. <i>The company <b>developed</b> a chain of hotels.</i>
<b>expedite</b>	Make (an action or process) happen sooner or be accomplished more quickly. <i>This should <b>expedite</b> the process.</i>
<b><u>globalization</u></b>	The process by which businesses or other organizations develop international influence or start operating on an international scale. <i>The <b>globalization</b> of the communication industry.</i>
<b>hasten</b>	Move or travel hurriedly. <i>He <b>hastened</b> to refute the assertion.</i>
<b>hie</b>	Go quickly. <i>I <b>hied</b> down to New Orleans.</i>
<b>hurry</b>	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. <i><b>Hurry</b> it s late.</i>
<b><u>industrialization</u></b>	The development of industries in a country or region on a wide scale. <i>These developing countries have undergone rapid <b>industrialization</b>.</i>
<b>industrialize</b>	(of a country or region) build up a system of industries. <i>The country needs to <b>industrialize</b> to create both exports and jobs.</i>
<b>liberalize</b>	Make liberal or more liberal, of laws and rules. <i>The laws <b>liberalized</b> after Prohibition.</i>
<b>mechanization</b>	The process of supplying a military force with modern weapons and vehicles. <i>The letters and pictures form part of an exhibition at the museum charting the history of the British Army s <b>mechanization</b>.</i>
<b>modernity</b>	The quality or condition of being modern. <i>An aura of technological <b>modernity</b>.</i>
<b>modernization</b>	The process of adapting something to modern needs or habits. <i>The <b>modernization</b> of Nigeria will be a long process.</i>
<b><u>modernize</u></b>	Become technologically advanced. <i>He <b>modernized</b> the health service.</i>
<b><u>proceed</u></b>	Begin a course of action. <i>His claim that all power <b>proceeded</b> from God.</i>
<b>processing</b>	Preparing or putting through a prescribed procedure. <i>The <b>processing</b> of newly arrived immigrants.</i>
<b>productivity</b>	The rate of production of new biomass by an individual, population, or community; the fertility or capacity of a given habitat or area. <i>Nutrient rich waters with high primary <b>productivity</b>.</i>

<b><u>progression</u></b>	A series with a definite pattern of advance. <i>A blues <b>progression</b>.</i>
<b>quicken</b>	Make or become faster or quicker. <i>The fetus <b>quicken</b>ed.</i>
<b>redecorate</b>	Apply paint or wallpaper in (a room or building) again, typically differently. <i>You will have to <b>redecorate</b> the room afterwards.</i>
<b><u>simplify</u></b>	Make (something) simpler or easier to do or understand. <i>An overhaul of court procedure to <b>simplify</b> litigation.</i>
<b>sophisticate</b>	Sophisticated. <i>A <b>sophisticated</b> design.</i>
<b><u>speed</u></b>	Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit. <i>Oak tables and chairs are more his <b>speed</b>.</i>
<b><u>surge</u></b>	A sudden forceful flow. <i>Shares <b>surged</b> to a record high.</i>
<b><u>upgrade</u></b>	A reservation that is improved. <i>I got an <b>upgrade</b> to first class when coach class was full.</i>
<b><u>urbanization</u></b>	The social process whereby cities grow and societies become more urban. <i>Public opposition to the <b>urbanization</b> of the countryside.</i>
<b>westernization</b>	Assimilation of Western culture; the social process of becoming familiar with or converting to the customs and practices of Western civilization.
