Accented as an Adjective

Definitions of "Accented" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “accented” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(used of syllables) bearing the principle stress, usually accompanied by a change in pitch.*
- *(of a word, syllable, or musical note or chord) stressed or emphasized.*
- *Spoken with or characterized by a particular accent.*
- *Bearing a stress or accent.*



Synonyms of "Accented" as an adjective (2 Words)

stressed Strengthened by the application of stress during manufacture prestressed.
*Elision after a **stressed** syllable.*

tonic Relating to, denoting, or producing continuous muscular contraction.
***Tonic** harmony.*



Usage Examples of "Accented" as an adjective

- *He spoke in slightly accented English.*
- *A metrical foot consisting of two unaccented syllables followed by one accented syllable.*



Associations of "Accented" (30 Words)

accentuate	Make more noticeable or prominent. <i>His jacket unfortunately accentuated his paunch.</i>
dialect	A particular version of a programming language. <i>It has been said that a language is a dialect with an army and navy.</i>
diction	The articulation of speech regarded from the point of view of its intelligibility to the audience. <i>Wordsworth campaigned against exaggerated poetic diction.</i>
emphasize	To stress, single out as important. <i>Dr Jones emphasizes exercise in addition to a change in diet.</i>
emphatic	An emphatic consonant. <i>An emphatic World Cup win.</i>
emphatically	In a forceful way. <i>Greg is emphatically not a slacker.</i>
enunciation	The articulation of speech regarded from the point of view of its intelligibility to the audience.
grave	A place where a broken or discarded object lies. <i>A mass grave.</i>
highlight	Create highlights in hair. <i>I ve had my hair highlighted regularly for the last ten years.</i>

idiom	The style of a particular artist or school or movement. <i>He had a feeling for phrase and idiom.</i>
impersonate	Pretend to be (another person) for entertainment or fraud. <i>It s a very serious offence to impersonate a police officer.</i>
importance	The state or fact of being of great significance or value. <i>The importance of a well balanced diet.</i>
<u>imprint</u>	A lasting effect. <i>Years in the colonies had left their imprint.</i>
intension	The internal content of a concept.
intonation	Singing by a soloist of the opening piece of plainsong. <i>She spoke English with a German intonation.</i>
lilt	Speak sing or sound with a lilt. <i>The music lilted and swaggered in a dance rhythm.</i>
literal	Free from exaggeration or distortion. <i>Fifteen years of literal hell.</i>
overburden	An excessive burden. <i>An overburden of costs.</i>
pronunciation	The manner in which someone utters a word. <i>Similar pronunciations are heard in Ulster.</i>
<u>spotlight</u>	Illuminate with a spotlight as in the theater. <i>She was constantly in the media spotlight.</i>
strain	Separate by passing through a sieve or other straining device to separate out coarser elements. <i>The distant strains of the brass band grew louder.</i>
strength	The number of people comprising a group, typically a team or army. <i>Cycling can help you build up your strength.</i>
stress	Put stress on utter with an accent. <i>This type of workout does stress the shoulder and knee joints.</i>
stressed	Strengthened by the application of stress during manufacture prestressed. <i>An iambic foot consists of an unstressed syllable followed by a stressed syllable as in delay.</i>
tension	A relationship between ideas or qualities with conflicting demands or implications. <i>The coup followed months of tension between the military and the government.</i>
<u>underline</u>	Give extra weight to (a communication). <i>The improvement in retail sales was underlined by these figures.</i>

- underscore** (on a computer or typewriter keyboard) a short horizontal line _ on the baseline.
*The company **underscored** the progress made with fuel cells.*
- verbiage** Excessively lengthy or technical speech or writing.
*The basic idea here despite all the **verbiage** is simple.*
- voice** The melody carried by a particular voice or instrument in polyphonic music.
*The passive **voice**.*
- wording** The manner in which something is expressed in words- G.S.Patton.
*The standard form of **wording** for a consent letter.*
