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Associations of "Accentuated" (30 Words)

<u>accent</u>	Put stress on utter with an accent. <i>The accent falls on the middle syllable.</i>
<u>dazzle</u>	To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light. <i>She was dazzled by the headlights.</i>
decidedly	Without question and beyond doubt. <i>He looked decidedly uncomfortable.</i>
<u>dialect</u>	The usage or vocabulary that is characteristic of a specific group of people. <i>It has been said that a language is a dialect with an army and navy.</i>
emphasis	Special importance or significance. <i>They placed great emphasis on the individual s freedom.</i>
emphasize	To stress, single out as important. <i>Dr Jones emphasizes exercise in addition to a change in diet.</i>
emphasized	Spoken with emphasis.
<u>emphatic</u>	An emphatic consonant. <i>An emphatic movement of his hand.</i>
<u>emphatically</u>	In a forceful way. <i>Jane though born in California feels emphatically English.</i>
floodlight	The illumination provided by a floodlight. <i>We are floodlighting the building to highlight the structure.</i>
foreground	Move into the foreground to make more visible or prominent. <i>Sexual relationships are foregrounded and idealized.</i>
<u>grave</u>	Used as an allusive term for death. <i>Life beyond the grave.</i>
highlight	Mark with a highlighter. <i>He views that season as the highlight of his career.</i>

illuminate	Make free from confusion or ambiguity; make clear. <i>Placing the events of the 1930s in a broader historical context helps to illuminate their significance.</i>
importance	A prominent status. <i>An issue of great importance.</i>
<u>imprint</u>	An impression produced by pressure or printing. <i>We imprint our ideas onto our children.</i>
intension	What you must know in order to determine the reference of an expression.
lilt	Speak sing or sound with a lilt. <i>The lilt of the Hawaiian music.</i>
limelight	Intense white light obtained by heating lime, formerly used in theatres. <i>He enjoyed being in the limelight.</i>
overburden	The surface soil that must be moved away to get at coal seams and mineral deposits. <i>They were overburdened with luggage.</i>
significance	The extent to which a result deviates from that expected to arise simply from random variation or errors in sampling. <i>The significance of his remark became clear only later.</i>
<u>spotlight</u>	Illuminate with a spotlight. <i>The dancers are spotlighted from time to time throughout the evening.</i>
strain	Rub through a strainer or process in an electric blender. <i>The mental strain of staying alert hour after hour was too much for him.</i>
strength	The influence or power possessed by a person, organization, or country. <i>Many people find strength in religion.</i>
stress	The relative prominence of a syllable or musical note especially with regard to stress or pitch. <i>She endured the stresses and strains of life.</i>
stressed	Strengthened by the application of stress during manufacture prestressed. <i>An iambic foot consists of an unstressed syllable followed by a stressed syllable as in delay.</i>
<u>tend</u>	Have a tendency or disposition to do or be something be inclined. <i>She tends to the children.</i>
tension	The state of being stretched tight. <i>There is a tension created between narrative time and movie time.</i>
<u>underline</u>	Emphasize (something). <i>Certain phrases had been underlined.</i>

underscore A line drawn underneath (especially under written matter).
*The company **underscored** the progress made with fuel cells.*
