### Definitions of "Access" as a noun

- *The act of approaching or entering.*
- *A way of entering or leaving.*
- *The right to enter.*
- *Denoting broadcasting produced by minority and specialist interest groups, rather than by professionals.*
- *An attack or outburst of an emotion.*
- *The means or opportunity to approach or enter a place.*
- *The right or opportunity to use or benefit from something.*

- (computer science) the operation of reading or writing stored information.
- The right or opportunity to approach or see someone.
- The process of obtaining or retrieving information stored in a computer's memory.
- The right to obtain or make use of or take advantage of something (as services or membership).
- A code (a series of characters or digits) that must be entered in some way (typed or dialed or spoken) to get the use of something (a telephone line or a computer or a local area network etc).
- The operation of reading or writing stored information.

<b>attack</b>	The act of attacking. <i>They won the game with a 10 hit <b>attack</b> in the 9th inning.</i>
<b>blaze</b>	A very bright display of light or colour. <i>The gardens in summer are a <b>blaze</b> of colour.</i>
<b><u>bout</u></b>	A curve in the side of a violin, guitar, or other musical instrument. <i>Occasional <b>bouts</b> of strenuous exercise.</i>
<b>burst</b>	The act of exploding or bursting. <i>The mortar <b>bursts</b> were further away than before.</i>
<b><u>entrance</u></b>	The coming of an actor or performer on to a stage. <i>The <b>entrance</b> to a tunnel.</i>
<b>entree</b>	The right to enter. <i>She made a graceful <b>entree</b> into the ballroom.</i>
<b>entry</b>	The number of competitors in a particular race or competition. <i><b>Entry</b> is open to people of all ages.</i>
<b>entrée</b>	The right to enter.
<b>eruption</b>	(of volcanos) pouring out fumes or lava (or a deposit so formed). <i>A sudden <b>eruption</b> of street violence.</i>
<b><u>explosion</u></b>	The noise caused by an explosion. <i>An <b>explosion</b> in the adder population.</i>
<b>fit</b>	The particular way in which something especially a garment or component fits. <i>He had a <b>fit</b>.</i>
<b>flare-up</b>	A sudden intense happening.
<b>ingress</b>	The beginning of a transit.
<b>means of entry</b>	An instrumentality for accomplishing some end.
<b>memory access</b>	An electronic memory device.
<b><u>outbreak</u></b>	A sudden violent spontaneous occurrence (usually of some undesirable condition). <i>The <b>outbreak</b> of hostilities.</i>
<b>outburst</b>	A volcanic eruption. <i>An angry <b>outburst</b> from the prime minister.</i>
<b>outpouring</b>	The pouring forth of a fluid. <i>She attacked him with an <b>outpouring</b> of words.</i>

<b>paroxysm</b>	A sudden recurrence or attack of a disease. <i>A <b>paroxysm</b> of giggling.</i>
<b>permission to enter</b>	Approval to do something.
<b>permission to use</b>	The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization.
<b>right of entry</b>	Anything in accord with principles of justice.
<b>rush</b>	A sudden thrill or feeling of euphoria such as experienced after taking certain drugs. <i>Mark felt a <b>rush</b> of anger.</i>
<b>seizure</b>	The act of forcibly dispossessing an owner of property. <i>The <b>seizure</b> of all his assets.</i>
<b><u>spasm</u></b>	(pathology) sudden constriction of a hollow organ (as a blood vessel). <i>Shifting heavy loads without help brought on muscular back <b>spasms</b>.</i>
<b>the opportunity to enter</b>	A possibility due to a favorable combination of circumstances.
<b>the opportunity to use</b>	A possibility due to a favorable combination of circumstances.
<b>the use of</b>	What something is used for.
<b>use of</b>	Exerting shrewd or devious influence especially for one's own advantage.
<b>way in</b>	A journey or passage.

## Synonyms of "Access" as a verb (6 Words)

<b>acquire</b>	Gain through experience. <i>I managed to <b>acquire</b> all the books I needed.</i>
<b>gain</b>	Increase (one's body weight). <i>We <b>gained</b> entry to the car in five seconds.</i>
<b>gain access to</b>	Obtain advantages, such as points, etc.
<b>get at</b>	Receive as a retribution or punishment.
<b>obtain</b>	Get, acquire, or secure (something). <i>How did you <b>obtain</b> the visa.</i>
<b>retrieve</b>	Reel or bring in a fishing line. <i>I was sent to <b>retrieve</b> the balls from his garden.</i>

- *Single rooms have private facilities accessed via the balcony.*

<b>absentee</b>	A person who is expected or required to be present at a place or event but is not. <i>An <b>absentee</b> from the match.</i>
<b><u>accessible</u></b>	Easily understood or appreciated. <i>He is more <b>accessible</b> than most tycoons.</i>
<b><u>accession</u></b>	The act of attaining or gaining access to a new office or right or position (especially the throne). <i>The librarian shelved the new <b>accessions</b>.</i>
<b><u>admission</u></b>	The fee charged for admission. <i>The surgery was performed on his second <b>admission</b> to the clinic.</i>
<b>admittance</b>	The process or fact of entering or being allowed to enter a place or institution. <i>People were unable to gain <b>admittance</b> to the hall.</i>
<b><u>attend</u></b>	Take charge of or deal with. <i>She <b>attends</b> the old lady in the wheelchair.</i>
<b><u>engrave</u></b>	Cut or carve a text or design on (a hard object). <i><b>Engrave</b> a pen.</i>

<b>enroll</b>	Register formally as a participant or member.
<b><u>enrollment</u></b>	The body of people (such as students) who register or enroll at the same time.
<b>enter</b>	Set out on an enterprise or subject of study. <i>The election campaign <b>entered</b> its final phase.</i>
<b><u>entrance</u></b>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>An <b>entrance</b> examination.</i>
<b>entree</b>	The act of entering. <i>She made a graceful <b>entree</b> into the ballroom.</i>
<b>entry</b>	The action of entering something. <i><b>Entry</b> is open to people of all ages.</i>
<b>go</b>	Go through in search of something search through someone's belongings in an unauthorized way. <i>The committee was kept <b>going</b> even when its existence could no longer be justified.</i>
<b>imminent</b>	About to happen. <i>They were in <b>imminent</b> danger of being swept away.</i>
<b>in</b>	A state in midwestern United States. <i>Pastels and light colours are <b>in</b> this year.</i>
<b>infix</b>	Attach a morpheme into a stem word. <i>The particles of mercury will <b>infix</b> themselves in the structure of the other metal.</i>
<b>inscribe</b>	Address, (a work of literature) in a style less formal than a dedication. <i>A regular polygon <b>inscribed</b> in a circle.</i>
<b><u>insert</u></b>	Insert casually. <i>He immediately <b>inserted</b> a clause into later contracts.</i>
<b><u>internet</u></b>	A global computer network providing a variety of information and communication facilities, consisting of interconnected networks using standardized communication protocols. <i>The guide is also available on the <b>internet</b>.</i>
<b>matriculation</b>	Admission to a group (especially a college or university). <i><b>Matriculation</b> requirements.</i>
<b>participate</b>	Have or possess (a particular quality). <i>Both members <b>participate</b> of harmony.</i>
<b>participation</b>	The condition of sharing in common with others (as fellows or partners etc). <i><b>Participation</b> in chapel activities.</i>

- preferential** (of voting or an election) in which the voter puts candidates in order of preference.  
***Preferential** treatment.*
- reentrant** Pointing inward.
- registered** Of a letter or parcel sent by registered post.  
*Record is made of **registered** mail at each point on its route to assure safe delivery.*
- registration** The series of letters and figures identifying a motor vehicle assigned on registration and displayed on a number plate.  
*The number of new private car **registrations** has increased.*
- right** Of or belonging to the political or intellectual right.  
*The **right** side of the cloth showed the pattern.*
- selective** (of a process or agent) affecting some things and not others.  
*Modern pesticides are more **selective** in effect.*
- tuck** Make a tuck or several folds in.  
*They send me a **tuck** box every month.*
