<b>plaudits</b>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>He acknowledged the <b>plaudits</b> of the crowd.</i>
<b>praise</b>	The expression of approval or admiration for someone or something. <i>The audience was full of <b>praise</b> for the whole production.</i>
<b>salutes</b>	An act of greeting with friendly words and gestures like bowing or lifting the hat. <i>A musical salute to the composer on his birthday.</i>
<b>tribute</b>	An act, statement, or gift that is intended to show gratitude, respect, or admiration. <i>The king had at his disposal plunder and <b>tribute</b> amassed through warfare.</i>

<b>congratulate</b>	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. <i>Simone wrote to her shortly after her engagement had been announced to <b>congratulate</b> her.</i>
<b><u>declare</u></b>	Declare to be. <i>The mansion was <b>declared</b> a fire hazard.</i>
<b>esteemed</b>	Look on as or consider.
<b>eulogize</b>	Praise highly in speech or writing. <i>The dead woman was <b>eulogized</b> at the funeral.</i>
<b>exalt</b>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>This naturally <b>exalts</b> the peasant above his brethren in the same rank of society.</i>
<b>express admiration for</b>	Obtain from a substance, as by mechanical action.
<b>express approval of</b>	Articulate; either verbally or with a cry, shout, or noise.
<b><u>extol</u></b>	Praise enthusiastically. <i>He <b>extolled</b> the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i>
<b><u>flatter</u></b>	Cause (someone) to feel honoured and pleased. <i>The final scoreline <b>flattered</b> England.</i>

<b><u>compliment</u></b>	Congratulations or praise expressed to someone. <i>Carry my <b>compliments</b> to your kinsmen.</i>
<b>congratulate</b>	Pride or congratulate oneself for an achievement. <i>The operators are to be <b>congratulated</b> for the service that they provide.</i>
<b>eclat</b>	Ceremonial elegance and splendor. <i>Entered with much <b>eclat</b> in a coach drawn by eight white horses.</i>
<b>encore</b>	Of a performer give an encore. <i>Several arias were <b>encored</b>.</i>
<b><u>eulogy</u></b>	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly, especially a tribute to someone who has just died. <i>A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.</i>
<b><u>extol</u></b>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i><b>Extol</b> the virtues of one's children.</i>
<b><u>flatter</u></b>	Praise somewhat dishonestly. <i>I was very <b>flattered</b> to be given the commission.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	An expression of approval and commendation. <i>She was looking for <b>kudos</b> rather than profit.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise (a person or their achievements) highly. <i>The obituary <b>lauded</b> him as a great statesman and soldier.</i>
<b>laudable</b>	Worthy of high praise. <i><b>Laudable</b> motives of improving housing conditions.</i>
<b>laudatory</b>	Full of or giving praise. <i>A <b>laudatory</b> remark.</i>
<b>ovation</b>	A processional entrance into Rome by a victorious commander, of lesser honour than a triumph. <i>The performance received a thundering <b>ovation</b>.</i>
<b>panegyric</b>	A formal expression of praise. <i>A <b>panegyric</b> on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
<b>pas</b>	(ballet) a step in dancing (especially in classical ballet).
<b>plaudit</b>	The applause of an audience. <i>He acknowledged the <b>plaudits</b> of the crowd.</i>
