Acclimate as a Verb

Definitions of "Acclimate" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "acclimate" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Get used to a certain climate.
- Acclimatize.
- Harden off (a plant).
- Respond physiologically or behaviourally to a change in an environmental factor under controlled conditions.





Synonyms of "Acclimate" as a verb (16 Words)

acclimatise	Get used to a certain climate.
acclimatize	Become accustomed to a new climate or new conditions; adjust. It s unknown whether people will acclimatize to increasingly warm weather.
accommodate	Provide with something desired or needed. <i>The cottages</i> accommodate up to six people.
<u>acculturate</u>	Assimilate to a different culture, typically the dominant one. Those who have acculturate d to the United States.
<u>adapt</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. Hospitals have had to be adapt ed for modern medical practice.
adjust	Alter or move (something) slightly in order to achieve the desired fit, appearance, or result. She must be allowed to grieve and to adjust in her own way.



assimilate	Absorb and integrate (people, ideas, or culture) into a wider society or culture. The sugars in the fruit are readily assimilate d by the body.
attune	Make harmonious. Students are not attune d to making decisions.
become resigned	Come into existence.
condition	Apply a conditioner to the hair. O Brien condition ed winners of 13 European Derbies during his career.
<u>conform</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. The changes were introduced to conform with international classifications.
habituate	Take or consume (regularly or habitually. Bears can become habituate d to people very easily.
<u>harden</u>	Cause to accept or become hardened to habituate. She harden ed her heart.
inure	Accustom (someone) to something, especially something unpleasant. <i>He was inure</i> d to the cold.
<u>reconcile</u>	Come to terms. The king and the archbishop were publicly reconcile d.
resign	Surrender oneself to another's guidance. Four deputies resign ed their seats.

Usage Examples of "Acclimate" as a verb

- It will take a few days to get acclimated to the altitude.

accede	Become a member of an organization. The authorities did not accede to the strikers demands.
accord	Go together. His views accord ed well with those of Merivale.
accordance	Conformity or agreement. The accordance to Canada of rights of access.



accustom	Make psychologically or physically used (to something. I am not accustom ed to having my word questioned.
<u>adapt</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. The policies can be adapt ed to suit individual needs.
adjust	Alter or regulate so as to achieve accuracy or conform to a standard. <i>He smoothed his hair and adjusted his tie.</i>
admissible	Deserving to be admitted. The tape recording was admissible as evidence.
admittedly	As acknowledged. Admittedly the salary was not wonderful.
<u>agree</u>	Show grammatical agreement. The verb agree s with the final noun.
agreed	United by being of the same opinion. <i>Agreed</i> in their distrust of authority.
attune	Accustom or acclimatize. A society more attune d to consumerism than ideology.
bargaining	The negotiation of the terms of a transaction or agreement.
<u>coincide</u>	Happen simultaneously. On Friday afternoons we generally coincide d.
comply	Act in accordance with someone's rules, commands, or wishes. <i>We are unable to comply with your request.</i>
<u>configuration</u>	An arrangement of parts or elements. The PC comes with a removable hard disk drive as part of the standard configuration .
<u>conform</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. The kitchen does not conform to hygiene regulations.
conformance	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i>Conformance testing</i> .
conforming	Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion.
<u>conformist</u>	A person who conforms to accepted behaviour or established practices. <i>The poet became more</i> conformist <i>in his later years.</i>
<u>consent</u>	Permission to do something. <i>He indicated his consent</i> .
<u>correspond</u>	Be compatible, similar or consistent; coincide in their characteristics. The doctor and I correspond ed for more than two decades.
fit	Make fit. The house was not fit for human habitation.



guideline	A light line that is used in lettering to help align the letters. The organization has issued guideline s for people working with prisoners.
habituate	Make or become accustomed or used to something. Bears can become habituate d to people very easily.
obediently	In a manner that shows willingness to comply with an order or request; submissively. She obediently followed the housekeeper s instructions.
<u>obligation</u>	A personal relation in which one is indebted for a service or favor. She didn t want to be under an obligation to him.
ok	An endorsement. Things are ok ay.
<u>reconcile</u>	Accept as inevitable. The king and the archbishop were publicly reconcile d.
respectively	In the order given. The brothers were called Felix and Max respectively .
unanimously	Of one mind; without dissent. <i>We voted unanimously</i> .
