### Definitions of "Acclimate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “acclimate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Get used to a certain climate.*
- *Acclimatize.*
- *Harden off (a plant).*
- *Respond physiologically or behaviourally to a change in an environmental factor under controlled conditions.*



## Synonyms of "Acclimate" as a verb (16 Words)

<b>acclimatise</b>	Get used to a certain climate. Become accustomed to a new climate or new conditions; adjust.
<b>acclimatize</b>	<i>It s unknown whether people will <b>acclimatize</b> to increasingly warm weather.</i>
<b>accommodate</b>	Provide with something desired or needed. <i>The cottages <b>accommodate</b> up to six people.</i>
<b>acculturate</b>	Assimilate to a different culture, typically the dominant one. <i>Those who have <b>acculturated</b> to the United States.</i>
<b>adapt</b>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>Hospitals have had to be <b>adapted</b> for modern medical practice.</i>
<b>adjust</b>	Alter or move (something) slightly in order to achieve the desired fit, appearance, or result. <i>She must be allowed to grieve and to <b>adjust</b> in her own way.</i>

<b>assimilate</b>	Absorb and integrate (people, ideas, or culture) into a wider society or culture. <i>The sugars in the fruit are readily <b>assimilated</b> by the body.</i>
<b>attune</b>	Make harmonious. <i>Students are not <b>attuned</b> to making decisions.</i>
<b>become resigned</b>	Come into existence.
<b>condition</b>	Apply a conditioner to the hair. <i>O'Brien <b>conditioned</b> winners of 13 European Derbies during his career.</i>
<b><u>conform</u></b>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The changes were introduced to <b>conform</b> with international classifications.</i>
<b>habituate</b>	Take or consume (regularly or habitually). <i>Bears can become <b>habituated</b> to people very easily.</i>
<b><u>harden</u></b>	Cause to accept or become hardened to habituate. <i>She <b>hardened</b> her heart.</i>
<b>inure</b>	Accustom (someone) to something, especially something unpleasant. <i>He was <b>inured</b> to the cold.</i>
<b><u>reconcile</u></b>	Come to terms. <i>The king and the archbishop were publicly <b>reconciled</b>.</i>
<b>resign</b>	Surrender oneself to another's guidance. <i>Four deputies <b>resigned</b> their seats.</i>

- *It will take a few days to get acclimated to the altitude.*

<b><u>accede</u></b>	Become a member of an organization. <i>The authorities did not <b>accede</b> to the strikers demands.</i>
<b><u>accord</u></b>	Go together. <i>His views <b>accorded</b> well with those of Merivale.</i>
<b><u>accordance</u></b>	Conformity or agreement. <i>The <b>accordance</b> to Canada of rights of access.</i>

<b>accustom</b>	Make psychologically or physically used (to something). <i>I am not <b>accustomed</b> to having my word questioned.</i>
<b><u>adapt</u></b>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The policies can be <b>adapted</b> to suit individual needs.</i>
<b>adjust</b>	Alter or regulate so as to achieve accuracy or conform to a standard. <i>He smoothed his hair and <b>adjusted</b> his tie.</i>
<b><u>admissible</u></b>	Deserving to be admitted. <i>The tape recording was <b>admissible</b> as evidence.</i>
<b>admittedly</b>	As acknowledged. <i><b>Admittedly</b> the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<b><u>agree</u></b>	Show grammatical agreement. <i>The verb <b>agrees</b> with the final noun.</i>
<b><u>agreed</u></b>	United by being of the same opinion. <i><b>Agreed</b> in their distrust of authority.</i>
<b>attune</b>	Accustom or acclimatize. <i>A society more <b>attuned</b> to consumerism than ideology.</i>
<b>bargaining</b>	The negotiation of the terms of a transaction or agreement.
<b><u>coincide</u></b>	Happen simultaneously. <i>On Friday afternoons we generally <b>coincided</b>.</i>
<b>comply</b>	Act in accordance with someone's rules, commands, or wishes. <i>We are unable to <b>comply</b> with your request.</i>
<b><u>configuration</u></b>	An arrangement of parts or elements. <i>The PC comes with a removable hard disk drive as part of the standard <b>configuration</b>.</i>
<b><u>conform</u></b>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The kitchen does not <b>conform</b> to hygiene regulations.</i>
<b>conformance</b>	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i><b>Conformance</b> testing.</i>
<b>conforming</b>	Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion).
<b><u>conformist</u></b>	A person who conforms to accepted behaviour or established practices. <i>The poet became more <b>conformist</b> in his later years.</i>
<b><u>consent</u></b>	Permission to do something. <i>He indicated his <b>consent</b>.</i>
<b><u>correspond</u></b>	Be compatible, similar or consistent; coincide in their characteristics. <i>The doctor and I <b>corresponded</b> for more than two decades.</i>
<b>fit</b>	Make fit. <i>The house was not <b>fit</b> for human habitation.</i>

<b>guideline</b>	A light line that is used in lettering to help align the letters. <i>The organization has issued <b>guidelines</b> for people working with prisoners.</i>
<b>habituate</b>	Make or become accustomed or used to something. <i>Bears can become <b>habituated</b> to people very easily.</i>
<b>obediently</b>	In a manner that shows willingness to comply with an order or request; submissively. <i>She <b>obediently</b> followed the housekeeper s instructions.</i>
<b><u>obligation</u></b>	A personal relation in which one is indebted for a service or favor. <i>She didn t want to be under an <b>obligation</b> to him.</i>
<b>ok</b>	An endorsement. <i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>
<b><u>reconcile</u></b>	Accept as inevitable. <i>The king and the archbishop were publicly <b>reconciled</b>.</i>
<b>respectively</b>	In the order given. <i>The brothers were called Felix and Max <b>respectively</b>.</i>
<b>unanimously</b>	Of one mind; without dissent. <i>We voted <b>unanimously</b>.</i>
