- Harden off (a plant).
- Respond physiologically or behaviourally to a change in an environmental factor under controlled conditions.





Synonyms of "Acclimate" as a verb (16 Words)

acclimatise Get used to a certain climate.

Become accustomed to a new climate or new conditions; adjust.

Provide with something desired or needed. accommodate

The cottages **accommodate** up to six people.

Assimilate to a different culture, typically the dominant one. <u>acculturate</u>

Those who have **acculturate**d to the United States.

Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <u>adapt</u>

Alter or move (something) slightly in order to achieve the desired fit,

adjust appearance, or result.

She must be allowed to grieve and to **adjust** in her own way.

The sugars in the fruit are readily **assimilate**d by the body.

Make harmonious.

Students are not attuned to making decisions.

become resigned Come into existence.

Apply a conditioner to the hair.

classifications.

habituate Take or consume (regularly or habitually.

Bears can become **habituate**d to people very easily.

harden Cause to accept or become hardened to habituate.

She hardened her heart.

inure Accustom (someone) to something, especially something unpleasant.

He was **inure**d to the cold.

reconcile Come to terms.

The king and the archbishop were publicly **reconcile**d.

resign Surrender oneself to another's guidance.

Four deputies **resign**ed their seats.

conformance Correspondence in form or appearance.

She didn t want to be under an **obligation** to him.
