Acclimate as a Verb

Definitions of "Acclimate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “acclimate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Get used to a certain climate.*
- *Acclimatize.*
- *Harden off (a plant).*
- *Respond physiologically or behaviourally to a change in an environmental factor under controlled conditions.*



Synonyms of "Acclimate" as a verb (16 Words)

acclimatise	Get used to a certain climate. Become accustomed to a new climate or new conditions; adjust.
acclimatize	<i>It s unknown whether people will acclimatize to increasingly warm weather.</i>
accommodate	Provide with something desired or needed. <i>The cottages accommodate up to six people.</i>
acculturate	Assimilate to a different culture, typically the dominant one. <i>Those who have acculturated to the United States.</i>
adapt	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>Hospitals have had to be adapted for modern medical practice.</i>
adjust	Alter or move (something) slightly in order to achieve the desired fit, appearance, or result. <i>She must be allowed to grieve and to adjust in her own way.</i>

assimilate	Absorb and integrate (people, ideas, or culture) into a wider society or culture. <i>The sugars in the fruit are readily assimilated by the body.</i>
attune	Make harmonious. <i>Students are not attuned to making decisions.</i>
become resigned	Come into existence.
condition	Apply a conditioner to the hair. <i>O'Brien conditioned winners of 13 European Derbies during his career.</i>
<u>conform</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The changes were introduced to conform with international classifications.</i>
habituate	Take or consume (regularly or habitually). <i>Bears can become habituated to people very easily.</i>
<u>harden</u>	Cause to accept or become hardened to habituate. <i>She hardened her heart.</i>
inure	Accustom (someone) to something, especially something unpleasant. <i>He was inured to the cold.</i>
<u>reconcile</u>	Come to terms. <i>The king and the archbishop were publicly reconciled.</i>
resign	Surrender oneself to another's guidance. <i>Four deputies resigned their seats.</i>

Usage Examples of "Acclimate" as a verb

- *This should help new students acclimate to college life.*
- *It will take a few days to get acclimated to the altitude.*

Associations of "Acclimate" (30 Words)

<u>accede</u>	Become a member of an organization. <i>The authorities did not accede to the strikers demands.</i>
<u>accord</u>	Go together. <i>His views accorded well with those of Merivale.</i>
<u>accordance</u>	Conformity or agreement. <i>The accordance to Canada of rights of access.</i>

accustom	Make psychologically or physically used (to something). <i>I am not accustomed to having my word questioned.</i>
<u>adapt</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The policies can be adapted to suit individual needs.</i>
adjust	Alter or regulate so as to achieve accuracy or conform to a standard. <i>He smoothed his hair and adjusted his tie.</i>
<u>admissible</u>	Deserving to be admitted. <i>The tape recording was admissible as evidence.</i>
admittedly	As acknowledged. <i>Admittedly the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<u>agree</u>	Show grammatical agreement. <i>The verb agrees with the final noun.</i>
<u>agreed</u>	United by being of the same opinion. <i>Agreed in their distrust of authority.</i>
attune	Accustom or acclimatize. <i>A society more attuned to consumerism than ideology.</i>
bargaining	The negotiation of the terms of a transaction or agreement.
<u>coincide</u>	Happen simultaneously. <i>On Friday afternoons we generally coincided.</i>
comply	Act in accordance with someone's rules, commands, or wishes. <i>We are unable to comply with your request.</i>
<u>configuration</u>	An arrangement of parts or elements. <i>The PC comes with a removable hard disk drive as part of the standard configuration.</i>
<u>conform</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The kitchen does not conform to hygiene regulations.</i>
conformance	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i>Conformance testing.</i>
conforming	Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion).
<u>conformist</u>	A person who conforms to accepted behaviour or established practices. <i>The poet became more conformist in his later years.</i>
<u>consent</u>	Permission to do something. <i>He indicated his consent.</i>
<u>correspond</u>	Be compatible, similar or consistent; coincide in their characteristics. <i>The doctor and I corresponded for more than two decades.</i>
fit	Make fit. <i>The house was not fit for human habitation.</i>

guideline	A light line that is used in lettering to help align the letters. <i>The organization has issued guidelines for people working with prisoners.</i>
habituate	Make or become accustomed or used to something. <i>Bears can become habituated to people very easily.</i>
obediently	In a manner that shows willingness to comply with an order or request; submissively. <i>She obediently followed the housekeeper s instructions.</i>
<u>obligation</u>	A personal relation in which one is indebted for a service or favor. <i>She didn t want to be under an obligation to him.</i>
ok	An endorsement. <i>Things are okay.</i>
<u>reconcile</u>	Accept as inevitable. <i>The king and the archbishop were publicly reconciled.</i>
respectively	In the order given. <i>The brothers were called Felix and Max respectively.</i>
unanimously	Of one mind; without dissent. <i>We voted unanimously.</i>
