<b><u>admiration</u></b>	A feeling of delighted approval and liking. <i>Her house was the <b>admiration</b> of everyone.</i>
<b>adulation</b>	Servile flattery; exaggerated and hypocritical praise. <i>He found it difficult to cope with the <b>adulation</b> of the fans.</i>
<b>applause</b>	A demonstration of approval by clapping the hands together. <i>They gave him a round of <b>applause</b>.</i>

<b>approval</b>	A feeling of liking something or someone good. <i>The road schemes have been given <b>approval</b>.</i>

<b>award</b>	A prize or other mark of recognition given in honour of an achievement. <i>The company's annual <b>award</b> for high quality service.</i>
<b>commendation</b>	An award given for very good performance. <i>The film deserved the highest <b>commendation</b>.</i>
<b>compliment</b>	Formal greetings, especially when sent as a message. <i>It's a <b>compliment</b> to the bride to dress up on her special day.</i>
<b>encomium</b>	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly.
<b>eulogy</b>	A formal expression of praise for someone who has died recently. <i>A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.</i>
<b>flattery</b>	Excessive or insincere praise. <i>She allowed no hint of <b>flattery</b> to enter her voice.</i>
<b>gift</b>	The act of giving. <i>His mother's <b>gift</b> of a pen.</i>
<b>homage</b>	Formal public acknowledgement of feudal allegiance. <i>Many villagers come here to pay <b>homage</b> to the Virgin.</i>
<b>honor</b>	The quality of being honorable and having a good name. <i>A man of <b>honor</b>.</i>
<b>honour</b>	A tangible symbol signifying approval or distinction. <i>The highest military <b>honours</b>.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	Praise and honour received for an achievement. <i>She was looking for <b>kudos</b> rather than profit.</i>
<b>laurels</b>	The state of being honored.
<b>ovation</b>	A sustained and enthusiastic show of appreciation from an audience, especially by means of applause. <i>The performance received a thundering <b>ovation</b>.</i>
<b>panegyric</b>	A formal expression of praise. <i>A <b>panegyric</b> on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
<b>pat on the back</b>	The sound made by a gentle blow.
<b>praise</b>	The expression of approval or admiration for someone or something. <i>They sang a hymn of <b>praise</b> to God.</i>
<b>privilege</b>	(law) the right to refuse to divulge information obtained in a confidential relationship. <i>I had the <b>privilege</b> of giving the Sir George Brown memorial lecture.</i>
<b>recognition</b>	An acceptance (as of a claim) as true and valid. <i>Increasing <b>recognition</b> that diabetes frequently coexists with other chronic diseases.</i>

Something that recommends (or expresses commendation of) a person or thing as worthy or desirable.

A **testimonial** match.

**title**

The status of being a champion.

The restaurant deserved the **title** of Best Restaurant of the Year.

**tribute**

Something resulting from a particular quality or feature and indicating its worth.

An Abba **tribute** band.

**welcome**

The state of being welcome.

You will receive a warm **welcome**.

### admire

Look at (something impressive or attractive) with pleasure.

*I **admire** your courage.*

### adulation

Excessive admiration or praise.

*He found it difficult to cope with the **adulation** of the fans.*

<b>award</b>	Give or order the giving of (something) as an official payment, compensation, or prize to (someone). <i>The jury <b>awarded</b> a million dollars to the plaintiff.</i>
<b>commend</b>	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i>I <b>commend</b> my children to you.</i>
<b>commendable</b>	Deserving praise. <i>He showed <b>commendable</b> restraint.</i>
<b>commendation</b>	An official award (as for bravery or service) usually given as formal public statement. <i>The film deserved the highest <b>commendation</b>.</i>
<b>compliment</b>	An act or circumstance that implies praise or respect. <i>He <b>complimented</b> her on her last physics paper.</i>
<b>creditable</b>	(of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful. <i>A very <b>creditable</b> 2 4 defeat.</i>
<b>deserve</b>	Do something or have or show qualities worthy of (a reaction which rewards or punishes as appropriate). <i>You <b>deserve</b> a promotion after all the hard work you have done.</i>
<b>eminence</b>	A protuberance on a bone especially for attachment of a muscle or ligament. <i>Her <b>eminence</b> in cinematography.</i>
<b>exalt</b>	Heighten or intensify. <i>Romanticism liberated the imagination and <b>exalted</b> the emotions.</i>
<b>extol</b>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>He <b>extolled</b> the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i>
<b>flatter</b>	Cause (someone) to feel honoured and pleased. <i>Don't <b>flatter</b> yourself I wasn't doing it for your benefit.</i>
<b>glorify</b>	Praise glorify or honor. <i><b>Glorify</b> one's spouse's cooking.</i>
<b>glory</b>	An indication of radiant light drawn around the head of a saint. <i>Readers tended to defend their paper or even to <b>glory</b> in its bias.</i>
<b>honor</b>	The quality of being honorable and having a good name. <i><b>Honor</b> your parents.</i>
<b>honorable</b>	Adhering to ethical and moral principles. <i>Followed the only <b>honorable</b> course of action.</i>
<b>honored</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.

<b>honour</b>	A woman's virtue or chastity. <i>His portrait hangs in the place of <b>honour</b>.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	Praise and honour received for an achievement. <i><b>Kudos</b> to everyone who put the event together.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise (a person or their achievements) highly. <i>All glory <b>laud</b> and honour to Thee Redeemer King.</i>
<b>meritorious</b>	Deserving reward or praise. <i>A lifetime of <b>meritorious</b> service.</i>
<b>praise</b>	The expression of respect and gratitude as an act of worship. <i>He always appreciated <b>praise</b> for his work.</i>
<b>prestigious</b>	Exerting influence by reason of high status or prestige. <i>A <b>prestigious</b> professor at a <b>prestigious</b> university.</i>
<b>reputable</b>	Having a good reputation. <i>A <b>reputable</b> wine.</i>
<b>tout</b>	Someone who buys tickets to an event in order to resell them at a profit. <i>Shop managers would stand in the street <b>touting</b> for business.</i>
<b>win</b>	Win something through one's efforts. <i>You will find it difficult to <b>win</b> back their attention.</i>
