- commend** Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend.  
*I **commend** my children to you.*
- commendable** Deserving praise.  
*He showed **commendable** restraint.*
- commendation** An official award (as for bravery or service) usually given as formal public statement.  
*The book gives **commendations** for initiative.*
- compliment** Politely congratulate or praise (someone) for something.  
*It s a **compliment** to the bride to dress up on her special day.*
- creditable** (of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful.  
*The student s effort on the essay though not outstanding was **creditable**.*

<b>deserve</b>	Do something or have or show qualities worthy of (a reaction which rewards or punishes as appropriate. <i>The referee <b>deserves</b> a pat on the back.</i>
<b>eminence</b>	A piece of rising ground. <i>A scholar of great <b>eminence</b>.</i>
<b>exalt</b>	Raise in rank, character, or status. <i><b>Exalted</b> the humble shoemaker to the rank of King s adviser.</i>
<b>extol</b>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>He <b>extolled</b> the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i>
<b>flatter</b>	Give an unrealistically favourable impression of. <i>Don t <b>flatter</b> yourself I wasn t doing it for your benefit.</i>
<b>glorify</b>	Praise glorify or honor. <i>You are <b>glorifying</b> a rather mediocre building.</i>
<b>glory</b>	A thing that is beautiful, impressive, or worthy of praise. <i>He valued <b>glory</b> above life itself.</i>
<b>honor</b>	The state of being honored. <i>We <b>honor</b> checks and drafts.</i>
<b>honorable</b>	Not disposed to cheat or defraud; not deceptive or fraudulent. <i><b>Honorable</b> service to his country.</i>
<b>honored</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
<b>honour</b>	Something regarded as a rare opportunity and bringing pride and pleasure; a privilege. <i>You are an <b>honour</b> to our profession.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	An expression of approval and commendation. <i><b>Kudos</b> to everyone who put the event together.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise. <i>The obituary <b>lauded</b> him as a great statesman and soldier.</i>
<b>meritorious</b>	Deserving reward or praise. <i>The costs involved in civil litigation may prevent a <b>meritorious</b> appeal.</i>
<b>praise</b>	The expression of approval or admiration for someone or something. <i>Give <b>praise</b> to God.</i>
<b>prestigious</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected. <i>A <b>prestigious</b> professor at a <b>prestigious</b> university.</i>
<b>reputable</b>	Having a good reputation. <i>A <b>reputable</b> business.</i>
<b>tout</b>	An informer. <i>This product was <b>touted</b> as a revolutionary invention.</i>
