- commend** Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend.
*I **commend** my children to you.*
- commendable** Deserving praise.
*He showed **commendable** restraint.*
- commendation** An official award (as for bravery or service) usually given as formal public statement.
*The book gives **commendations** for initiative.*
- compliment** Politely congratulate or praise (someone) for something.
*It s a **compliment** to the bride to dress up on her special day.*
- creditable** (of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful.
*The student s effort on the essay though not outstanding was **creditable**.*

<u>deserve</u>	Do something or have or show qualities worthy of (a reaction which rewards or punishes as appropriate. <i>The referee deserves a pat on the back.</i>
eminence	A piece of rising ground. <i>A scholar of great eminence.</i>
exalt	Raise in rank, character, or status. <i>Exalted the humble shoemaker to the rank of King s adviser.</i>
<u>extol</u>	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>He extolled the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i>
<u>flatter</u>	Give an unrealistically favourable impression of. <i>Don t flatter yourself I wasn t doing it for your benefit.</i>
glorify	Praise glorify or honor. <i>You are glorifying a rather mediocre building.</i>
<u>glory</u>	A thing that is beautiful, impressive, or worthy of praise. <i>He valued glory above life itself.</i>
honor	The state of being honored. <i>We honor checks and drafts.</i>
<u>honorable</u>	Not disposed to cheat or defraud; not deceptive or fraudulent. <i>Honorable service to his country.</i>
honored	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
honour	Something regarded as a rare opportunity and bringing pride and pleasure; a privilege. <i>You are an honour to our profession.</i>
kudos	An expression of approval and commendation. <i>Kudos to everyone who put the event together.</i>
laud	Praise. <i>The obituary lauded him as a great statesman and soldier.</i>
meritorious	Deserving reward or praise. <i>The costs involved in civil litigation may prevent a meritorious appeal.</i>
praise	The expression of approval or admiration for someone or something. <i>Give praise to God.</i>
prestigious	Having an illustrious reputation; respected. <i>A prestigious professor at a prestigious university.</i>
<u>reputable</u>	Having a good reputation. <i>A reputable business.</i>
<u>tout</u>	An informer. <i>This product was touted as a revolutionary invention.</i>
