amenable

Readily reacting to suggestions and influences.

*An **amenable** hospitalization should not result in untimely death.*

civil

Relating to civil law.

***Civil** rights.*

complaisant	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>To close one's eyes like a complaisant husband whose wife has taken a lover.</i>
compliant	Meeting or in accordance with rules or standards. <i>The conversion of the gel to a much less compliant rigid glass.</i>
<u>considerate</u>	Showing careful thought. <i>She was unfailingly kind and considerate.</i>
<u>cooperative</u>	(of a farm, business, etc.) owned and run jointly by its members, with profits or benefits shared among them. <i>They have been extremely considerate polite and cooperative.</i>
eager to help	Having or showing keen interest or intense desire or impatient expectancy.
eager to please	Having or showing keen interest or intense desire or impatient expectancy.
friendly	(of a game or match) not forming part of a serious competition. <i>She gave me a friendly smile.</i>
generous	More than is usual or necessary. <i>A generous benefactor to the University.</i>
helpful	Giving or ready to give help. <i>Pages of helpful information.</i>
<u>hospitable</u>	(of an environment) pleasant and favourable for living in. <i>A hospitable environment.</i>
<u>indulgent</u>	Self indulgent. <i>Sheer indulgent nostalgia.</i>
kind	Tolerant and forgiving under provocation. <i>A dry climate kind to asthmatics.</i>
<u>kindly</u>	Kind, warm-hearted, or gentle. <i>He was a quiet kindly man.</i>
neighbourly	Exhibiting the qualities expected in a friendly neighbor. <i>Shopping for the elderly is a regular feature of neighbourly support.</i>
obliging	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>The obliging waiter was in no hurry for us to leave.</i>
<u>pleasant</u>	(of persons) having pleasing manners or behavior. <i>Pleasant sensations.</i>
<u>pliable</u>	Susceptible to being led or directed. <i>Quality leather is pliable and will not crack.</i>

Not greedy.

Associations of "Accommodating" (30 Words)

accommodation	Making or becoming suitable; adjusting to circumstances. <i>The prime minister was seeking an accommodation with Labour.</i>
<u>adapt</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The policies can be adapted to suit individual needs.</i>
<u>apartment</u>	A block of apartments. <i>A district of six storey apartments arranged along narrow streets.</i>
appointment	Law the act of disposing of property by virtue of the power of appointment. <i>She made an appointment with my receptionist.</i>
<u>belong</u>	Be a part or adjunct. <i>The race belonged completely to Fogarty.</i>
<u>booking</u>	The act of reserving (a place or passage) or engaging the services of (a person or group). <i>The hotel does not handle group bookings.</i>

hiding	A severe defeat. <i>They caught him and gave him a hiding.</i>
hold	Be capable of holding or containing. <i>I can hold my drink as well as anyone.</i>
host	Be the host of or for. <i>Atlanta was chosen to be host for the Olympic Games.</i>
hostel	An establishment which provides inexpensive food and lodging for a specific group of people, such as students, workers, or travellers.
hostess	A woman employed to welcome and entertain customers at a nightclub or bar. <i>A game show hostess.</i>
hotel	A code word representing the letter H, used in radio communication. <i>A group of four friends had gone to have dinner at a roadside hotel.</i>
housing	Houses and flats considered collectively. <i>A housing development.</i>
included	Contained as part of a whole being considered. <i>All of Europe Britain included.</i>
invulnerable	Immune to attack; impregnable. <i>Gunners raked the beach from invulnerable positions on the cliffs.</i>
layover	A period of rest or waiting before a further stage in a journey. <i>There was only a forty eight minute layover.</i>
lodging	The act of lodging. <i>A fee for board and lodging.</i>
migratory	Relating to animal migration. <i>The migratory route for whale sharks.</i>
motel	A motor hotel.
nestle	Lie in a sheltered position. <i>Picturesque villages nestle in the wooded hills.</i>
offer	The verbal act of offering. <i>The opportunities which the economic recovery will offer.</i>
own	Have ownership or possession of. <i>They can t handle their own children.</i>
place	Place somebody in a particular situation or location. <i>They place a great deal of emphasis on positive thought.</i>
possessor	A person who takes, occupies, or holds something without necessarily having ownership, or as distinguished from the owner. <i>His father was the possessor of a considerable fortune.</i>

reconcile

Make (one account) consistent with another, especially by allowing for transactions begun but not yet completed.

*The agreement had to be **reconciled** with the city's new international relations policy.*

reservation

An unstated doubt that prevents you from accepting something wholeheartedly.

*The retention of a right to enter the demised property will be a **reservation**.*

room

Provide with a shared room or lodging.

*Hardly enough elbow **room** to turn around.*

space

The freedom to live, think, and develop in a way that suits one.

*He said the **space** is the most important character in the alphabet.*

stopover

A brief stay in the course of a journey.

*There is a **stopover** to change planes in Chicago.*

suite

A group of minerals, rocks, or fossils occurring together and characteristic of a location or period.

*Potassic rock **suites** are a characteristic feature of the area.*
