<b>conduct</b>	Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <i>Many metals <b>conduct</b> heat.</i>
<b>consummate</b>	Make perfect; bring to perfection. <i><b>Consummate</b> a marriage.</i>
<b>discharge</b>	Go off or discharge. <i>He <b>discharged</b> his resentment in the harmless form of memoirs.</i>
<b>do</b>	Get something done. <i>A couple of quid ll <b>do</b> me.</i>
<b>effect</b>	Produce. <i>The prime minister <b>effected</b> many policy changes.</i>
<b>engineer</b>	Design as an engineer. <i>She <b>engineered</b> another meeting with him.</i>
<b>execute</b>	Perform (a skilful action or manoeuvre). <i>Not only does she <b>execute</b> embroideries she designs them too.</i>
<b>finish</b>	Cause to finish a relationship with somebody. <i>This shirt is not <b>finished</b> properly.</i>
<b>fix</b>	Decide upon or fix definitely. <i>Specimens were <b>fixed</b> in buffered formalin.</i>
<b>fulfil</b>	Complete (a period of time or piece of work). <i>Arts grants go to young people who say they wish to <b>fulfil</b> themselves.</i>
<b>fulfill</b>	Meet the requirements or expectations of.
<b>manage</b>	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. <i>He could not <b>manage</b> 24 March after all.</i>
<b>perform</b>	Perform a function. <i>Our 120 million investment in the company is not <b>performing</b> at present.</i>
<b>perpetrate</b>	Perform an act, usually with a negative connotation. <i><b>Perpetrate</b> a crime.</i>
<b>reach</b>	Reach a goal e.g. <i><b>Reach</b> me those glasses.</i>
<b>realize</b>	Achieve (something desired or anticipated); fulfil. <i>He <b>realized</b> all the assets in her trust fund.</i>
<b>succeed in</b>	Be the successor (of).

<b>fulfillment</b>	A feeling of satisfaction at having achieved your desires.
<b>gain</b>	Increase or develop. <i>They recorded the cattle's <b>gain</b> in weight over a period of weeks.</i>
<b>goal</b>	An instance of sending the ball into or over the goal especially as a unit of scoring in a game. <i>He achieved his <b>goal</b> of becoming King of England.</i>
<b>homework</b>	Paid work carried out in one's own home, especially low-paid piecework. <i>The growth of <b>homework</b> and of part time working.</i>
<b>implementation</b>	The act of implementing (providing a practical means for accomplishing something); carrying into effect. <i>She was responsible for the <b>implementation</b> of the plan.</i>
<b>indulging</b>	The act of indulging or gratifying a desire.
