<b>congruence</b>	Agreement or harmony; compatibility. <i>The results show quite good <b>congruence</b> with recent studies.</i>
<b>consensus</b>	Agreement in the judgment or opinion reached by a group as a whole. <i>Those rights and obligations are based on an unstated <b>consensus</b>.</i>
<b>contract</b>	The highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make. <i>South can make the <b>contract</b> with correct play.</i>
<b>convention</b>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional. <i>To attract the best patrons the movie houses had to ape the <b>conventions</b> and the standards of theatres.</i>
<b>deal</b>	The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>A <b>deal</b> of trouble.</i>
<b>entente</b>	A friendly understanding between political powers. <i>The unsuccessful scheme to lure Greece into the war on the side of the <b>entente</b>.</i>
<b>harmony</b>	The quality of forming a pleasing and consistent whole. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>pact</b>	A formal agreement between individuals or parties. <i>The country negotiated a trade <b>pact</b> with the US.</i>
<b>protocol</b>	An amendment or addition to a treaty or convention. <i><b>Protocol</b> forbids the prince from making any public statement in his defence.</i>
<b>rapport</b>	A relationship of mutual understanding or trust and agreement between people. <i>She had an instant <b>rapport</b> with animals.</i>
<b>settlement</b>	The action of allowing or helping people to establish settlements. <i>Most suppliers will offer early <b>settlement</b> discounts.</i>
<b>treaty</b>	A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<b>unanimity</b>	Everyone being of one mind. <i>There is almost complete <b>unanimity</b> on this issue.</i>
<b>unison</b>	Corresponding exactly. <i>Singing in <b>unison</b>.</i>

**unity**

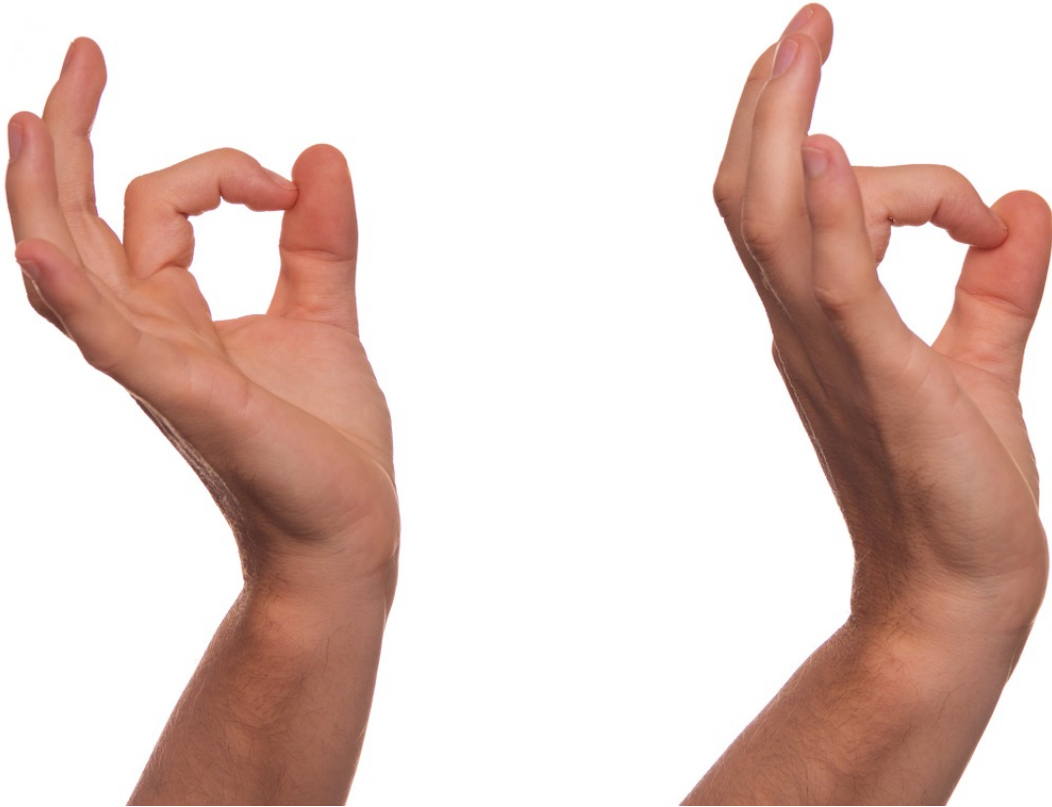

<b>agree</b>	Reach agreement about something after negotiation. <i>Everybody <b>agrees</b> that jobs will go.</i>
<b>allot</b>	Give or apportion (something) to someone. <i>I was <b>allotted</b> a little room in the servants block.</i>
<b>award</b>	Give as judged due or on the basis of merit. <i>A 3 5 per cent pay rise was <b>awarded</b> to staff.</i>
<b>be compatible</b>	Be identical to; be someone or something.
<b>be congruous</b>	Occupy a certain position or area.
<b>be consistent</b>	Have life, be alive.
<b>be consonant</b>	Have life, be alive.
<b>be in agreement</b>	Be priced at.

<b>cede</b>	Give over; surrender or relinquish to the physical control of another. <i>In 1874 the islands were <b>ceded</b> to Britain.</i>
<b><u>coincide</u></b>	Occur at the same time. <i>On Friday afternoons we generally <b>coincided</b>.</i>
<b><u>concede</u></b>	Be willing to concede. <i>He took an early lead which he never <b>conceded</b>.</i>
<b><u>concord</u></b>	Arrange by concord or agreement. <i>Both philosophers <b>concord</b> on this point.</i>
<b>concur</b>	Happen or occur at the same time; coincide. <i>That s right the chairman <b>concurred</b>.</i>
<b><u>consort</u></b>	Keep company with; hang out with. <i>You chose to <b>consort</b> with the enemy.</i>
<b><u>correlate</u></b>	To bear a reciprocal or mutual relation. <i>We should <b>correlate</b> general trends in public opinion with trends in the content of television news.</i>
<b><u>correspond</u></b>	Be equivalent or parallel, in mathematics. <i>My Russian pen pal and I have been <b>corresponding</b> for several years.</i>
<b>dovetail</b>	Join together by means of a dovetail. <i>Flights that <b>dovetail</b> with the working day.</i>
<b><u>equate</u></b>	Cause (two or more things) to be the same in quantity or value. <i>That sum <b>equates</b> to half a million pounds today.</i>
<b>fit in</b>	Satisfy a condition or restriction.
<b><u>give</u></b>	Give entirely to a specific person activity or cause. <i>Can I <b>give</b> you the children for the weekend.</i>
<b>grant</b>	Give over; surrender or relinquish to the physical control of another. <i><b>Grant</b> a degree.</i>
<b>hand</b>	Hold the hand of someone in order to guide them in a specified direction. <i><b>Hand</b> the elderly lady into the taxi.</i>
<b>harmonise</b>	Bring into consonance or accord.
<b>harmonize</b>	Add notes to (a melody) to produce harmony. <i>The colors don t <b>harmonize</b>.</i>
<b>match up</b>	Be equal to in quality or ability.
<b>present</b>	Present somebody with something usually to accuse or criticize. <i>We cannot <b>represent</b> this knowledge to our formal reason.</i>
<b><u>tally</u></b>	Agree or correspond. <i>Their signatures should <b>tally</b> with their names on the register.</i>

**vouchsafe**

Give or grant (something) to (someone) in a gracious or condescending manner.

*It is a blessing **vouchsafed** him by heaven.*

**yield**

Be fatally overwhelmed.

*This year s crop **yielded** 1 000 bushels of corn.*

<b>approve</b>	Give sanction to. <i>I don t <b>approve</b> of romance.</i>
<b>assent</b>	The expression of approval or agreement. <i>A loud murmur of <b>assent</b>.</i>
<b><u>coincide</u></b>	Go with, fall together. <i>The members of the College <b>coincide</b> in this opinion.</i>
<b><u>compromise</u></b>	Make a compromise arrive at a compromise. <i>A <b>compromise</b> between the freedom of the individual and the need to ensure orderly government.</i>
<b><u>concord</u></b>	Arrange the words of a text so as to create a concordance. <i>A pact of peace and <b>concord</b>.</i>
<b>concur</b>	Be in accord; be in agreement. <i>The authors <b>concurred</b> with the majority.</i>
<b>concurrence</b>	A state of cooperation. <i>The number of possible <b>concurrences</b> in the diagram.</i>
<b><u>conform</u></b>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The countryside should <b>conform</b> to a certain idea of the picturesque.</i>
<b>conformance</b>	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i><b>Conformance</b> testing.</i>
<b><u>consensus</u></b>	A general agreement. <i>Those rights and obligations are based on an unstated <b>consensus</b>.</i>
<b><u>consent</u></b>	Agree to do something. <i>No change may be made without the <b>consent</b> of all the partners.</i>
<b><u>correspond</u></b>	Communicate by exchanging letters, emails, or other messages. <i>Margaret <b>corresponded</b> with him until his death.</i>
<b><u>covenant</u></b>	Enter into a covenant or formal agreement. <i>There was a <b>covenant</b> between them that her name was never to be mentioned.</i>
<b><u>pact</u></b>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The country negotiated a trade <b>pact</b> with the US.</i>
<b>permission</b>	Approval to do something. <i>They had entered the country without <b>permission</b>.</i>
<b>ratification</b>	Making something valid by formally ratifying or confirming it. <i><b>Ratification</b> of the treaty raised problems in several member states.</i>

<b>ratify</b>	Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
<b>renege</b>	The mistake of not following suit when able to do so. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t <b>renege</b> him.</i>
<b>sanction</b>	Give sanction to. <i>Foreigners in France illegally should be sent home their employers <b>sanctioned</b> and border controls tightened up.</i>
<b>stipulate</b>	Demand or specify (a requirement), typically as part of an agreement. <i>He <b>stipulated</b> certain conditions before their marriage.</i>
<b>terms</b>	The amount of money needed to purchase something. <i>On good <b>terms</b> with her in laws.</i>
<b>treaty</b>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<b>unanimity</b>	Everyone being of one mind. <i>There is almost complete <b>unanimity</b> on this issue.</i>
<b>unanimously</b>	Without opposition; with the agreement of all people involved. <i>A committee of MPs has <b>unanimously</b> agreed to back his bill.</i>
