Associations of "Accreditation" (30 Words)

accepted	Generally approved or compelling recognition. <i>Several accepted techniques for treating the condition.</i>
accuracy	The quality or state of being correct or precise. <i>We have confidence in the accuracy of the statistics.</i>
acknowledge	Accept as legally binding and valid. <i>The art world has begun to acknowledge his genius.</i>
assurance	A binding commitment to do or give or refrain from something. <i>She drove with assurance.</i>
believe	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>There are those on the fringes of the Church who do not really believe.</i>
cognitive	Relating to cognition. <i>The cognitive processes involved in reading.</i>
confidence	A trustful relationship. <i>The girls exchanged confidences about their parents.</i>
<u>credible</u>	(a common but incorrect usage where `credulous' would be appropriate) credulous. <i>She was not the credible fool he expected.</i>
dependable	Financially sound. <i>A dependable supply of cold beer.</i>
enlighten	Shed light on (an object). <i>The sun enlightened some such clouds near him.</i>
established	Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established. <i>An established precedent.</i>
formally	In a formal manner. <i>The club will be formally recognized.</i>
identifiable	Able to be recognized; distinguishable. <i>There are no easily identifiable features on the shoreline.</i>

indubitable	Impossible to doubt; unquestionable. <i>An indubitable truth.</i>
informed	(of a decision or judgement) based on an understanding of the facts of the situation. <i>An informed public.</i>
know	The fact of being aware of information that is known to few people. <i>You are convinced you know your own baby from any other in the world.</i>
known	(of a quantity or variable) having a value that can be stated. <i>The known world.</i>
officially	In a formal and public way. <i>On June 24 the election campaign will officially begin.</i>
perceivable	Capable of being perceived especially by sight or hearing. <i>Perceivable through the mist.</i>
proven	Demonstrated by evidence or argument to be true or existing. <i>A proven ability to work hard.</i>
realization	The way in which a particular linguistic feature is used in speech or writing on a particular occasion. <i>Realization dawned suddenly.</i>
realize	Cause to happen. <i>It is only now that she is beginning to realize her potential.</i>
recognize	Detect with the senses. <i>Countries which recognized East Germany.</i>
recognized	Generally approved or compelling recognition. <i>A recognized authority.</i>
reliable	A reliable person or thing. <i>A reliable source of information.</i>
sentient	Consciously perceiving- W.A.White. <i>The living knew themselves just sentient puppets on God's stage.</i>
tested	Tested and proved useful or correct. <i>A tested method.</i>
trust	An organization or company managed by trustees. <i>All persons are forbid to trust sailors.</i>
trustworthy	Worthy of trust or belief. <i>An experienced and trustworthy traveling companion.</i>
understandable	To be expected; natural, reasonable, or forgivable. <i>Though his accent was strange the words were perfectly understandable.</i>
