*She was painting **commissioned** portraits in her late teens.*

licenced Given official approval to act.

licensed Given official approval to act.

***Licensed** pharmacist.*

| informed | (of a decision or judgement) based on an understanding of the facts of the situation. <i>She lacks the ability to make an informed decision.</i> |
