- *Given official approval to act.*

### Synonyms of "Accredited" as an adjective (3 Words)

**commissioned** Holding by virtue of a commission a rank of second lieutenant or ensign or above.

*She was painting **commissioned** portraits in her late teens.*

**licenced** Given official approval to act.

**licensed** Given official approval to act.

***Licensed** pharmacist.*

<b>accuracy</b>	The quality of being near to the true value. <i>He was beginning to doubt the <b>accuracy</b> of his compass.</i>
<b>acknowledge</b>	Accept or admit the existence or truth of. <i>Henry <b>acknowledged</b> Richard as his heir.</i>
<b>assurance</b>	Certainty about something. <i>She drove with <b>assurance</b>.</i>
<b>believe</b>	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>The deal is <b>believed</b> to be worth around 15 million.</i>
<b>cognitive</b>	Relating to cognition. <i>The <b>cognitive</b> processes involved in reading.</i>
<b>confidence</b>	The feeling or belief that one can have faith in or rely on someone or something. <i>Public <b>confidence</b> in the economy.</i>
<b>credible</b>	Credulous. <i>Few people found his story <b>credible</b>.</i>
<b>dependable</b>	Worthy of being depended on. <i><b>Dependable</b> in one's habits.</i>
<b>enlighten</b>	Give spiritual insight to; in religion. <i>Christopher had not <b>enlightened</b> Francis as to their relationship.</i>
<b>established</b>	Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established. <i>The <b>established</b> social order.</i>
<b>formally</b>	In accordance with convention or etiquette. <i><b>Formally</b> complex types of text.</i>
<b>identifiable</b>	Capable of being identified. <i>There are no easily <b>identifiable</b> features on the shoreline.</i>
<b>indubitable</b>	Too obvious to be doubted. <i>An <b>indubitable</b> truth.</i>
<b>informed</b>	(of a decision or judgement) based on an understanding of the facts of the situation. <i>She lacks the ability to make an <b>informed</b> decision.</i>
<b>know</b>	The fact of being aware of information that is known to few people. <i>I <b>know</b> what I'm doing.</i>

<b>known</b>	Recognized, familiar, or within the scope of knowledge. <i>Plants little <b>known</b> to western science.</i>
<b>officially</b>	In an official role. <i>There is a possibility he was murdered <b>officially</b> he died in a car smash.</i>
<b>perceivable</b>	Capable of being apprehended or understood. <i><b>Perceivable</b> through the mist.</i>
<b><u>proven</u></b>	Demonstrated by evidence or argument to be true or existing. <i>A system based on <b>proven</b> technologies.</i>
<b>realization</b>	An actual form given to a concept or work. <i>The victory was the <b>realization</b> of a whole year s work.</i>
<b>realize</b>	Perceive (an idea or situation) mentally. <i>He <b>realized</b> all the assets in her trust fund.</i>
<b>recognize</b>	Show approval or appreciation of. <i>These qualifications are <b>recognized</b> by the Department of Education.</i>
<b>recognized</b>	Generally approved or compelling recognition. <i>A <b>recognized</b> authority.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	A reliable person or thing. <i>A <b>reliable</b> source of information.</i>
<b><u>sentient</u></b>	Able to perceive or feel things. <i>The living knew themselves just <b>sentient</b> puppets on God s stage.</i>
<b><u>tested</u></b>	Tested and proved to be reliable. <i>A <b>tested</b> method.</i>
<b>trust</b>	Confer a trust upon. <i>Don t <b>trust</b> my ex wife I won t pay her debts anymore.</i>
<b><u>trustworthy</u></b>	Able to be relied on as honest or truthful. <i>Leave a spare key with a <b>trustworthy</b> neighbour.</i>
<b>understandable</b>	Capable of being apprehended or understood. <i>Such fears are <b>understandable</b>.</i>
