## Accrue as a Verb

### Definitions of "Accrue" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “accrue” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Make provision for (a charge) at the end of a financial period for work that has been done but not yet invoiced.*
- *Grow by addition.*
- *Accumulate or receive (payments or benefits) over time.*
- *(of a benefit or sum of money) be received by someone in regular or increasing amounts over time.*
- *Come into the possession of.*

### Synonyms of "Accrue" as a verb (19 Words)

**accumulate** Get or gather together.  
*The toxin **accumulated** in their bodies.*

**amass** Collect or gather.  
*He **amassed** a fortune estimated at close to a million pounds.*

<b>arise</b>	Take part in a rebellion; renounce a former allegiance. <i>New difficulties had <b>arisen</b>.</i>
<b>augment</b>	Enlarge or increase. <i>He <b>augmented</b> his summer income by painting houses.</i>
<b>be added</b>	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
<b>build up</b>	Give form to, according to a plan.
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>A rider should want to be able to <b>collect</b> a horse when hacking.</i>
<b><u>emanate</u></b>	Give out or emit (a feeling, quality, or sensation). <i>Warmth <b>emanated</b> from the fireplace.</i>
<b><u>ensue</u></b>	Happen or occur afterwards or as a result. <i>The difficulties which <b>ensued</b> from their commitment to Cuba.</i>
<b>fall</b>	Come as if by falling. <i>Bombs could be seen <b>falling</b> from the planes.</i>
<b>flow</b>	Cause to flow. <i>Her long black hair <b>flowed</b> down her back.</i>
<b>follow</b>	Follow in or as if in pursuit. <i>This argument simply doesn't <b>follow</b>.</i>
<b><u>gather</u></b>	Collect or gather. <i>Information that we have <b>gathered</b> about people.</i>
<b>grow</b>	Cultivate by growing often involving improvements by means of agricultural techniques. <i><b>Grown</b> men don't act so stupidly.</i>
<b>increase</b>	Become bigger or greater in amount. <i>We are aiming to <b>increase</b> awareness of social issues.</i>
<b>mount up</b>	Go upward with gradual or continuous progress.
<b>result</b>	Produce as a result or residue. <i>Anger may <b>result</b> from an argument.</i>
<b>spring</b>	Spring back spring away from an impact. <i>He might <b>spring</b> a few shillings more.</i>
<b><u>stem</u></b>	Remove the stems from fruit or tobacco leaves. <i><b>Stem</b> the tide.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Accrue" as a verb

- *All customs duties accrued to the federal government.*
- *They accrue entitlements to holiday pay.*

- *At 31 December the amount due for the final quarter is accrued.*
- *The interest accrues.*
- *Financial benefits will accrue from restructuring.*
- *The house accrued to the oldest son.*

## Associations of "Accrue" (30 Words)

<b>amortization</b>	Payment of an obligation in a series of installments or transfers. <i>75 of the mortgages have an <b>amortization</b> of 25 years or less.</i>
<b>bank</b>	A building in which the business of banking transacted. <i>A grassy <b>bank</b>.</i>
<b>cash</b>	Exchange for cash. <i>The bank <b>cached</b> her cheque.</i>
<b>complimentary</b>	Costing nothing. <i><b>Complimentary</b> remarks.</i>
<b>cost</b>	(of an object or action) require the payment of (a specified sum of money) before it can be acquired or done. <i><b>Costs</b> may be awarded to a successful private prosecutor out of central funds.</i>
<b>debt</b>	A sum of money that is owed or due. <i>He is badly in <b>debt</b>.</i>
<b>default</b>	Declare a party to have defaulted and give judgement against that party. <i>Two semi finalists were <b>defaulted</b>.</i>
<b>deposit</b>	Matter that has been deposited by some natural process. <i>Areas of mineral <b>deposits</b>.</i>
<b>depositor</b>	A person who keeps money in a bank or building society account.
<b>disbursement</b>	The act of spending or disbursing money. <i>They established a committee to supervise the <b>disbursement</b> of aid.</i>
<b>expenditure</b>	The action of spending funds. <i>Cuts in public <b>expenditure</b>.</i>
<b>expense</b>	Charge something to an expense account. <i>I can <b>expense</b> the refreshments.</i>
<b>gratis</b>	Without charge; free. <i>I ll give you this <b>gratis</b>.</i>
<b>honorarium</b>	A fee paid for a nominally free service.
<b>installment</b>	A part of a published serial.

<b>lender</b>	Someone who lends money or gives credit in business matters. <i>A mortgage <b>lender</b>.</i>
<b>loan</b>	Lend (a sum of money or item of property). <i>Borrowers can take out a <b>loan</b> for 84 000.</i>
<b>mortgage</b>	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>The estate was <b>mortgaged</b> up to the hilt.</i>
<b>overdue</b>	(of a library book) retained longer than the period allowed. <i>An <b>overdue</b> installment.</i>
<b>owing</b>	Owed as a debt. <i>No rent was <b>owing</b>.</i>
<b>payment</b>	A sum of money paid or a claim discharged. <i>Three interest free monthly <b>payments</b>.</i>
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
<b>refund</b>	Pay back money to. <i>You may be allowed to claim a <b>refund</b> of the tax.</i>
<b>reimbursement</b>	A sum paid to cover money that has been spent or lost. <i>The family received insurance <b>reimbursements</b>.</i>
<b>repayment</b>	An amount of money paid back. <i>Minimum monthly <b>repayments</b>.</i>
<b>salary</b>	Pay a salary to. <i>A 15 per cent <b>salary</b> increase.</i>
<b>save</b>	Save from ruin destruction or harm. <i><b>Save</b> it Joey I m in big trouble now.</i>
<b>stinginess</b>	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.
<b>unpaid</b>	(of work or a period of leave) undertaken without payment. <i><b>Unpaid</b> extras in the documentary.</i>
<b>wages</b>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The <b>wages</b> of sin is death.</i>
