Accrue as a Verb

Definitions of "Accrue" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “accrue” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Make provision for (a charge) at the end of a financial period for work that has been done but not yet invoiced.*
- *Grow by addition.*
- *Accumulate or receive (payments or benefits) over time.*
- *(of a benefit or sum of money) be received by someone in regular or increasing amounts over time.*
- *Come into the possession of.*

Synonyms of "Accrue" as a verb (19 Words)

accumulate Get or gather together.
*The toxin **accumulated** in their bodies.*

amass Collect or gather.
*He **amassed** a fortune estimated at close to a million pounds.*

arise	Take part in a rebellion; renounce a former allegiance. <i>New difficulties had arisen.</i>
augment	Enlarge or increase. <i>He augmented his summer income by painting houses.</i>
be added	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
build up	Give form to, according to a plan.
collect	Gather or collect. <i>A rider should want to be able to collect a horse when hacking.</i>
<u>emanate</u>	Give out or emit (a feeling, quality, or sensation). <i>Warmth emanated from the fireplace.</i>
<u>ensue</u>	Happen or occur afterwards or as a result. <i>The difficulties which ensued from their commitment to Cuba.</i>
fall	Come as if by falling. <i>Bombs could be seen falling from the planes.</i>
flow	Cause to flow. <i>Her long black hair flowed down her back.</i>
follow	Follow in or as if in pursuit. <i>This argument simply doesn't follow.</i>
<u>gather</u>	Collect or gather. <i>Information that we have gathered about people.</i>
grow	Cultivate by growing often involving improvements by means of agricultural techniques. <i>Grown men don't act so stupidly.</i>
increase	Become bigger or greater in amount. <i>We are aiming to increase awareness of social issues.</i>
mount up	Go upward with gradual or continuous progress.
result	Produce as a result or residue. <i>Anger may result from an argument.</i>
spring	Spring back spring away from an impact. <i>He might spring a few shillings more.</i>
<u>stem</u>	Remove the stems from fruit or tobacco leaves. <i>Stem the tide.</i>

Usage Examples of "Accrue" as a verb

- *All customs duties accrued to the federal government.*
- *They accrue entitlements to holiday pay.*

- *At 31 December the amount due for the final quarter is accrued.*
- *The interest accrues.*
- *Financial benefits will accrue from restructuring.*
- *The house accrued to the oldest son.*

amortization	Payment of an obligation in a series of installments or transfers. <i>75 of the mortgages have an amortization of 25 years or less.</i>
bank	A building in which the business of banking transacted. <i>A grassy bank.</i>
cash	Exchange for cash. <i>The bank cached her cheque.</i>
complimentary	Costing nothing. <i>Complimentary remarks.</i>
cost	(of an object or action) require the payment of (a specified sum of money) before it can be acquired or done. <i>Costs may be awarded to a successful private prosecutor out of central funds.</i>
debt	A sum of money that is owed or due. <i>He is badly in debt.</i>
default	Declare a party to have defaulted and give judgement against that party. <i>Two semi finalists were defaulted.</i>
deposit	Matter that has been deposited by some natural process. <i>Areas of mineral deposits.</i>
depositor	A person who keeps money in a bank or building society account.
disbursement	The act of spending or disbursing money. <i>They established a committee to supervise the disbursement of aid.</i>
expenditure	The action of spending funds. <i>Cuts in public expenditure.</i>
expense	Charge something to an expense account. <i>I can expense the refreshments.</i>
gratis	Without charge; free. <i>I ll give you this gratis.</i>
honorarium	A fee paid for a nominally free service.
installment	A part of a published serial.

lender	Someone who lends money or gives credit in business matters. <i>A mortgage lender.</i>
<u>loan</u>	Lend (a sum of money or item of property). <i>Borrowers can take out a loan for 84 000.</i>
mortgage	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>The estate was mortgaged up to the hilt.</i>
overdue	(of a library book) retained longer than the period allowed. <i>An overdue installment.</i>
owing	Owed as a debt. <i>No rent was owing.</i>
payment	A sum of money paid or a claim discharged. <i>Three interest free monthly payments.</i>
rates	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
refund	Pay back money to. <i>You may be allowed to claim a refund of the tax.</i>
reimbursement	A sum paid to cover money that has been spent or lost. <i>The family received insurance reimbursements.</i>
repayment	An amount of money paid back. <i>Minimum monthly repayments.</i>
<u>salary</u>	Pay a salary to. <i>A 15 per cent salary increase.</i>
<u>save</u>	Save from ruin destruction or harm. <i>Save it Joey I m in big trouble now.</i>
stinginess	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.
unpaid	(of work or a period of leave) undertaken without payment. <i>Unpaid extras in the documentary.</i>
<u>wages</u>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The wages of sin is death.</i>
