### Definitions of "Accumulate" as a verb

- *Get or gather together.*
- *Collect or gather.*
- *Gather together or acquire an increasing number or quantity of.*
- *Gather; build up.*



## Synonyms of "Accumulate" as a verb (16 Words)

<b>acquire</b>	Gain through experience. <i>He <b>acquired</b> a reputation for scrupulous honesty.</i>
<b>amass</b>	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>The soldiers were <b>amassing</b> from all parts of Spain.</i>
<b><u>assemble</u></b>	Cause (people or things) to gather together for a common purpose. <i>A crowd had <b>assembled</b> outside the gates.</i>
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>We <b>collected</b> over a million dollars in outstanding debts.</i>
<b><u>compile</u></b>	Put together out of existing material. <i>The local authority must <b>compile</b> a list of the names and addresses of taxpayers.</i>
<b>conglomerate</b>	Form a conglomerate by merging diverse firms. <i>Atoms which <b>conglomerate</b> at the centre.</i>

<b>cumulate</b>	Gather together and combine. <i>All unpaid dividend payments <b>cumulate</b> and are paid when earnings are sufficient.</i>
<b>draw together</b>	Represent by making a drawing of, as with a pencil, chalk, etc. on a surface.
<b>gather</b>	Collect or gather. <i>The destroyer <b>gathered</b> speed.</i>
<b>gather together</b>	Assemble or get together.
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>She didn't <b>get</b> to Chicago until after midnight.</i>
<b>hoard</b>	Save up as for future use. <i>He <b>hoarded</b> the memory in his heart.</i>
<b>join together</b>	Come into the company of.
<b>obtain</b>	Receive a specified treatment (abstract). <i>The price of silver fell to that <b>obtaining</b> elsewhere in the ancient world.</i>
<b>pile up</b>	Arrange in stacks.
<b>roll up</b>	Flatten or spread with a roller.

- *The toxin accumulated in their bodies.*
- *Her goal was to accumulate a huge fortune.*

<b>agglomeration</b>	The act of collecting in a mass; the act of agglomerating. <i>The arts centre is an <b>agglomeration</b> of theatres galleries shops restaurants and bars.</i>
<b>amass</b>	Collect or gather. <i>He <b>amassed</b> a fortune estimated at close to a million pounds.</i>
<b>assemble</b>	Create by putting components or members together. <i>A crowd had <b>assembled</b> outside the gates.</i>
<b>batch</b>	Batch together assemble or process as a batch. <i>A <b>batch</b> of letters.</i>
<b>bunch</b>	Form into a bunch. <i>She <b>bunched</b> her fingers into a fist.</i>
<b>bundle</b>	Make into a bundle. <i>She quickly <b>bundled</b> up her clothes.</i>
<b>caisson</b>	A large watertight chamber, open at the bottom, from which the water is kept out by air pressure and in which construction work may be carried out under water.
<b>cluster</b>	Form a cluster or clusters. <i>The children <b>clustered</b> round her skirts.</i>
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>I called my mother <b>collect</b>.</i>
<b>collection</b>	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>The <b>collection</b> of data.</i>
<b>compost</b>	Make vegetable matter or manure into compost. <i>Cover with a layer of fine <b>compost</b>.</i>
<b>cumulate</b>	An igneous rock formed by gravitational settling of particles in a magma. <i>They appear to have formed from <b>cumulates</b> in the root of a magma chamber.</i>
<b>deposition</b>	The removal of the body of Christ from the Cross. <i>A commissioner to take <b>depositions</b> from witnesses.</i>
<b>gather</b>	Collect or gather. <i>She <b>gathered</b> the child in her arms.</i>
<b>gathered</b>	Brought together in one place. <i>The <b>gathered</b> folds of the skirt.</i>
<b>heap</b>	Put objects or a loose substance in a heap. <i>Clouds <b>heaped</b> higher in the west.</i>
<b>hoard</b>	Get or gather together. <i>A <b>hoard</b> of Romano British bronzes.</i>

<b><u>jam</u></b>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>An ultra catchy <b>jam</b> driven by the drums but given substance by the interjection of horns.</i>
<b>nucleate</b>	Form into a nucleus. <i>Pyrite may <b>nucleate</b> on plant stems and seeds.</i>
<b><u>overload</u></b>	Become overloaded. <i>The staff are heavily <b>overloaded</b> with casework.</i>
<b><u>pack</u></b>	Have the property of being packable or of compacting easily. <i>The reports were a <b>pack</b> of lies.</i>
<b>pile</b>	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>His in tray was <b>piled</b> high with papers.</i>
<b>pileup</b>	Multiple collisions of vehicles.
<b>sheaf</b>	A bundle of grain stalks laid lengthways and tied together after reaping. <i>The corn and barley had to be <b>sheafed</b> and stoked.</i>
<b><u>stack</u></b>	Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things. <i>The new premises provided a reading room and a <b>stack</b> room.</i>
<b>ton</b>	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>All of a sudden I had <b>tons</b> of friends.</i>
