Synonyms of "Accumulate" as a verb (16 Words)

acquire	Gain through experience. <i>He acquired a reputation for scrupulous honesty.</i>
amass	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>The soldiers were amassing from all parts of Spain.</i>
<u>assemble</u>	Cause (people or things) to gather together for a common purpose. <i>A crowd had assembled outside the gates.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>We collected over a million dollars in outstanding debts.</i>
<u>compile</u>	Put together out of existing material. <i>The local authority must compile a list of the names and addresses of taxpayers.</i>
conglomerate	Form a conglomerate by merging diverse firms. <i>Atoms which conglomerate at the centre.</i>

cumulate	Gather together and combine. <i>All unpaid dividend payments cumulate and are paid when earnings are sufficient.</i>
draw together	Represent by making a drawing of, as with a pencil, chalk, etc. on a surface.
<u>gather</u>	Collect or gather. <i>The destroyer gathered speed.</i>
gather together	Assemble or get together.
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>She didn't get to Chicago until after midnight.</i>
<u>hoard</u>	Save up as for future use. <i>He hoarded the memory in his heart.</i>
join together	Come into the company of.
obtain	Receive a specified treatment (abstract). <i>The price of silver fell to that obtaining elsewhere in the ancient world.</i>
pile up	Arrange in stacks.
roll up	Flatten or spread with a roller.

- *The toxin accumulated in their bodies.*
- *Her goal was to accumulate a huge fortune.*

accrete	Grow or become attached by accretion. <i>The gas will cool and then accrete to the galaxy's core.</i>
<u>accumulation</u>	An increase by natural growth or addition. <i>The accumulation of wealth.</i>
agglomerate	Volcanic rock consisting of large fragments fused together. <i>An agglomerated flower head.</i>

agglomeration	The act of collecting in a mass; the act of agglomerating. <i>The arts centre is an agglomeration of theatres galleries shops restaurants and bars.</i>
amass	Collect or gather. <i>He amassed a fortune estimated at close to a million pounds.</i>
assemble	Create by putting components or members together. <i>A crowd had assembled outside the gates.</i>
batch	Batch together assemble or process as a batch. <i>A batch of letters.</i>
bunch	Form into a bunch. <i>She bunched her fingers into a fist.</i>
bundle	Make into a bundle. <i>She quickly bundled up her clothes.</i>
caisson	A large watertight chamber, open at the bottom, from which the water is kept out by air pressure and in which construction work may be carried out under water.
cluster	Form a cluster or clusters. <i>The children clustered round her skirts.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>I called my mother collect.</i>
collection	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>The collection of data.</i>
compost	Make vegetable matter or manure into compost. <i>Cover with a layer of fine compost.</i>
cumulate	An igneous rock formed by gravitational settling of particles in a magma. <i>They appear to have formed from cumulates in the root of a magma chamber.</i>
deposition	The removal of the body of Christ from the Cross. <i>A commissioner to take depositions from witnesses.</i>
gather	Collect or gather. <i>She gathered the child in her arms.</i>
gathered	Brought together in one place. <i>The gathered folds of the skirt.</i>
heap	Put objects or a loose substance in a heap. <i>Clouds heaped higher in the west.</i>
hoard	Get or gather together. <i>A hoard of Romano British bronzes.</i>

<u>jam</u>	<p>A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock.</p> <p>An ultra catchy jam driven by the drums but given substance by the interjection of horns.</p>
nucleate	<p>Form into a nucleus.</p> <p>Pyrite may nucleate on plant stems and seeds.</p>
<u>overload</u>	<p>Become overloaded.</p> <p>The staff are heavily overloaded with casework.</p>
<u>pack</u>	<p>Have the property of being packable or of compacting easily.</p> <p>The reports were a pack of lies.</p>
pile	<p>Place or lay as if in a pile.</p> <p>His in tray was piled high with papers.</p>
pileup	<p>Multiple collisions of vehicles.</p>
sheaf	<p>A bundle of grain stalks laid lengthways and tied together after reaping.</p> <p>The corn and barley had to be sheafed and stooked.</p>
<u>stack</u>	<p>Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things.</p> <p>The new premises provided a reading room and a stack room.</p>
ton	<p>A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft.</p> <p>All of a sudden I had tons of friends.</p>
