<b>aggregation</b>	(on the internet) the collection of related items of content so that they can be displayed or linked to. <i>A single dose of aspirin irreversibly inhibits the normal <b>aggregation</b> of platelets.</i>
<b>assemblage</b>	A machine or object made of pieces fitted together. <i>The <b>assemblage</b> of electronic image and text databases.</i>
<b>assembling</b>	The act of gathering something together.
<b><u>assembly</u></b>	A group of people elected to make laws or decisions for a particular country or region. <i>He was told off for talking in <b>assembly</b>.</i>
<b>bank</b>	An elevation in the seabed or a riverbed a mudbank or sandbank. <i>They pulled the canoe up on the <b>bank</b>.</i>
<b>building up</b>	The commercial activity involved in repairing old structures or constructing new ones.
<b>collection</b>	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>She left the envelope in the office for <b>collection</b>.</i>
<b>cumulation</b>	A collection of objects laid on top of each other.
<b>fund</b>	A supply of something available for future use. <i>A vast <b>fund</b> of information.</i>
<b>gathering</b>	The act of gathering something. <i>A family <b>gathering</b>.</i>
<b><u>heap</u></b>	An untidy or dilapidated place or vehicle. <i>A <b>heap</b> of gravel.</i>
<b><u>hoard</u></b>	A secret store of valuables or money. <i>A <b>hoard</b> of Romano British bronzes.</i>
<b>hoarding</b>	A secret store of valuables or money.
<b><u>mass</u></b>	The common people generally. <i>Multiply the <b>mass</b> of the payload by the distance travelled.</i>
<b><u>mine</u></b>	Excavation in the earth from which ores and minerals are extracted.
<b>pile</b>	A nuclear reactor that uses controlled nuclear fission to generate energy. <i>He s making <b>piles</b> of money.</i>
<b><u>pool</u></b>	Something resembling a pool of liquid. <i>A car <b>pool</b>.</i>
<b><u>reserve</u></b>	A member of the military reserve. <i>The bank built up a cash <b>reserve</b> of 2bn to meet any run on the bank once the loss was revealed.</i>

<b><u>reservoir</u></b>	A population, tissue, etc. which is chronically infested with the causative agent of a disease and can act as a source of further infection. <i>There is a vast <b>reservoir</b> of herpes infection in the community.</i>
<b><u>stack</u></b>	A large tall chimney through which combustion gases and smoke can be evacuated. <i>The new premises provided a reading room and a <b>stack</b> room.</i>
<b><u>stock</u></b>	Farm animals such as cattle pigs and sheep bred and kept for their meat or milk livestock. <i>His <b>stock</b> was so high he could have been elected mayor.</i>
<b>stockpile</b>	A large accumulated stock of goods or materials, especially one held in reserve for use at a time of shortage or other emergency. <i>A <b>stockpile</b> of nuclear weapons.</i>
<b>stockpiling</b>	Accumulating and storing a reserve supply. <i>The <b>stockpiling</b> of war materials.</i>
<b><u>store</u></b>	A place where things are kept for future use or sale. <i>Cupboards for medical <b>stores</b>.</i>

(with reference to matter or a body) come or bring together under the influence of gravitation.

*Ice that had **accreted** grotesquely into stalactites.*

<b>accretion</b>	An increase in land resulting from alluvial deposits or waterborne sediment. <i>During the later stages of <b>accretion</b> the outer 100 km or so of the Moon melted.</i>
<b>accumulate</b>	Get or gather together. <i>Investigators have yet to <b>accumulate</b> enough evidence.</i>
<b>agglomeration</b>	The act of collecting in a mass; the act of agglomerating. <i>The arts centre is an <b>agglomeration</b> of theatres galleries shops restaurants and bars.</i>
<b>aggregation</b>	A cluster of things that have come or been brought together. <i>A desktop <b>aggregation</b> app that brings together Facebook Twitter and LinkedIn.</i>
<b>amass</b>	Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>She is <b>amassing</b> a lot of data for her thesis.</i>
<b>assemblage</b>	A machine or object made of pieces fitted together. <i>A loose <b>assemblage</b> of diverse groups.</i>
<b>assemble</b>	Cause (people or things) to gather together for a common purpose. <i>The males <b>assemble</b> and hang by their front legs within a yard or two of the female.</i>
<b>bundle</b>	Make into a bundle. <i>They <b>bundled</b> out into the corridor.</i>
<b>cluster</b>	Form a cluster or clusters. <i>Ten <b>clusters</b> from all the primary health centres were selected.</i>
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>He lost control of the truck and <b>collected</b> two cats.</i>
<b>collection</b>	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>A preview of their autumn <b>collection</b>.</i>
<b>congregate</b>	Gather into a crowd or mass. <i>Some 4 000 demonstrators had <b>congregated</b> at a border point.</i>
<b>cumulate</b>	Collect or gather. <i>The systems <b>cumulate</b> data over a period of years.</i>
<b>deposition</b>	A pretrial interrogation of a witness; usually conducted in a lawyer's office. <i>The <b>deposition</b> of four expert witnesses.</i>
<b>flock</b>	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>Tourists <b>flock</b> to Oxford in their thousands.</i>

<b>gather</b>	Collect or gather. <i>Let s <b>gather</b> in the dining room.</i>
<b>gathering</b>	The act of gathering something. <i>A family <b>gathering</b>.</i>
<b>glycogen</b>	A substance deposited in bodily tissues as a store of carbohydrates. It is a polysaccharide which forms glucose on hydrolysis.
<b>heap</b>	Form a heap. <i>Clouds <b>heaped</b> higher in the west.</i>
<b>hoard</b>	A stock or store of money or valued objects, typically one that is secret or carefully guarded. <i>A <b>hoard</b> of Romano British bronzes.</i>
<b>jam</b>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>The band dedicated about a quarter of the set to new <b>jams</b>.</i>
<b>nucleate</b>	Having a nucleus. <i>Small villages <b>nucleate</b> into larger towns and eventually become cities.</i>
<b>overproduction</b>	Too much production or more than expected. <i>There was a crisis of <b>overproduction</b> in traditional manufacturing.</i>
<b>pile</b>	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>My students <b>piled</b> out of three cars.</i>
<b>pileup</b>	Multiple collisions of vehicles.
<b>sheaf</b>	A bundle of objects of one kind, especially papers. <i>The corn and barley had to be <b>sheafed</b> and stooked.</i>
<b>stack</b>	Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things. <i>The odds were <b>stacked</b> against Fiji in the World Cup.</i>
<b>stacked</b>	Having sections that are arranged vertically. <i>The new boots you buy will be leather with <b>stacked</b> heels.</i>
<b>ton</b>	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>He scored 102 not out his third <b>ton</b> of the tour.</i>
