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| aggregation | (on the internet) the collection of related items of content so that they can be displayed or linked to. <i>A single dose of aspirin irreversibly inhibits the normal aggregation of platelets.</i> |
| assemblage | A machine or object made of pieces fitted together. <i>The assemblage of electronic image and text databases.</i> |
| assembling | The act of gathering something together. |
| <u>assembly</u> | A group of people elected to make laws or decisions for a particular country or region. <i>He was told off for talking in assembly.</i> |
| bank | An elevation in the seabed or a riverbed a mudbank or sandbank. <i>They pulled the canoe up on the bank.</i> |
| building up | The commercial activity involved in repairing old structures or constructing new ones. |
| collection | A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>She left the envelope in the office for collection.</i> |
| cumulation | A collection of objects laid on top of each other. |
| fund | A supply of something available for future use. <i>A vast fund of information.</i> |
| gathering | The act of gathering something. <i>A family gathering.</i> |
| <u>heap</u> | An untidy or dilapidated place or vehicle. <i>A heap of gravel.</i> |
| <u>hoard</u> | A secret store of valuables or money. <i>A hoard of Romano British bronzes.</i> |
| hoarding | A secret store of valuables or money. |
| <u>mass</u> | The common people generally. <i>Multiply the mass of the payload by the distance travelled.</i> |
| <u>mine</u> | Excavation in the earth from which ores and minerals are extracted. |
| pile | A nuclear reactor that uses controlled nuclear fission to generate energy. <i>He s making piles of money.</i> |
| <u>pool</u> | Something resembling a pool of liquid. <i>A car pool.</i> |
| <u>reserve</u> | A member of the military reserve. <i>The bank built up a cash reserve of 2bn to meet any run on the bank once the loss was revealed.</i> |

- reservoir** A population, tissue, etc. which is chronically infested with the causative agent of a disease and can act as a source of further infection.
*There is a vast **reservoir** of herpes infection in the community.*
- stack** A large tall chimney through which combustion gases and smoke can be evacuated.
*The new premises provided a reading room and a **stack** room.*
- stock** Farm animals such as cattle pigs and sheep bred and kept for their meat or milk livestock.
*His **stock** was so high he could have been elected mayor.*
- stockpile** A large accumulated stock of goods or materials, especially one held in reserve for use at a time of shortage or other emergency.
*A **stockpile** of nuclear weapons.*
- stockpiling** Accumulating and storing a reserve supply.
*The **stockpiling** of war materials.*
- store** A place where things are kept for future use or sale.
*Cupboards for medical **stores**.*

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| accretion | An increase in land resulting from alluvial deposits or waterborne sediment. <i>During the later stages of accretion the outer 100 km or so of the Moon melted.</i> |
| accumulate | Get or gather together. <i>Investigators have yet to accumulate enough evidence.</i> |
| agglomeration | The act of collecting in a mass; the act of agglomerating. <i>The arts centre is an agglomeration of theatres galleries shops restaurants and bars.</i> |
| aggregation | A cluster of things that have come or been brought together. <i>A desktop aggregation app that brings together Facebook Twitter and LinkedIn.</i> |
| amass | Gather together or accumulate (a large amount or number of material or things) over a period of time. <i>She is amassing a lot of data for her thesis.</i> |
| assemblage | A machine or object made of pieces fitted together. <i>A loose assemblage of diverse groups.</i> |
| assemble | Cause (people or things) to gather together for a common purpose. <i>The males assemble and hang by their front legs within a yard or two of the female.</i> |
| bundle | Make into a bundle. <i>They bundled out into the corridor.</i> |
| cluster | Form a cluster or clusters. <i>Ten clusters from all the primary health centres were selected.</i> |
| collect | Gather or collect. <i>He lost control of the truck and collected two cats.</i> |
| collection | A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>A preview of their autumn collection.</i> |
| congregate | Gather into a crowd or mass. <i>Some 4 000 demonstrators had congregated at a border point.</i> |
| cumulate | Collect or gather. <i>The systems cumulate data over a period of years.</i> |
| deposition | A pretrial interrogation of a witness; usually conducted in a lawyer's office. <i>The deposition of four expert witnesses.</i> |
| flock | Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>Tourists flock to Oxford in their thousands.</i> |

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| gather | Collect or gather. <i>Let s gather in the dining room.</i> |
| gathering | The act of gathering something. <i>A family gathering.</i> |
| glycogen | A substance deposited in bodily tissues as a store of carbohydrates. It is a polysaccharide which forms glucose on hydrolysis. |
| heap | Form a heap. <i>Clouds heaped higher in the west.</i> |
| hoard | A stock or store of money or valued objects, typically one that is secret or carefully guarded. <i>A hoard of Romano British bronzes.</i> |
| jam | A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>The band dedicated about a quarter of the set to new jams.</i> |
| nucleate | Having a nucleus. <i>Small villages nucleate into larger towns and eventually become cities.</i> |
| overproduction | Too much production or more than expected. <i>There was a crisis of overproduction in traditional manufacturing.</i> |
| pile | Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>My students piled out of three cars.</i> |
| pileup | Multiple collisions of vehicles. |
| sheaf | A bundle of objects of one kind, especially papers. <i>The corn and barley had to be sheafed and stooked.</i> |
| stack | Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things. <i>The odds were stacked against Fiji in the World Cup.</i> |
| stacked | Having sections that are arranged vertically. <i>The new boots you buy will be leather with stacked heels.</i> |
| ton | A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>He scored 102 not out his third ton of the tour.</i> |
