| habitual | Commonly used or practiced; usual. <i>His habitual comment.</i> |
| normal | Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Dilute the stock solution with sterile water or normal saline.</i> |
| ordinary | Lacking special distinction, rank, or status; commonly encountered. <i>He sets out to depict ordinary people.</i> |
| prevailing | Existing at a particular time; current. <i>The unfavourable prevailing economic conditions.</i> |
| regular | In accord with regular practice or procedure. <i>Policies carried on by his ministers through regular channels.</i> |
| routine | Performed as part of a regular procedure rather than for a special reason. <i>The Ministry insisted that this was just a routine annual drill.</i> |
| set | Set down according to a plan. <i>We are set to go at any time.</i> |
| settled | Inhabited by colonists. <i>I don't feel entirely settled here.</i> |
| standard | Conforming to or constituting a standard of measurement or value or of the usual or regularized or accepted kind. <i>Standard brands.</i> |
| stock | Of a product or type of product usually kept in stock and thus regularly available for sale. <i>A stock answer.</i> |
| traditional | Pertaining to time-honored orthodox doctrines. <i>The simple security of traditional assumptions has vanished.</i> |
| typical | Representative as a symbol; symbolic. <i>A typical example of 1930s art deco.</i> |
| usual | Commonly encountered. <i>The child's usual bedtime.</i> |

wanted Commonly used or practiced; usual.
*The place had sunk back into its **wanted** quiet.*

| normal | Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Of normal intelligence.</i> |
| ordinary | A rule or book laying down the order of divine service. <i>Not out of the ordinary.</i> |
| orthodox | Relating to the Orthodox Church. <i>Burke s views were orthodox in his time.</i> |
