### Synonyms of "Accustomed" as an adjective (22 Words)

<b>common</b>	Common to or shared by two or more parties. <i>A <b>common</b> soldier.</i>
<b>confirmed</b>	(of a person) firmly established in a particular habit, belief, or way of life and unlikely to change their ways. <i>A <b>confirmed</b> Catholic.</i>
<b>conventional</b>	Rigidly formal or bound by convention. <i><b>Conventional</b> love poetry.</i>
<b>customary</b>	Established by or based on custom rather than common law or statute. <i>Took his <b>customary</b> morning walk.</i>

<b>established</b>	Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established. <i>The ceremony was an <b>established</b> event in the annual calendar.</i>
<b>familiar</b>	Often encountered or experienced; common. <i>A <b>familiar</b> figure.</i>
<b>fixed</b>	Having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>How s the club <b>fixed</b> for money now.</i>
<b>general</b>	Prevailing among and common to the general public. <i>Comprehensible to the <b>general</b> reader.</i>
<b>habitual</b>	Commonly used or practiced; usual. <i>His <b>habitual</b> comment.</i>
<b>normal</b>	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Dilute the stock solution with sterile water or <b>normal</b> saline.</i>
<b>ordinary</b>	Lacking special distinction, rank, or status; commonly encountered. <i>He sets out to depict <b>ordinary</b> people.</i>
<b>prevailing</b>	Existing at a particular time; current. <i>The unfavourable <b>prevailing</b> economic conditions.</i>
<b>regular</b>	In accord with regular practice or procedure. <i>Policies carried on by his ministers through <b>regular</b> channels.</i>
<b>routine</b>	Performed as part of a regular procedure rather than for a special reason. <i>The Ministry insisted that this was just a <b>routine</b> annual drill.</i>
<b>set</b>	Set down according to a plan. <i>We are <b>set</b> to go at any time.</i>
<b>settled</b>	Inhabited by colonists. <i>I don t feel entirely <b>settled</b> here.</i>
<b>standard</b>	Conforming to or constituting a standard of measurement or value or of the usual or regularized or accepted kind. <i><b>Standard</b> brands.</i>
<b>stock</b>	Of a product or type of product usually kept in stock and thus regularly available for sale. <i>A <b>stock</b> answer.</i>
<b>traditional</b>	Pertaining to time-honored orthodox doctrines. <i>The simple security of <b>traditional</b> assumptions has vanished.</i>
<b>typical</b>	Representative as a symbol; symbolic. <i>A <b>typical</b> example of 1930s art deco.</i>
<b>usual</b>	Commonly encountered. <i>The child s <b>usual</b> bedtime.</i>

**wanted** Commonly used or practiced; usual.  
*The place had sunk back into its **wanted** quiet.*

<b><u>bland</u></b>	Lacking strong features or characteristics and therefore uninteresting. <i>A <b>bland</b> little drama.</i>
<b>chronic</b>	Of a person having a chronic illness. <i><b>Chronic</b> indigestion.</i>
<b>classic</b>	An artist who has created classic works. <i>A <b>classical</b> ballet.</i>
<b>common</b>	Commonly encountered. <i>Followed <b>common</b> procedure.</i>
<b>conservatism</b>	The doctrines of the Conservative Party of Great Britain or a similar party elsewhere. <i>A party that espoused <b>conservatism</b>.</i>
<b>conventional</b>	Rigidly formal or bound by convention. <i><b>Conventional</b> bourgeois lives.</i>
<b>custom</b>	Regular dealings with a shop or business by customers. <i>The old English <b>custom</b> of dancing round the maypole.</i>
<b>customary</b>	In accordance with convention or custom. <i>It is <b>customary</b> to mark an occasion like this with a toast.</i>
<b><u>epitomize</u></b>	Be a perfect example of. <i>The company <b>epitomized</b> the problems faced by British industry.</i>
<b><u>generally</u></b>	By or to most people; widely. <i>The term of a lease is <b>generally</b> 99 years.</i>
<b>habit</b>	Put a habit on. <i>We stayed together out of <b>habit</b>.</i>
<b>habitual</b>	Regular; usual. <i>His <b>habitual</b> comment.</i>
<b><u>heritage</u></b>	Christians, or the ancient Israelites, seen as God's chosen people. <i>The world's <b>heritage</b> of knowledge.</i>

<b>inveterate</b>	In a habitual and longstanding manner. <i>His <b>inveterate</b> hostility to what he considered to be the reactionary powers.</i>
<b><u>mundane</u></b>	Lacking interest or excitement; dull. <i><b>Mundane</b> affairs.</i>
<b>normal</b>	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Of <b>normal</b> intelligence.</i>
<b>ordinary</b>	A rule or book laying down the order of divine service. <i>Not out of the <b>ordinary</b>.</i>
<b>orthodox</b>	Relating to the Orthodox Church. <i>Burke s views were <b>orthodox</b> in his time.</i>
<b>orthodoxy</b>	Authorized or generally accepted theory, doctrine, or practice. <i>Writings of unimpeachable <b>orthodoxy</b>.</i>
<b><u>prevail</u></b>	Prove superior. <i>He <b>prevailed</b> upon her to visit his parents.</i>
<b>quotidian</b>	Of or occurring every day; daily. <i>There s nothing quite like a real train conductor to add color to a <b>quotidian</b> commute.</i>
<b>regular</b>	One of the regular clergy. <i>Her <b>regular</b> bedtime.</i>
<b>routine</b>	Organize according to a routine. <i>As a matter of <b>routine</b> a report will be sent to the director.</i>
<b>stereotyped</b>	Viewed or represented as a stereotype. <i>The film is weakened by its <b>stereotyped</b> characters.</i>
<b>traditional</b>	Habitually done, used, or found. <i>A <b>traditional</b> fish soup.</i>
<b>tuscan</b>	A resident of Tuscany.
<b><u>typical</u></b>	Showing the characteristics expected of or popularly associated with a particular person or thing. <i>The <b>typical</b> car owner drives 10 000 miles a year.</i>
<b><u>usual</u></b>	Commonly encountered. <i>My <b>usual</b> please she said to the barman.</i>
<b><u>wont</u></b>	One's customary behaviour. <i>He was <b>wont</b> to arise at 5 30 every morning.</i>
<b>workday</b>	A day on which work is done. <i>Saturdays were <b>workdays</b> for him.</i>
