hankering	A strong desire to have or do something. <i>He had a hankering to return to Scotland.</i>
<u>hunger</u>	A strong desire or craving. <i>She was faint with hunger.</i>
hungering	Strong desire for something (not food or drink).
hurt	Any physical damage to the body caused by violence or accident or fracture etc. <i>Her eyes reflected her unhappiness and hurt.</i>
itch	A contagious skin infection caused by the itch mite characterized by persistent itching and skin irritation. <i>An itch to write fiction.</i>
<u>longing</u>	Prolonged unfulfilled desire or need. <i>Miranda felt a wistful longing for the old days.</i>
<u>misery</u>	A state or feeling of great physical or mental distress or discomfort. <i>The misery of the miner s existence.</i>
mourning	Black clothes worn as an expression of sorrow when someone dies. <i>She s still in mourning after the death of her husband.</i>
pain	A symptom of some physical hurt or disorder. <i>The patient developed severe pain and distension.</i>
pang	A sudden sharp feeling. <i>Pangs of regret.</i>
pinning	A feeling of deep longing.
sadness	The quality of excessive mournfulness and uncheerfulness. <i>She tired of his perpetual sadness.</i>
<u>sorrow</u>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>A bereaved person needs time to work through their sorrow.</i>
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>Weapons that cause unnecessary suffering.</i>
thirst	A physiological need to drink. <i>Tens of thousands died of thirst and starvation.</i>
<u>throb</u>	A feeling of pain in a series of regular beats. <i>The throb of the ship s engines.</i>

torture	The act of distorting something so it seems to mean something it was not intended to mean. A torture chamber.
twinge	A sudden sharp feeling. Twinges of conscience.
woe	Things that cause sorrow or distress; troubles. To add to his woes customers have been spending less.
wretchedness	The character of being uncomfortable and unpleasant. The wretchedness for which these prisons became known.
yearning	Prolonged unfulfilled desire or need. He felt a yearning for the mountains.

pine	Have a desire for something or someone who is not present.
pine after	Have a desire for something or someone who is not present.

<u>pound</u>	Place or shut up in a pound. <i>Pound the roots with a heavy flat stone.</i>

bruise	Inflict a bruise or bruises on a part of the body. <i>The customer bruised the strawberries by squeezing them.</i>
concussion	Any violent blow. <i>He was carried off the pitch with concussion.</i>

misery	A feeling of intense unhappiness. <i>The misery of the miner s existence.</i>
moan	Make a sound resembling a human moan. <i>Just then their patient moaned and opened his eyes.</i>
pain	Cause mental or physical pain to. <i>She s in great pain.</i>
pulsate	Produce or modulate (as electromagnetic waves) in the form of short bursts or pulses or cause an apparatus to produce pulses. <i>Bangkok is a cosmopolitan city that pulsates with life.</i>
quiver	A slight trembling movement or sound, especially one caused by a sudden strong emotion. <i>She couldn t help the quiver in her voice.</i>

rheumatism	A chronic autoimmune disease with inflammation of the joints and marked deformities; something (possibly a virus) triggers an attack on the synovium by the immune system, which releases cytokines that stimulate an inflammatory reaction.
<u>scarred</u>	Blemished by injury or rough wear. <i>The fire left her arm badly scarred.</i>
sore	A raw or painful place on the body. <i>There s no point raking over the past and opening old sores.</i>
suffer	Undergo or suffer. <i>She suffered a fracture in the accident.</i>
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>A message of hope for suffering humanity.</i>
<u>throb</u>	A strong, regular beat or sound; a steady pulsation. <i>He felt a throbbing in his head.</i>
<u>throes</u>	Intense or violent pain and struggle, especially accompanying birth, death, or great change. <i>He convulsed in his death throes.</i>
<u>trauma</u>	Emotional shock following a stressful event or a physical injury, which may lead to long-term neurosis. <i>Many experience the trauma of divorce.</i>
twinge	Squeeze tightly between the fingers. <i>Stop the exercises if the tummy twinges.</i>
<u>wound</u>	The act of inflicting a wound. <i>He feared that mentioning it might reopen the wound.</i>
<u>wounded</u>	People who are wounded. <i>Nursing his wounded arm.</i>
