- apex** The highest point in a plane or solid figure, relative to a base line or plane.
*The **apex** of the roof.*
- apogee** The highest point in the development of something; a climax or culmination.
*A film which was the **apogee** of German expressionist cinema.*
- brow** An eyebrow.
*The cottages were built on the **brow** of a hill.*
- cap** A player to whom a cap is awarded.
*A former naval officer and rugby **cap**.*
- crest** A showy growth of e.g. feathers or skin on the head of a bird or other animal.
*A high wave formed by the meeting of two **crests**.*
- crown** A foreign coin with a name meaning crown especially the krona or krone.
*Shiny covers embossed with gold **crowns**.*

<u>elevation</u>	Increase in the level of something. <i>An elevation of the temperature in the afternoon.</i>
<u>height</u>	A high place or position. <i>The glider is gaining height.</i>
heights	The vertical dimension of extension; distance from the base of something to the top. <i>He doesn't like heights.</i>
meridian	A circle passing through the celestial poles and the zenith of a given place on the earth's surface. <i>The European Broadcasting Area extends from the Atlantic to the meridian 40 E.</i>
mountaintop	The area at the top of a mountain. <i>A snow covered mountaintop.</i>
<u>peak</u>	The upper, outer corner of a sail extended by a gaff. <i>Whisk two egg whites to stiff peaks.</i>
<u>pinnacle</u>	The highest level or degree attainable; the highest stage of development. <i>He had reached the pinnacle of his career.</i>
<u>spire</u>	A long tapering object. <i>Spires of delphiniums.</i>
<u>summit</u>	The highest attainable level of achievement. <i>A summit meeting.</i>
superlative	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>Chilli has become the superlative among spices.</i>
tip	A V shape. <i>George pressed the tips of his fingers together.</i>
tiptop	The highest level or degree attainable; the highest stage of development.
top	The top or extreme point of something usually a mountain or hill. <i>Beer bottle tops.</i>
vertex	The highest point (of something).
<u>zenith</u>	The time at which something is most powerful or successful. <i>The sun was well past the zenith.</i>

The elevation of someone to divine status.

*Death spared Pompey the task of having to account for the **apotheosis** of Caesar.*

Get the better of.

*The **best** dressed man in Britain.*

climactic	Consisting of or causing a climax. <i>The film s climactic scenes.</i>
crest	In medieval times, an emblem used to decorate a helmet. <i>She reached the crest of the hill.</i>
culminate	Bring to a head or to the highest point. <i>The helmet culminated in a crest.</i>
elevation	A particular side of a building. <i>Diabetics have been found to have more pronounced elevation of systolic blood pressure.</i>
heyday	The period of a person's or thing's greatest success, popularity, activity, or vigour. <i>The paper has lost millions of readers since its heyday in 1964.</i>
jag	Cut teeth into make a jagged cutting edge. <i>She jagged herself in the mouth.</i>
lofty	Haughty and aloof. <i>Lofty mountains.</i>
maximum	A maximum permitted custodial sentence for an offence. <i>The table has a length of 4 feet maximum.</i>
meridian	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>At the end of February Jupiter transits the meridian due south at 6 15 a m.</i>
minaret	A slender tower, typically part of a mosque, with a balcony from which a muezzin calls Muslims to prayer.
nadir	The point on the celestial sphere directly below an observer. <i>Asking that question was the nadir of my career.</i>
peak	A V shape. <i>Package holiday sales hit a peak of around 12 million.</i>
pinnacle	Set on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>Pinnacle a pediment.</i>
plateau	Denoting a group of North American peoples of the high plains of western Canada and the US, including the Nez Percé. <i>The industry s problems have plateaued out.</i>
proliferation	Rapid reproduction of a cell, part, or organism. <i>We attempted to measure cell proliferation.</i>
raised	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>Raised eyebrows.</i>
rung	One of the crosspieces that form the steps of a ladder. <i>We must ensure that the low skilled do not get trapped on the bottom rung.</i>

- summit** Reach the summit of a mountain.
*Many mountaineers go up Mt Everest but not all **summit**.*
- superlative** The superlative form of an adjective or adverb.
*The critics ran out of **superlatives** to describe him.*
- top** The top or extreme point of something usually a mountain or hill.
*Some civil servant earning twenty eight thousand a year **tops**.*
- unsurpassed** Better or greater than any other.
*The quality of workmanship is **unsurpassed**.*
- upper** The topmost one of two.
*Leather **uppers**.*
- vertex** The point of intersection of lines or the point opposite the base of a figure.
- zenith** The time at which something is most powerful or successful.
*In 1977 punk was at its **zenith**.*
