### **Synonyms of "Acrobat" as a noun (2 Words)**

**gymnast** A person trained or skilled in gymnastics.

**tumbler** An acrobat, especially one who performs somersaults.

- acting** The art or occupation of performing fictional roles in plays, films, or television.  
*An **acting** career.*
- artist** A person who practises or performs any of the creative arts, such as a sculptor, film-maker, actor, or dancer.  
*A surgeon who is an **artist** with the scalpel.*
- artistic** Having or revealing natural creative skill.  
*Computer programs which produce **artistic** designs.*
- ballet** A creative work or performance of ballet or the music written for it.  
*The Bolshoi **Ballet**.*
- ballroom** Ballroom dancing.  
*The number of people learning **ballroom** has doubled in the last two years.*

<b>buffoon</b>	A person who amuses others by ridiculous behavior.
<b>carnival</b>	An annual festival, typically during the week before Lent in Roman Catholic countries, involving processions, music, dancing, and the use of masquerade. <i>The film is a visual and aural <b>carnival</b>.</i>
<b>choreographer</b>	Someone who creates new dances. <i>A professional <b>choreographer</b>.</i>
<b>choreography</b>	A notation used by choreographers. <i>As well as dancing she did a great deal of <b>choreography</b>.</i>
<b>circus</b>	A genus of haws comprising the harriers. <i>A <b>circus</b> elephant.</i>
<b>clown</b>	Act as or like a clown. <i>Martin was always the class <b>clown</b>.</i>
<b>dance</b>	Move in a pattern usually to musical accompaniment do or perform a dance. <i>I <b>danced</b> her out of the room.</i>
<b>dancer</b>	A person who dances or whose profession is dancing. <i>She thought he would become a ballet <b>dancer</b>.</i>
<b>disco</b>	The lighting and sound equipment used at a disco. <i>No one knows how to waltz so I ve ordered a <b>disco</b>.</i>
<b>festival</b>	An organized series of concerts, plays, or films, typically one held annually in the same place. <i>A major international <b>festival</b> of song.</i>
<b>gymnast</b>	An athlete who is skilled in gymnastics.
<b>juggle</b>	Influence by slyness. <i><b>Juggle</b> an account so as to hide a deficit.</i>
<b>juggling</b>	Throwing and catching several objects simultaneously.
<b>mime</b>	A theatrical performance using mime. <i>The acting students <b>mimed</b> eating an apple.</i>
<b>music</b>	The art or science of composing or performing music. <i>He fell asleep to the <b>music</b> of the wind chimes.</i>
<b>opera</b>	A building for the performance of opera. <i>It was the best performance of the <b>opera</b> he had ever heard.</i>
<b>pantomime</b>	An absurdly exaggerated piece of behaviour. <i>The drive to town was a <b>pantomime</b>.</i>
<b>parade</b>	A parade ground. <i>A St George s Day <b>parade</b>.</i>

<b>performance</b>	The capabilities of a machine, product, or vehicle. <i>The hardware is put through tests which assess the <b>performance</b> of the processor.</i>
<b>sideshow</b>	A subordinate incident of little importance relative to the main event. <i>Instruction is not an educational <b>sideshow</b>.</i>
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>With a shout and a <b>song</b> they marched up to the gates.</i>
<b>stunt</b>	Perform a stunt or stunts. <i>The recovery of our industries is <b>stunted</b> by lack of funds.</i>
<b>trapeze</b>	A horizontal bar hanging by two ropes and free to swing, used by acrobats in a circus.
<b>tumbler</b>	Pigeon that executes backward somersaults in flight or on the ground.
<b>vaudeville</b>	A satirical or topical song with a refrain. <i>His comedic roots are in <b>vaudeville</b>.</i>
