active	Exerting influence or producing a change or effect. <i>He was politically active.</i>
<u>agile</u>	Mentally quick. <i>An agile mind.</i>
athletic	Relating to athletes or athletics. <i>Athletic playing.</i>
<u>deft</u>	Demonstrating skill and cleverness. <i>The script was both deft and literate.</i>
gymnastic	Relating to gymnastics. <i>Gymnastic exercises.</i>
light	Of the military or industry using or being relatively small or light arms or equipment. <i>Felt light in the head.</i>
light of foot	Of little intensity or power or force.

light on one's feet	Free from anything that dulls or dims.
light-footed	Having a light and springy step.
limber	(used of persons' bodies) capable of moving or bending freely. <i>I have to practise to keep myself limber.</i>
lissom	Gracefully thin and bending and moving with ease. <i>The kind of outfit that should be left to lissom teenagers.</i>
lithe	Gracefully thin and bending and moving with ease. <i>She lay gazing up at his tall lithe figure.</i>
lively	Full of spirit. <i>A lively period in history.</i>
nimble	Quick and light in movement or action; agile. <i>As nimble as a deer.</i>
sprightly	Full of spirit and vitality. <i>A sprightly dance.</i>
spry	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>He continued to look spry and active well into his eighties.</i>
supple	Bending and moving easily and gracefully; flexible. <i>This body oil leaves your skin feeling deliciously supple.</i>

acting

Temporarily doing the duties of another person.
*An **acting** career.*

artist

A person who habitually practises a specified reprehensible activity.
*Rip off **artists**.*

artistic

Aesthetically pleasing.
*An **artistic** flower arrangement.*

ballet

A creative work or performance of ballet or the music written for it.
*The Bolshoi **Ballet**.*

ballroom	Ballroom dancing. <i>The number of people learning ballroom has doubled in the last two years.</i>
buffoon	A ridiculous but amusing person; a clown.
carnival	A public event or celebration, typically held outdoors and involving stalls, entertainment, and processions. <i>The whole occasion had a carnival atmosphere.</i>
choreographer	A person who composes the sequence of steps and moves for a performance of dance. <i>A professional choreographer.</i>
choreography	The written notation for such a sequence. <i>As well as dancing she did a great deal of choreography.</i>
circus	A frenetic disorganized (and often comic) disturbance suggestive of a large public entertainment. <i>He ran away from home to join the circus.</i>
clown	Act as or like a clown. <i>A circus clown.</i>
dance	Dance steps and movements considered as an activity or art form. <i>Everyone was taking part in the dance.</i>
dancer	A person who dances or whose profession is dancing. <i>She thought he would become a ballet dancer.</i>
disco	Dance to disco music. <i>She filled every hour of the day playing tennis or discoing with friends.</i>
festival	An organized series of concerts, plays, or films, typically one held annually in the same place. <i>A major international festival of song.</i>
gymnast	A person trained or skilled in gymnastics.
juggle	Throw, catch, and keep in the air several things simultaneously. <i>Juggle an account so as to hide a deficit.</i>
juggling	The act of rearranging things to give a misleading impression.
mime	A practitioner of mime or a performer in a mime. <i>He s a very fine actor and mime artist.</i>
music	The score or scores of a musical composition or compositions. <i>Couples were dancing to the music.</i>
opera	Operas as a genre of classical music. <i>It was the best performance of the opera he had ever heard.</i>

pantomime	An absurd or confused situation. <i>He is currently appearing in pantomime in Manchester.</i>
parade	A parade ground. <i>A St George s Day parade.</i>
performance	An act of presenting a play, concert, or other form of entertainment. <i>They admired his performance under stress.</i>
sideshow	A subordinate incident of little importance relative to the main event. <i>Instruction is not an educational sideshow.</i>
song	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>The pilgrims broke into song.</i>
stunt	Perform a stunt or stunts. <i>The recovery of our industries is stunted by lack of funds.</i>
trapeze	A horizontal bar hanging by two ropes and free to swing, used by acrobats in a circus.
tumbler	An acrobat, especially one who performs somersaults.
vaudeville	A variety show with songs and comic acts etc. <i>His comedic roots are in vaudeville.</i>
