<b>active</b>	Exerting influence or producing a change or effect. <i>He was politically <b>active</b>.</i>
<b>agile</b>	Mentally quick. <i>An <b>agile</b> mind.</i>
<b>athletic</b>	Relating to athletes or athletics. <i><b>Athletic</b> playing.</i>
<b>deft</b>	Demonstrating skill and cleverness. <i>The script was both <b>deft</b> and literate.</i>
<b>gymnastic</b>	Relating to gymnastics. <i><b>Gymnastic</b> exercises.</i>
<b>light</b>	Of the military or industry using or being relatively small or light arms or equipment. <i>Felt <b>light</b> in the head.</i>
<b>light of foot</b>	Of little intensity or power or force.

<b>light-footed</b>	Having a light and springy step.
<b>limber</b>	(used of persons' bodies) capable of moving or bending freely. <i>I have to practise to keep myself <b>limber</b>.</i>
<b>lissom</b>	Gracefully thin and bending and moving with ease. <i>The kind of outfit that should be left to <b>lissom</b> teenagers.</i>
<b>lithe</b>	Gracefully thin and bending and moving with ease. <i>She lay gazing up at his tall <b>lithe</b> figure.</i>
<b>lively</b>	Full of spirit. <i>A <b>lively</b> period in history.</i>
<b>nimble</b>	Quick and light in movement or action; agile. <i>As <b>nimble</b> as a deer.</i>
<b>sprightly</b>	Full of spirit and vitality. <i>A <b>sprightly</b> dance.</i>
<b>spry</b>	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>He continued to look <b>spry</b> and active well into his eighties.</i>
<b>supple</b>	Bending and moving easily and gracefully; flexible. <i>This body oil leaves your skin feeling deliciously <b>supple</b>.</i>

<b>ballroom</b>	Ballroom dancing. <i>The number of people learning <b>ballroom</b> has doubled in the last two years.</i>
<b>buffoon</b>	A ridiculous but amusing person; a clown.
<b>carnival</b>	A public event or celebration, typically held outdoors and involving stalls, entertainment, and processions. <i>The whole occasion had a <b>carnival</b> atmosphere.</i>
<b>choreographer</b>	A person who composes the sequence of steps and moves for a performance of dance. <i>A professional <b>choreographer</b>.</i>
<b>choreography</b>	The written notation for such a sequence. <i>As well as dancing she did a great deal of <b>choreography</b>.</i>
<b>circus</b>	A frenetic disorganized (and often comic) disturbance suggestive of a large public entertainment. <i>He ran away from home to join the <b>circus</b>.</i>
<b>clown</b>	Act as or like a clown. <i>A circus <b>clown</b>.</i>
<b>dance</b>	Dance steps and movements considered as an activity or art form. <i>Everyone was taking part in the <b>dance</b>.</i>
<b>dancer</b>	A person who dances or whose profession is dancing. <i>She thought he would become a ballet <b>dancer</b>.</i>
<b>disco</b>	Dance to disco music. <i>She filled every hour of the day playing tennis or <b>discoing</b> with friends.</i>
<b>festival</b>	An organized series of concerts, plays, or films, typically one held annually in the same place. <i>A major international <b>festival</b> of song.</i>
<b>gymnast</b>	A person trained or skilled in gymnastics.
<b>juggle</b>	Throw, catch, and keep in the air several things simultaneously. <i><b>Juggle</b> an account so as to hide a deficit.</i>
<b>juggling</b>	The act of rearranging things to give a misleading impression.
<b>mime</b>	A practitioner of mime or a performer in a mime. <i>He s a very fine actor and <b>mime</b> artist.</i>
<b>music</b>	The score or scores of a musical composition or compositions. <i>Couples were dancing to the <b>music</b>.</i>
<b>opera</b>	Operas as a genre of classical music. <i>It was the best performance of the <b>opera</b> he had ever heard.</i>

<b>pantomime</b>	An absurd or confused situation. <i>He is currently appearing in <b>pantomime</b> in Manchester.</i>
<b>parade</b>	A parade ground. <i>A St George s Day <b>parade</b>.</i>
<b>performance</b>	An act of presenting a play, concert, or other form of entertainment. <i>They admired his <b>performance</b> under stress.</i>
<b>sideshow</b>	A subordinate incident of little importance relative to the main event. <i>Instruction is not an educational <b>sideshow</b>.</i>
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>The pilgrims broke into <b>song</b>.</i>
<b>stunt</b>	Perform a stunt or stunts. <i>The recovery of our industries is <b>stunted</b> by lack of funds.</i>
<b>trapeze</b>	A horizontal bar hanging by two ropes and free to swing, used by acrobats in a circus.
<b>tumbler</b>	An acrobat, especially one who performs somersaults.
<b>vaudeville</b>	A variety show with songs and comic acts etc. <i>His comedic roots are in <b>vaudeville</b>.</i>
