Associations of "Acted" (30 Words)

assigned	Appointed to a post or duty. <i>Assigned personnel.</i>
attitude	A position of the body indicating a particular mental state. <i>The actor struck just the right attitude.</i>
<u>behave</u>	Behave in a certain manner show a certain behavior conduct or comport oneself. <i>Each car behaves differently.</i>
behavioral	Of or relating to behavior. <i>Behavioral sciences.</i>
behaviour	The way in which an animal or person behaves in response to a particular situation or stimulus. <i>Behaviour patterns.</i>
comport	Behave well or properly. <i>Articulate students who comported themselves well in interviews.</i>
conduct	Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <i>Surveys conducted among students.</i>
conscious	(followed by `of') showing realization or recognition of something. <i>A conscious effort to walk properly.</i>
deed	Convey or transfer property or rights by legal deed. <i>Mortgage deeds.</i>
<u>demeanor</u>	(behavioral attributes) the way a person behaves toward other people.
dissemble	Conceal or disguise one's true feelings or beliefs. <i>An honest sincere person with no need to dissemble.</i>
do	Get something done. <i>Joe was doing sums aloud.</i>
<u>equipped</u>	Provided or fitted out with what is necessary or useful or appropriate. <i>Equipped for service in the Arctic.</i>

ethology	The branch of zoology that studies the behavior of animals in their natural habitats.
inclined	Leaning or turning away from the vertical or horizontal; sloping. <i>An inclined ramp.</i>
<u>inconsiderate</u>	Lacking regard for the rights or feelings of others. <i>Slovenly inconsiderate reasoning.</i>
moralistic	Narrowly and conventionally moral. <i>A moralistic stance on advertising.</i>
participation	The condition of sharing in common with others (as fellows or partners etc). <i>Participation in chapel activities.</i>
prepared	Equipped or prepared with necessary intellectual resources. <i>Prepared to take risks.</i>
<u>pretend</u>	Represent fictitiously as in a play or pretend to be or act like. <i>The children poured out pretend tea for the dolls.</i>
pretension	A claim or aspiration to a particular quality. <i>His pretensions to the imperial inheritance.</i>
<u>prosecute</u>	Institute legal proceedings in respect of (a claim or offence). <i>They were prosecuted for obstructing the highway.</i>
reluctantly	In an unwilling and hesitant way. <i>He reluctantly agrees to do his duty.</i>
smatter	Speak with spotty or superficial knowledge. <i>She smatters Russian.</i>
standby	The state of waiting to secure an unreserved place for a journey or performance, allocated on the basis of earliest availability. <i>Standbys are allowed to board when all the passengers with confirmed reservations are seated.</i>
unforced	Not compelled or constrained. <i>An unforced cheerfulness.</i>
volitional	Relating to the use of one's will. <i>A volitional act.</i>
<u>voluntary</u>	A person who freely enlists for service. <i>Voluntary manslaughter.</i>
willful	Done by design. <i>Willful disobedience.</i>
<u>willing</u>	Not brought about by coercion or force. <i>Willing and prompt obedience.</i>
