| fact | The truth about events as opposed to interpretation. <i>A body of fact.</i> |
| if truth be told | A fact that has been verified. |
| in actual fact | A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite. |
| in fact | A state in midwestern United States. |

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| in point of fact | A unit of length equal to one twelfth of a foot. |

| real life | The basic unit of money in Brazil; equal to 100 centavos. |
| reality | Relating to reality TV. <i>We want to make the dream a reality.</i> |
| the real world | The basic unit of money in Brazil; equal to 100 centavos. |
| to tell the truth | A Swiss patriot who lived in the early 14th century and who was renowned for his skill as an archer; according to legend an Austrian governor compelled him to shoot an apple from his son's head with his crossbow (which he did successful). |
| truth | A fact or belief that is accepted as true. <i>The situation brought home to us the blunt truth of the military threat.</i> |

| earthy | (of a person or their language) direct and uninhibited, especially about sexual subjects or bodily functions. <i>An earthy sense of humor.</i> |
| fact | A thing that is known or proved to be true. <i>He supported his argument with an impressive array of facts.</i> |
| indeed | Used in a response to express interest, surprise, or contempt. <i>Who d believe it Who indeed.</i> |
| indubitably | In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>Indubitably liberalism parades under many guises.</i> |
| irreligious | Hostile or indifferent to religion. <i>An irreligious man.</i> |
| knowable | Able to be observed, understood, or ascertained. <i>The full extent of the damage isn t knowable in advance.</i> |
| lifelike | Evoking lifelike images within the mind. <i>A lifelike pose.</i> |
| now | On this further occasion, typically as the latest in a series of annoying situations or events. <i>We can hardly send her back now can we.</i> |
| pictorial | A newspaper or periodical with pictures as a main feature. <i>Feelings presented in a pictorial form.</i> |
| practical | Having or put to a practical purpose or use. <i>He is a very practical person.</i> |
| pragmatic | Relating to pragmatics. <i>Not ideology but pragmatic politics.</i> |
| real | Coinciding with reality F A Olafson. <i>A film based on real life.</i> |
| realism | The doctrine that universals or abstract concepts have an objective or absolute existence The theory that universals have their own reality is sometimes called Platonic realism because it was first outlined by Plato s doctrine of forms or ideas. <i>Modern jurists have tended to underestimate the scope of American legal realism.</i> |

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| <u>realistic</u> | Having or showing a sensible and practical idea of what can be achieved or expected. <i>A realistic novel.</i> |
| reality | Relating to reality TV. <i>Laura was losing touch with reality.</i> |
| realize | Use (a linguistic feature) in a particular spoken or written form. <i>They realized that something was wrong.</i> |
| realized | Successfully completed or brought to an end. <i>The joy of a realized ambition overcame him.</i> |
| really | Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They re not really my aunt and uncle.</i> |
| sooth | Truth or reality. <i>In sooth.</i> |
| <u>surely</u> | Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>The results are surely encouraging.</i> |
| <u>truly</u> | By right. <i>This is truly a miracle.</i> |
| truth | A fact that has been verified. <i>He thought of answering with the truth but he knew they wouldn t believe it.</i> |
| verisimilitude | The appearance of truth; the quality of seeming to be true. <i>The detail gives the novel some verisimilitude.</i> |
| <u>virtual</u> | Relating to or denoting infinitesimal displacements of a point in a system. <i>Virtual images.</i> |
