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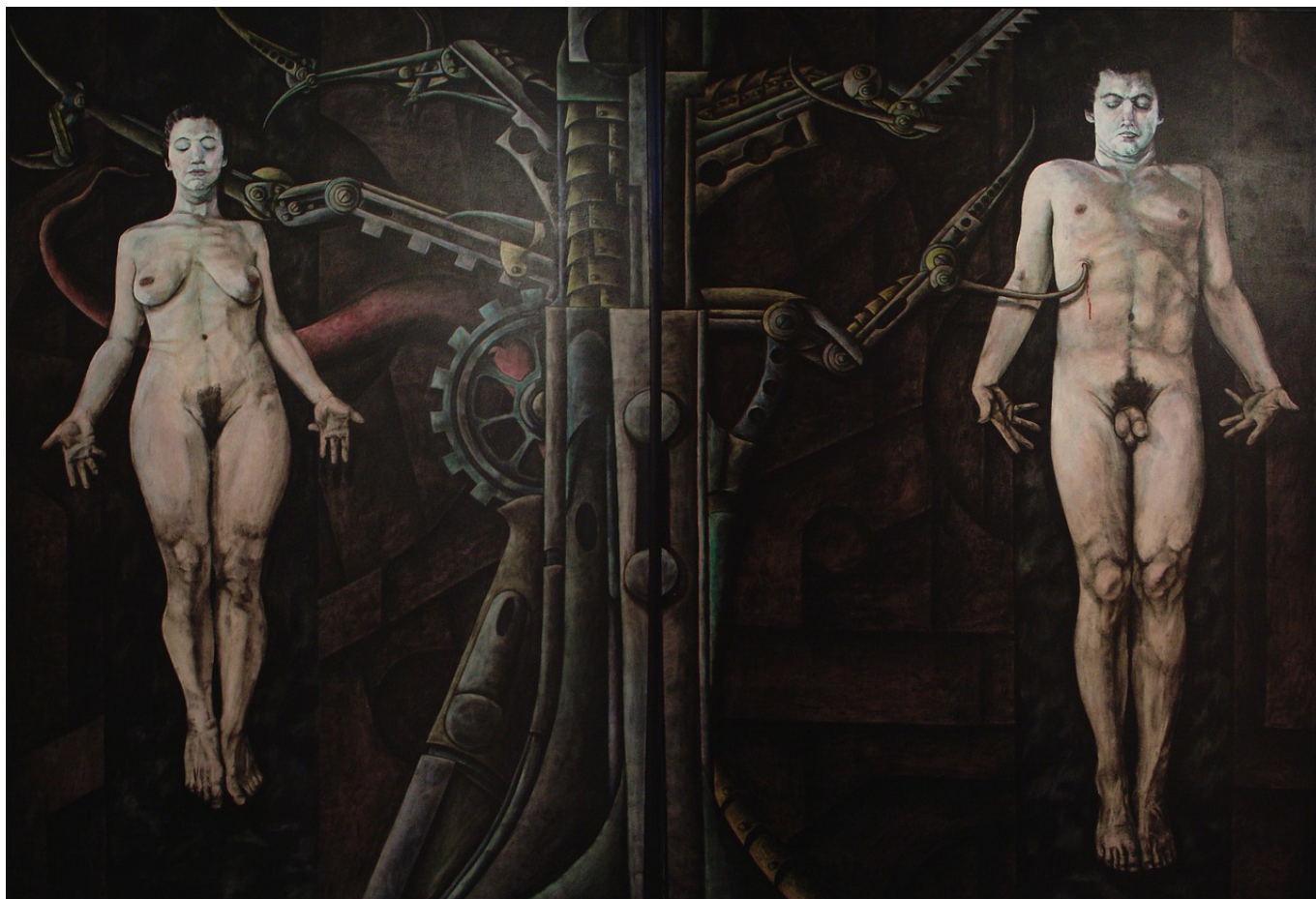

- *Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason- W.Churchill.*
- *Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason.*



Synonyms of "Adamant" as an adjective (14 Words)

adamantine	Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason. <i>Adamantine chains.</i>
determined	Determined or decided upon as by an authority. <i>Alina was determined to be heard.</i>
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>Firm convictions.</i>
<u>immovable</u>	(of a person) not yielding to argument or pressure. <i>An immovable article of faith.</i>
inexorable	(of a person) impossible to persuade; unrelenting. <i>Cynthia was inexorable she would have none of him.</i>
inflexible	Not able to be changed or adapted to particular circumstances. <i>Once she had made up her mind she was inflexible.</i>

intransigent	Unwilling or refusing to change one's views or to agree about something. <i>Her father had tried persuasion but she was intransigent.</i>
<u>resolute</u>	Characterized by quickness and firmness. <i>Faced with a resolute opposition.</i>
resolved	Determined. <i>She was firmly resolved to be a doctor.</i>
rigid	Incapable of compromise or flexibility. <i>Beatrice was rigid with terror.</i>
steadfast	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>Steadfast resolve.</i>
<u>uncompromising</u>	Showing an unwillingness to make concessions to others, especially by changing one's ways or opinions. <i>Took an uncompromising stance in the peace talks.</i>
<u>unshakeable</u>	(of a belief, feeling, or opinion) strongly felt and unable to be changed. <i>My unshakeable faith in the goodness of mankind.</i>
<u>unwavering</u>	Not showing abrupt variations. <i>She fixed him with an unwavering stare.</i>



Usage Examples of "Adamant" as an adjective

- *He is adamant that he is not going to resign.*
- *He is adamant in his refusal to change his mind.*



Associations of "Adamant" (30 Words)

abnegation

The denial and rejection of a doctrine or belief.
*People are capable of **abnegation** and unselfishness.*

apophasis

Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.

determined

Determined or decided upon as by an authority.
*Helen was a **determined** little girl.*

dour

Relentlessly severe, stern, or gloomy in manner or appearance.
*A **dour** self sacrificing life.*

exacting	Requiring precise accuracy. <i>Certain highly specialized xerophytes are extremely exacting in their requirements.</i>
extradite	Hand over (a person accused or convicted of a crime) to the jurisdiction of the foreign state in which the crime was committed. <i>Brazil refused to extradite him to Britain.</i>
<u>fastidious</u>	Very attentive to and concerned about accuracy and detail. <i>She dressed with fastidious care.</i>
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>She had no firm plans for the next day.</i>
hidebound	Unwilling or unable to change because of tradition or convention. <i>They are working to change hidebound corporate cultures.</i>
inadmissible	Not deserving to be admitted. <i>An inadmissible interference in the affairs of the Church.</i>
inflexible	Not able to be bent; stiff. <i>Inflexible rules.</i>
intransigent	An intransigent person. <i>An intransigent conservative opposed to every liberal tendency.</i>
martinet	Someone who demands exact conformity to rules and forms. <i>The woman in charge was a martinet who treated all those beneath her like children.</i>
obduracy	Resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible.
obdurate	Showing unfeeling resistance to tender feelings. <i>I argued this point with him but he was obdurate.</i>
pertinacious	Holding firmly to an opinion or a course of action. <i>The most vocal and pertinacious of all the critics.</i>
<u>refusal</u>	An instance of a horse stopping short or running aside at a jump. <i>He became tired of his friend's refusal to see him.</i>
rejection	The act of rejecting something. <i>Some people are reluctant to try it because they fear rejection.</i>
repudiation	Refusal to acknowledge or pay a debt or honor a contract (especially by public authorities). <i>The repudiation of reformist policies.</i>
rigid	Incapable of compromise or flexibility. <i>A rigid disciplinarian.</i>
rigour	Severity or strictness. <i>The full rigour of the law.</i>

severity	Something hard to endure. Severity of character.
spartan	Resolute in the face of pain or danger or adversity. <i>The accommodation was fairly spartan.</i>
stern	Of a stern or strict bearing or demeanor forbidding in aspect. <i>A stern face.</i>
strict	Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. Strict standards.
stringency	Conscientious attention to rules and details.
<u>stringent</u>	Demanding strict attention to rules and procedures. Stringent safety measures.
unbending	Reserved, formal, or strict in one's behaviour or attitudes; austere and inflexible. <i>An unbending will to dominate.</i>
<u>uncompromising</u>	Harsh or relentless. <i>She was uncompromising In her convictions.</i>
unyielding	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>An unyielding head support.</i>
