Definitions of "Adapt" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “adapt” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Make (something) suitable for a new use or purpose; modify.*
- *Become adjusted to new conditions.*
- *Make fit for, or change to suit a new purpose.*
- *Alter (a text) to make it suitable for filming, broadcasting, or the stage.*
- *Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions.*



Synonyms of "Adapt" as a verb (33 Words)

acclimatize	Respond physiologically or behaviourally to a change in conditions in the natural environment. <i>They never acclimatized in Egypt.</i>
accommodate	Have room for; hold without crowding. <i>Can you accommodate me with a rental car.</i>
<u>acculturate</u>	Assimilate to a different culture, typically the dominant one. <i>Those who have acculturated to the United States.</i>
adjust	Make correspondent or conformable. <i>His eyes had adjusted to semi darkness.</i>
<u>alter</u>	Make an alteration to. <i>The advent of the automobile may have altered the growth pattern of the city.</i>
<u>amend</u>	Make amendments to. <i>The rule was amended to apply only to non members.</i>
attune	Make receptive or aware. <i>The interests of East and West are now closely attuned.</i>

change	Exchange a sum of money for the same sum in a different currency or denomination. <i>Both parties voted against proposals to change the law.</i>
<u>conform</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The pressure to conform.</i>
convert	Score from (a penalty kick, pass, or other opportunity) in a sport or game. <i>We didn't convert the third down.</i>
correct	Make right or correct. <i>Correct the alignment of the front wheels.</i>
<u>edit</u>	Be editor of a newspaper or magazine. <i>You could edit together a succession of short clips.</i>
emend	Make improvements or corrections to. <i>The year of his death might need to be emended to 652.</i>
habituate	Make psychologically or physically used (to something). <i>Bears can become habituated to people very easily.</i>
make adjustments to	Calculate as being.
make alterations to	Add up to.
modify	Cause to change; make different; cause a transformation. <i>She may be prepared to modify her views.</i>
recast	Allocate the parts in (a play or film) to different actors. <i>In 1919 the bells were recast.</i>
<u>reconstruct</u>	Return to its original or usable and functioning condition. <i>Later emperors reconstructed the army.</i>
redesign	Design anew, make a new design for. <i>The front seats have been redesigned.</i>
<u>redo</u>	Make new. <i>The house is being redone exactly to suit his taste.</i>
redraft	Draft (a document, text, or map) again in a different way. <i>It is important to redraft your will in the event of family breakdown.</i>
refashion	Make new. <i>The industry reshaped and refashioned itself.</i>
remodel	Change the structure or form of (something, especially a building). <i>The station was remodelled and enlarged in 1927.</i>
reorganize	Change the way in which (something) is organized. <i>We have to reorganize the entire workload.</i>

rephrase	Express the same message in different words. <i>Rephrase the statement so that it is clear.</i>
reshape	Shape or form (something) differently or again. <i>The new foreign minister reshaped the foreign policy of his country.</i>
restyle	Rearrange or remake in a new shape or layout. <i>The Association decided to restyle his job as performance director.</i>
<u>revamp</u>	Give new and improved form, structure, or appearance to. <i>An attempt to revamp the museum's image.</i>
<u>rework</u>	Use again in altered form. <i>Over the course of our trip the President continually reworked his speech.</i>
rewrite	Rewrite so as to make fit to suit a new or different purpose. <i>I cobbled together a rough draft and then rewrote it.</i>
<u>transform</u>	Subject to a mathematical transformation. <i>He transformed into a monster.</i>
update	Make (something) more modern or up to date. <i>Tonight I will update my operating system.</i>

- *The film was adapted from a Turgenev short story.*
- *The policies can be adapted to suit individual needs.*
- *Hospitals have had to be adapted for modern medical practice.*

adaption	The process of adapting to something (such as environmental conditions).

conformance	Correspondence in form or appearance. <i>Conformance to international standards.</i>
conforming	Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion.
convert	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>Could you convert my dollars into pounds.</i>
correct	Socially right or correct. <i>Motorists can have their headlights tested and corrected at a reduced price on Saturday.</i>
<u>correspond</u>	Communicate by exchanging letters, emails, or other messages. <i>The doctor and I corresponded for more than two decades.</i>
disabuse	Persuade (someone) that an idea or belief is mistaken. <i>He quickly disabused me of my fanciful notions.</i>
<u>edit</u>	A change or correction made as a result of editing. <i>He began to edit the magazine in 1923.</i>
<u>exactly</u>	Just as it should be. <i>What exactly are you looking for.</i>
fit	Be the right size or shape fit correctly or as desired. <i>Is the water clean and fit to drink.</i>
manually	By hand. <i>The rescuers manually hauled each climber to safety.</i>
metamorphose	Change or cause to change completely in form or nature. <i>The extreme heat metamorphosed the sandstone baking it white and producing a quartzite rock.</i>
modify	Transform (a structure) from its original anatomical form during development or evolution. <i>Please modify this letter to make it more polite.</i>
modulation	Variation in the strength, tone, or pitch of one's voice. <i>The modulation from an oral to a written technology in ancient Greek civilization.</i>

ratify	Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
rearrange	Put into a new order or arrangement. <i>He had rearranged his schedule.</i>
reconcile	Make (one thing) compatible with (another). <i>She wanted to be reconciled with her father.</i>
rectify	Bring, lead, or force to abandon a wrong or evil course of life, conduct, and adopt a right one. <i>Rectify alternating current.</i>
retouch	Give retouches to hair. <i>This photograph has been retouched.</i>
revisal	The act of rewriting something.
revise	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <i>The agency revised its procedures in as a result of the fire.</i>
