elflike	Small and delicate.
eligible	Qualified for or allowed or worthy of being chosen. <i>Every citizen of india is eligible to become the president of the country.</i>
elite	Selected as the best. <i>His role as the chosen cartoonist of the intellectual elite</i>
elizabethan	Of or relating to elizabeth i of england or to the age in which she ruled as queen. <i>The elizabethan mansion was dovetailed around the pele.</i>
ellipsoid	Having the nature or shape of an ellipsoid. <i>An ellipsoid is a three dimensional surface.</i>
