<b>each</b>	Every one considered individually. <i>The newlyweds are able to visit each other in person every few months, relying heavily on skype in the meantime.</i>
<b>eager</b>	Having or showing keen interest or intense desire or impatient expectancy. <i>I'm most acquiescent and eager to please.</i>

<b>eagle-eyed</b>	Capable of seeing to a great distance. <i>She was a dark eyed beauty, lithe and winsome.</i>
<b>eared</b>	Worn or shabby from overuse or (of pages) from having corners turned down-clifton fadiman. <i>Ear inflammations are common in drop eared breeds of dog.</i>
<b>earless</b>	Lacking external ears. <i>A baby koala is referred to as a joey and is hairless, blind, and earless.</i>
<b>earlier</b>	At or near the beginning of a period of time or course of events or before the usual or expected time. <i>The architect john billing designed the new church in the early english style.</i>
<b>earliest</b>	Being or occurring at an early stage of development. <i>In the early 1960s the couple found a new avocation.</i>
<b>early</b>	Very young. <i>In the premier season of 1936, superlatives came early for the new team.</i>
<b>earlyish</b>	Being somewhat early.
<b>earned</b>	Gained or acquired; especially through merit or as a result of effort or action. <i>He earned a lot of money by investing that company.</i>
<b>earnest</b>	Earnest. <i>He was an earnest soul, hankering for truth.</i>
<b>earsplitting</b>	Loud enough to cause (temporary) hearing loss. <i>The uproar would be earsplitting and i would be deemed a vandal.</i>
<b>earthborn</b>	Connected with earthly life; of earthly origin. <i>Here orion is described as earthborn and enormous in stature.</i>
<b>earthbound</b>	Confined to the earth. <i>Ancient astronaut theories also may include the idea that civilization may have evolved on earth twice, and that the visitation of ancient astronauts may reflect the return of descendants of ancient humans whose population was separated from earthbound humans.</i>
<b>earthen</b>	Made of earth (or baked clay). <i>A submersible earthen dike extends from the movable dam to the illinois shore.</i>
<b>earthlike</b>	Earth colored; of something having a color of soil or earth. <i>Earthlike plate tectonics does not appear to be active on mars today.</i>
<b>earthly</b>	Of or belonging to or characteristic of this earth as distinguished from heaven. <i>His masterpiece is the triptych 'the garden of earthly delights'.</i>
<b>earthshaking</b>	Loud enough to shake the very earth. <i>Nearly two years later, it's no longer earthshaking.</i>
<b>earthy</b>	Sensible and practical. <i>The idol here is unique and is earthy.</i>
<b>easier</b>	Affording pleasure. <i>It's easy to be a holiday grouch.</i>
<b>easiest</b>	Not hurried or forced. <i>Is it easy to knead the seat</i>

<b>east</b>	Situated in or facing or moving toward the east. <i>Hummock island is almost long in a north west to south east direction.</i>
<b>eastbound</b>	Moving toward the east. <i>Only the eastbound exit was removed.</i>
<b>easterly</b>	From the east; used especially of winds. <i>It is the most easterly port in suffolk.</i>
<b>eastern</b>	From the east; used especially of winds. <i>The eastern church asserted that the holy.</i>
<b>easternmost</b>	Farthest to the east. <i>Porcupine represents the easternmost part of the city's urban core.</i>
<b>eastmost</b>	Farthest to the east. <i>The evsc headquarters is in the eastmost building.</i>
<b>eastside</b>	Of the eastern part of a city e.g. manhattan. <i>At this location, it crosses to the left bank eastside .</i>
<b>eastward</b>	Moving toward the east. <i>Or eastward of afghanistan's borderline.</i>
<b>easy</b>	Obtained with little effort or sacrifice, often obtained illegally. <i>The merchandising must be easy to find.</i>
<b>easygoing</b>	Not burdensome or demanding; borne or done easily and without hardship. <i>He actually is easygoing and somewhat shy.</i>
<b>eatable</b>	Suitable for use as food. <i>O twice born, eatable offerings should be made for three days.</i>

<b>ebionite</b>	Of or relating to the ebionites or their religion. <i>Epiphanius highlights development as well as diversity in ebionite teaching.</i>

<b>echt</b>	Not fake or counterfeit. <i>The government sought to retry echt on 14 charges.</i>
<b>eclectic</b>	Selecting what seems best of various styles or ideas. <i>She also is the owner of the eclectic restaurant in utrecht.</i>
<b>ecologic</b>	Of or relating to the science of ecology. <i>Measures of the amount of ecologic as sociation between species.</i>
<b>ecological</b>	Of or relating to the science of ecology. <i>Hasty generalization is the opposite of the ecological fallacy.</i>
<b>econometric</b>	Of or relating to econometrics. <i>The econometric goal is to estimate .</i>
<b>economic</b>	Of or relating to the science of economics. <i>Economic revival policies initiated.</i>
<b>economical</b>	Using the minimum of time or resources necessary for effectiveness. <i>He was responsible for the economical program of the party.</i>
<b>ecstatic</b>	Feeling great rapture or delight. <i>Locke finds the guitar, and charlie is ecstatic.</i>
<b>ectodermal</b>	Of or relating to the ectoderm. <i>Hypohidrotic ectodermal dysplasia.</i>
<b>ectodermic</b>	Of or relating to the ectoderm.
<b>ectomorphic</b>	Having a build with little fat or muscle but with long limbs. <i>A tall, lanky, ectomorphic man who wore dark rimmed eyeglasses.</i>
<b>ectopic</b>	Exhibiting ectopia. <i>Ectopic pregnancy is a complication after a tuboplasty.</i>
<b>ectothermic</b>	Of animals except birds and mammals; having body temperature that varies with the environment. <i>Most fish are ectothermic or cold blooded .</i>
<b>ectozoan</b>	Of or relating to epizoa.

- ecuadorian** Of or relating to or characteristic of ecuador or its people. *They were a team to fear in the ecuadorian league.*
- ecumenic** Concerned with promoting unity among churches or religions. *He would later state that his baptism had had an ecumenic character .*
- ecumenical** Concerned with promoting unity among churches or religions. *In 1920 he became the archdeacon of to the ecumenical patriarchate itself.*

- edwardian** Of or relating to or characteristic of the era of edward vii in england. *After this, she pursued a career in edwardian musical comedy.*

- effortless** Requiring or apparently requiring no effort. *Her rendering of higher octaves and sruti were remarkably with effortless ease.*
- effulgent** Radiating or as if radiating light. *Meteors, effulgent like indra's thunder bolt, fall with loud hisses . . .*

- elect** Selected as the best. *Don't the shareholders own the club and elect the president*
- elected** Subject to popular election. *The convention delegates elected him as the president of the convention.*
- elective** Not compulsory. *Mayor brown was overwhelmingly elected as the first elective mayor of the city.*

<b>electoral</b>	Relating to or composed of electors. <i>The extremist right wing group won an electoral foothold in parliament.</i>
<b>electric</b>	Using or providing or producing or transmitting or operated by electricity. <i>The cameraman has the electric power turned on.</i>
<b>electrical</b>	Using or providing or producing or transmitting or operated by electricity. <i>The above ignores the position dependence of the electrical fields.</i>
<b>electrocardiographic</b>	Of or relating to an electrocardiograph. <i>Apparatus for the acquisition and pre processing of electrocardiographic data.</i>
<b>electrochemical</b>	Of or involving electrochemistry. <i>A battery is a collection of electrochemical cells.</i>
<b>electroencephalographic</b>	Of or relating to an electroencephalograph. <i>Intracranial electroencephalographic changes in deep anesthesia.</i>
<b>electrolytic</b>	Of or relating to or containing an electrolyte. <i>The process may be electroless or electrolytic.</i>
<b>electromagnetic</b>	Pertaining to or exhibiting magnetism produced by electric charge in motion. <i>The electric current is the divergence of the electromagnetic displacement.</i>
<b>electromechanical</b>	Of or relating to or involving an electrically operated mechanical device. <i>An electrostatically driven electromechanical display device is disclosed.</i>
<b>electromotive</b>	Concerned with or producing electric current. <i>Tension is used for mechanical force and voltage for electromotive force.</i>
<b>electronegative</b>	Having a negative charge. <i>This electronegative atom is usually fluorine, oxygen, or nitrogen.</i>
<b>electroneutral</b>	Having no net electric charge. <i>The initially electroneutral acceptor becomes negatively charged ionised .</i>
<b>electronic</b>	Of or concerned with electrons. <i>The band is considered relentlessly electronic.</i>
<b>electrophoretic</b>	Of or relating to electrophoresis. <i>Process of electrophoretic painting.</i>
<b>electropositive</b>	Having a positive charge. <i>But francium may not necessarily be more electropositive.</i>
<b>electrostatic</b>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>The electrostatic approximation.</i>
<b>eleemosynary</b>	Generous in assistance to the poor. <i>This is an eleemosynary fund.</i>

<b>elegant</b>	Displaying effortless beauty and simplicity in movement or execution. <i>The furniture is tasteful and elegant, but not costly.</i>
<b>elegiac</b>	Expressing sorrow often for something past. <i>Motifs of emptiness and absence haunt the novel and establish its elegiac feel.</i>
<b>elemental</b>	Relating to severe atmospheric conditions- j.k.howard. <i>The elemental weapon of earth is the pentacle.</i>
<b>elementalism</b>	Of or being the essential or basic part. <i>Another approach is the reaction of gallium with elemental bromine.</i>
<b>elementary</b>	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of elementary school or elementary education. <i>Bancroft is home to the bancroft elementary school.</i>
<b>elephantine</b>	Of great mass; huge and bulky. <i>The cult of hapi was mainly located at the first cataract named elephantine.</i>
<b>elevated</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style-oliver franks. <i>In 1925 the metropolitanate was elevated to the rank of patriarchate.</i>
<b>eleven</b>	Being one more than ten. <i>There are eleven courts in three magisterial districts.</i>
<b>eleventh</b>	Coming next after the tenth and just before the twelfth in position. <i>The eleventh day is the last day of the vratha.</i>
<b>elfin</b>	Relating to or made or done by or as if by an elf. <i>Another colloquial name is the brown elfin saddle.</i>
<b>elfish</b>	Usually good-naturedly mischievous. <i>Solid article contributor, gnomish and elfish combined.</i>
<b>elflike</b>	Small and delicate.
<b>eligible</b>	Qualified for or allowed or worthy of being chosen. <i>Every citizen of india is eligible to become the president of the country.</i>
<b>elite</b>	Selected as the best. <i>His role as the chosen cartoonist of the intellectual elite</i>
<b>elizabethan</b>	Of or relating to elizabeth i of england or to the age in which she ruled as queen. <i>The elizabethan mansion was dovetailed around the pele.</i>
<b>ellipsoid</b>	Having the nature or shape of an ellipsoid. <i>An ellipsoid is a three dimensional surface.</i>
<b>ellipsoidal</b>	Having the nature or shape of an ellipsoid. <i>Rotating ellipsoidal variables are a class of variable star.</i>

<b>elliptic</b>	In the form of an ellipse. <i>The composition of weakly elliptic operators is weakly elliptic.</i>
<b>elliptical</b>	Rounded like an egg. <i>The orbit of mars is much more elliptical than the earth's.</i>
<b>elongate</b>	Having notably more length than width; being long and slender. <i>They are unicellular, globose, and ellipsoid to elongate in shape.</i>
<b>elongated</b>	Drawn out or made longer spatially. <i>An elongated flame aureole is popular.</i>
<b>eloquent</b>	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively. <i>Priestley was the more eloquent, in my opinion.</i>
<b>elucidative</b>	That makes clear. <i>Maps can be very elucidative about some details.</i>
<b>elusive</b>	Difficult to describe. <i>During the expedition, the enemy proved elusive.</i>
<b>elvish</b>	Usually good-naturedly mischievous. <i>Exceptions would be stuff like elvish language.</i>
<b>elysian</b>	Being of such surpassing excellence as to suggest inspiration by the gods. <i>The elysian tower, ireland's tallest building, can be seen in the background.</i>

<b>emaciated</b>	Very thin especially from disease or hunger or cold. <i>Saint pierre led this envoy of emaciated volunteers to the city gates.</i>
<b>emancipative</b>	Tending to set free.
<b>emarginate</b>	Having a notched tip. <i>The apex of the lamina is emarginate.</i>
<b>emasculate</b>	Having unsuitable feminine qualities. <i>They free both girls and hand them a knife so they can emasculate him.</i>
<b>emasculated</b>	Having unsuitable feminine qualities. <i>So it seems a shame to emasculate a very good summing up.</i>
<b>embarrassed</b>	Feeling or caused to feel uneasy and self-conscious. <i>The result was embarrassed silence.</i>

<b>embattled</b>	Prepared for battle. <i>The nave and aisles are also embattled.</i>

<b>embedded</b>	Enclosed firmly in a surrounding mass. <i>They embedded the color into the pillow.</i>
<b>emblematic</b>	Being or serving as an illustration of a type;. <i>I thought it was somehow emblematic.</i>
<b>emblematical</b>	Serving as a visible symbol for something abstract. <i>He painted historical and emblematical subjects.</i>
<b>embodied</b>	Possessing or existing in bodily form- shakespeare. <i>The animal embodied mysterious colors.</i>
<b>embolic</b>	Of or relating to an embolism or embolus. <i>Such bubbles are responsible for the most serious of gas embolic symptoms.</i>
<b>embonpoint</b>	Sufficiently fat so as to have a pleasing fullness of figure;.
<b>embossed</b>	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>The embossed concrete is cured in the mold to produce the building panel.</i>
<b>embryologic</b>	Of an organism prior to birth or hatching. <i>It has a distinct embryologic origin.</i>
<b>embryonal</b>	Of an organism prior to birth or hatching. <i>That the embryonal development of related species is similar is obvious.</i>
<b>embryonic</b>	Of an organism prior to birth or hatching. <i>It is an adult version of the embryonic forebrain germinal zone.</i>
<b>embryotic</b>	In an early stage of development. <i>During embryotic development, humans have a tail for a short period of time.</i>
<b>emended</b>	Improved or corrected by critical editing. <i>Qian collected and emended ang's philosophical works.</i>
<b>emergent</b>	Coming into existence. <i>In addition, it determines the geometry of the emergent beam.</i>
<b>emerging</b>	Coming into existence. <i>In the view of higher education nohar is the emerging town.</i>
<b>emeritus</b>	Honorably retired from assigned duties and retaining your title along with the additional title `emeritus' as in `professor emeritus'. <i>He is presently on the emeritus staff at the university.</i>
<b>eminent</b>	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>Below is the list of eminent personalities from the sengunthar caste.</i>
<b>emmetropic</b>	Of or relating to the normal condition of the eye in which visual images are in clear focus on the retina. <i>Briefly, the total refractive power of the emmetropic eye is approximately 60.</i>

<b>emollient</b>	Having a softening or soothing effect especially to the skin. <i>In cosmetics, dodecanol is used as an emollient.</i>
<b>emotional</b>	Of or pertaining to emotion. <i>Their marriage was tempestuous and emotional.</i>
<b>emotionless</b>	Unmoved by feeling-margaret deland. <i>Ruth recoils, and smailey and fred watch, emotionless.</i>
<b>emotive</b>	Characterized by emotion. <i>But there is a great difference between emotive and non emotive language.</i>
<b>empathetic</b>	Showing empathy or ready comprehension of others' states. <i>I have skimmed phil and am empathetic to most of what he says.</i>
<b>empathic</b>	Showing empathy or ready comprehension of others' states. <i>It is not very true either that aspies are not empathic.</i>
<b>emphasised</b>	Spoken with emphasis. <i>He emphasized strongly the need for effort and idleness.</i>
<b>emphasized</b>	Spoken with emphasis. <i>The article emphasized her achievement and dwarfished the counterargument.</i>
<b>emphatic</b>	Spoken with emphasis. <i>The emphatic particle can be added.</i>
<b>emphysematous</b>	Relating to or resembling or being emphysema. <i>Perhaps clubbing is a late change in severe emphysematous disease.</i>
<b>empiric</b>	Derived from experiment and observation rather than theory. <i>Buchanan asserted that his particular psychism would supersede empiric science.</i>
<b>empirical</b>	Derived from experiment and observation rather than theory. <i>It is the way the empirical scientific method works.</i>
<b>employable</b>	Physically and mentally capable of working at a regular job and available. <i>Some of them who would have been unemployable may remain employable.</i>
<b>employed</b>	Put to use. <i>Most of the populations are employed in agriculture.</i>
<b>empty</b>	Devoid of significance or point. <i>The streets are empty and desolate.</i>

<b>extraordinaire</b>	Extraordinary in a particular capacity. <i>Beaches there are described as 'naturally extraordinaire'.</i>
<b>extraordinary</b>	Serving an unusual or special function in addition to those of the regular officials. <i>He had extraordinary powers of elocution and mimicry.</i>

<b>extrasensory</b>	Seemingly outside normal sensory channels. <i>Some selected experiments in extrasensory perception.</i>
<b>extrasystolic</b>	Of or relating to or happening during an extrasystole.
<b>extraterrestrial</b>	Originating or located or occurring outside earth or its atmosphere. <i>He reported to the monstrous slug like extraterrestrial known as the jagrafess.</i>
<b>extraterritorial</b>	Outside territorial limits or jurisdiction. <i>The latter is still partly an extraterritorial entity.</i>
<b>extravagant</b>	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>The wedding was very extravagant.</i>
<b>extraversive</b>	Directed outward; marked by interest in others or concerned with external reality.
<b>extravert</b>	Being concerned with the social and physical environment. <i>I came here as a reader trying to decide if i am an introvert or an extravert.</i>
<b>extraverted</b>	Being concerned with the social and physical environment. <i>Each function is used in either an extraverted or introverted way.</i>
<b>extravertive</b>	Being concerned with the social and physical environment.
<b>extreme</b>	Most distant in any direction. <i>He has an extreme narcissism.</i>
<b>extremist</b>	Far beyond the norm. <i>This decision earned her the enmity of the hutu extremist parties.</i>
<b>extricable</b>	Capable of being extricated.
<b>extrinsic</b>	Not forming an essential part of a thing or arising or originating from the outside. <i>The author isn't commenting on an extrinsic topic.</i>
<b>extropic</b>	Of or relating to extropy.
<b>extrospective</b>	Not introspective; examining what is outside yourself.
<b>extroversive</b>	Directed outward; marked by interest in others or concerned with external reality.
<b>extrovert</b>	Being concerned with the social and physical environment. <i>An avowed bisexual and extrovert, she is given to cheeky, titillating remarks.</i>
<b>extroverted</b>	Being concerned with the social and physical environment. <i>Pokemones are livelier more extroverted than the emo and otaku stereotypes.</i>
<b>extrovertish</b>	Being somewhat extroverted.
<b>extrovertive</b>	Being concerned with the social and physical environment.
<b>extrusive</b>	Of rock material; forced out while molten through cracks in the earth's surface. <i>Trachyandesite is an extrusive igneous rock.</i>

<b>exuberant</b>	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>The village is an exuberant and flourishing place.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>The finale is an exultant celebration that only balanchine could devise.</i>
<b>exuvial</b>	Of or relating to the cast-off skins or cuticles of various animals.

<b>eye-catching</b>	Seizing the attention. <i>Eye catching are the hagioscopes in the east bay of the nave.</i>
<b>eye-popping</b>	Amazingly impressive; suggestive of the flashing of lightning. <i>Eye twitch is usually in one eye or the other.</i>
<b>eyeless</b>	Lacking sight. <i>They are small and eyeless with a long tail like structure.</i>
