Synonyms of "Admirable" as an adjective (16 Words)

commendable

Worthy of high praise.

*He showed **commendable** restraint.*

creditable

Worthy of often limited commendation.

*A very **creditable** 2 4 defeat.*

deserving

Worthy of being treated in a particular way (often used ironically).

*The **deserving** poor.*

estimable

Deserving of respect or high regard.

***Estimable** assets.*

exceptional

Far beyond what is usual in magnitude or degree.

*An **exceptional** memory.*

exemplary

(of damages) exceeding the amount needed for simple compensation.

***Exemplary** behaviour.*

honourable	Used as a title for certain high officials, the children of certain ranks of the nobility, and MPs. <i>The young man s intentions had been honourable.</i>
laudable	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. <i>Laudable motives of improving housing conditions.</i>
meritorious	Deserving reward or praise. <i>Meritorious conduct.</i>
notable	Worthy of notice. <i>The results with one notable exception have been superb.</i>
praiseworthy	Deserving approval and admiration. <i>The government s praiseworthy efforts.</i>
<u>respectable</u>	Regarded by society to be good, proper, or correct. <i>A respectable woman.</i>
<u>worthwhile</u>	Sufficiently valuable to justify the investment of time or interest. <i>This attitude could doom a very worthwhile project to extinction.</i>
worthy	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>A fact worthy of attention.</i>
worthy of admiration	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse.
worthy of commendation	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse.



Usage Examples of "Admirable" as an adjective

- *He has one admirable quality—he is totally honest.*
- *Among her many admirable qualities are generosity and graciousness.*
- *His taste was impeccable, his health admirable.*
- *Trains ran with admirable precision.*

eminent	Standing above others in quality or position. <i>The book s scholarship and eminent readability.</i>
estimable	Worthy of great respect. <i>She was shown into that estimable woman s presence.</i>
excellent	Very good; of the highest quality. <i>Made an excellent speech.</i>
<u>fame</u>	The state of being known or talked about by many people, especially on account of notable achievements. <i>Winning the Olympic title has brought her fame and fortune.</i>
glorious	Characterized by grandeur. <i>Glorious platters of succulent crabs.</i>
<u>glory</u>	Magnificence or great beauty. <i>To fight and die for the glory of one s nation.</i>
good	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>Ruined the family s good name.</i>
<u>honorable</u>	Adhering to ethical and moral principles. <i>Honorable service to his country.</i>
honored	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
laudable	Worthy of high praise. <i>Laudable though the aim might be the results have been criticized.</i>
outstanding	Clearly noticeable. <i>Einstein was one of the outstanding figures of the 20th centurey.</i>
praiseworthy	Deserving approval and admiration. <i>The government s praiseworthy efforts.</i>
prestigious	Exerting influence by reason of high status or prestige. <i>A prestigious professor at a prestigious university.</i>
<u>reputable</u>	Having a good reputation. <i>A reputable business.</i>
<u>respectable</u>	(of a person's appearance, clothes, or behaviour) decent or presentable. <i>A respectable sum.</i>

respected	Receiving deferential regard. <i>A respected academic.</i>
respectful	Feeling or showing deference and respect. <i>They sit in respectful silence.</i>
splendid	Very good; of the highest quality. <i>A splendid fellow.</i>
surprising	Causing surprise or wonder or amazement. <i>Leaped up with surprising agility.</i>
terrific	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i>Fought a terrific battle.</i>
tout	Someone who advertises for customers in an especially brazen way. <i>Shop managers would stand in the street touting for business.</i>
worthy	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>A worthy fellow.</i>
